

#### 2017 REORGANIZATIONAL MEETING BOONE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS ALBION, NEBRASKA

The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska convened at 9:00 A.M. on Thursday, January 5, 2017, in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Chairman Luettel called the Reorganizational Meeting to order as required by Nebraska State Statute. Commissioners present for roll call were Ken Luettel, Hilary K. Maricle and Alan Rasmussen. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Luettel noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to appoint Hilary K. Maricle as Chairman of the Boone County Board of Commissioners for the year, 2017. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel and Rasmussen. Abstain: Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Maricle to appoint Ken Luettel as Vice Chairman of the Boone County Board of Commissioners for the year, 2017. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen and Maricle. Abstain: Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to appoint the following to be on the Health Board for Boone County as required by State Statute: County Sheriff, County Clerk and Boone County Health Center Chief of Staff for 2017.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen that the budget committee for the ensuing 2017-2018 budget year is the Boone County Board of Commissioners, Boone County Clerk and Boone County Treasurer.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel to reappoint Richard D. Martinsen, Certified Public Accountant, Albion, Nebraska, to prepare the County Budget for the 2017-2018 budget year, to be paid from the County General fund.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to appoint Stacey L. Robinson, Fullerton, Nebraska, as full time County Highway Superintendent under the supervision of the County Board for 2017.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to reappoint Christopher C. Hays, of Osceola, Nebraska, as Boone County Surveyor for a four year term commencing January 8, 2015 through December 31, 2018, per contract for services as provided in State Statute Section 23-1901.01.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to reappoint Jacqueline Lynne Wells as full time Boone County Veteran Service Officer under the supervision of the County Board for 2017. Office hours are 8:00 A.M. to 12:00 P.M. and 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M., Monday through Friday and a part-time employee at less than 20 hours per week. In addition, there is a signed agreement with Greeley County for Boone County Veteran Service Officer to provide services for Greeley County.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to continue the contract for the services of Public Defender for Boone County with Jeffrey C. Jarecki of Jarecki Yosten PC LLO, Albion, Nebraska, pursuant to the terms of an Agreement that shall commence on January 1, 2016 and continue until January 1, 2018.





Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Luettel to reappoint Randall Bruland as the Administrator and Maintenance Director of the Boone County Ambulance Service under the supervision of the County Board for 2017.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to continue the agreement for patient billing and collection services for the Boone County Ambulance Service with EMS Billing Services, Inc. of Omaha, Nebraska pursuant to an Agreement effective March 1, 2014 that continues to termination by one of the parties. Nicole Levander, Boone County Health Center, to serve as liaison for the Boone County Ambulance Service/EMS Billing Services for 2017.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to reappoint Mary Ziemba as County Planning and Zoning Administrator, Regulatory Zoning Investigator and Floodplain Manager under the supervision of the County Board for 2017. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to appoint Alan Rasmussen as Courthouse Custodian Supervisor for 2017.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to appoint the Board of Commissioners Chairman as Chairperson of the County General Assistance Program with the emergencies being handled by a Commissioner. The County Clerk or Deputy County Clerk shall contact the assistance program chairperson or a Commissioner when there is a request on a day there is no scheduled Board meeting.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to appoint the Boone County Clerk as the contact person for Boone County for the NIRMA Insurance for 2017.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to give the County Clerk's office the authority to sign any documents that pertain to the office of the County Superintendent of Schools after June 30, 2000 under the supervision of the County Board for 2017.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel that the depository for the Boone County Clerk account will be the Boone County Bank, A Division of Madison County Bank, Albion with Kathy Thorberg, Lorrie Nicklasson and Sarah Robinson as signees authorized to exercise the powers for said account; and depository for the Boone County Imprest Vendor account will be the Boone County Bank, A Division of Madison County Bank, Albion with Commissioners Ken Luettel, Hilary K. Maricle, Alan Rasmussen and County Clerk's office Kathy Thorberg, Lorrie Nicklasson and Sarah Robinson as signees authorized to exercise the powers for said account.

Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Maricle that the depository for the Clerk of the District Court will be the Cornerstone Bank of York, Albion Branch with Kathy Thorberg, Lorrie Nicklasson and Sarah Robinson as signees authorized to exercise the powers for said account.



Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle that the depository for the Boone County Imprest Payroll account will be the Cornerstone Bank of York, Albion Branch, with Commissioners Ken Luettel, Hilary K. Maricle, Alan Rasmussen and County Clerk's office Kathy Thorberg, Lorrie Nicklasson and Sarah Robinson as signees authorized to exercise the powers for said account.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen that the depositories for the County Treasurer are as follows: Boone County Bank, A Division of Madison County Bank, Albion, NE; Cedar Rapids State Bank, Cedar Rapids, NE; Cornerstone Bank (Albion Branch and St. Edward Branch), York, NE; First Bank & Trust of Fullerton (St. Edward Branch), Fullerton, NE; Great Plains State Bank, Petersburg, NE; Homestead Bank (Albion Branch), Cozad, NE; and Alternate Investment is Nebraska Public Agency Investment Trust (NPAIT), Lincoln, NE. The County Board authorizes and empowers the Boone County Treasurer to invest any surplus funds in the custody of the office. Any surplus funds shall be invested to assure a beneficial rate of return to the County and confirmation of all pledged securities are on file.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen that all County Officials and Department Heads must contact the County Board, as an agenda item, before buying or doing any major maintenance to equipment or furniture over \$800.00.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle that the courthouse hours shall be 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM with a onehour unpaid break, and that all offices will post their hours, including the lunch break; and notice shall be posted on the respective office door only if an office is to be closed when it otherwise would be open.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel that the Boone County full time employees are to receive twelve paid holidays which include the observed nine holidays as set forth in the NIRMA Guide to Creating a Personnel System for Nebraska Counties Handbook together with Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and Columbus Day. In addition, Arbor Day shall be a floating holiday to be used in 2017 by the employee beginning the last Friday in April up to December 21<sup>st</sup> of the current year. The Courthouse "Closed" notices will be posted by Board directive on the north and west outside entrance courthouse doors.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen that full time employees are to receive vacation and sick leave as set forth in the Boone County Employee Handbook. The employee's vacation and sick leave records are recorded with the time clock/attendance system effective January 2014.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to approve the IRS mileage reimbursement rate of 53.5 cents per mile, effective January 1, 2017 as referenced in the Boone County Employee Handbook.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel to approve County meal reimbursable dollar amount, as referenced in the Boone County Employee Handbook, for 2017 overnight travel policy: (1) Includes reimbursement by submitting an itemized receipt for actual expense up to \$11.00 for breakfast, \$12.00 for lunch and \$23.00 for supper; (2) No reimbursement of meals for one day travel; (3) If an unforeseen situation occurs for one day travel and return is after 7:00 P.M., the meal may be reimbursed and will be taxed and added to the employee W-2; (4) Itemized receipts are required for all travel expenses.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel that agenda items must be provided to the Boone County Clerk's Office no later than noon on the Friday preceding a Board meeting in order to be considered for said Board meeting.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen that the Boone County Board of Commissioners will hold their Board meetings on every Monday except for the first Monday of each month in the year, 2017, commencing at 9:00 A.M. Meeting dates/times are subject to change due to state statute regulations. Monday meetings that are



on holidays will be held on Tuesday. The Accounts Payable Vendor meeting will be on the second Monday of the month and other Mondays will be regular public meetings. The Payroll meetings are subject to change from Monday to a different day for approval by the Board with the implementation of the time clock/attendance system and the 22/21 pay period. The Board meeting dates for payroll approval are as follows: January 25, February 24, March 27, April 26, May 24, June 28, July 26, August 28, September 27, October 25, November 28 and December 27, 2017. The County Clerk's office has charge and authority of the agenda for all meetings. The agenda will be made available for all meetings on the Boone County Website and the bulletin board located in the north courthouse entrance. Also, the following will be used to post notices in advance for emergency meetings and meetings that cannot be published in the legal newspaper(s): Boone County Website; Boone County Courthouse; lobbies of the Boone County Bank; Cornerstone Bank; Homestead Bank; and Albion News Office, all located in Albion, NE. In addition, the Cedar Rapids State Bank, Cedar Rapids, NE, Cornerstone Bank, St. Edward, NE and Great Plains State, Petersburg, NE.

As required by law (Neb. Rev. Stat. §48-443), each Nebraska county must have a working safety committee. Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen that (1) the following will serve on the Safety Committee for 2017: Region 44 Emergency Management Director; County Sheriff; Board of Commissioners; County Highway Superintendent; County Treasurer; County ADA Coordinator; Custodial Maintenance Supervisor; and (2) the Safety Committee meetings are tentatively scheduled for February 24, 2017, May 15, 2017, August 14, 2017 and November 20, 2017, commencing at 9:00 A.M.

The Grievance Procedure in the Employee Handbook says the County will use a Grievance Board consisting of five people. The Commissioners shall create the pre-designated list of ten impartial members to serve on the Grievance Board. The Board visited with county residents to create a pre-designated list. 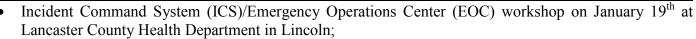

The quotes included a list of the maintenance procedures. Both generators are necessary for the operation of the emergency equipment and notification systems for inclement weather and disasters. The Board approved the following on March 14, 2016: NMC quote of an annual maintenance for the Winco generator of \$617.00 and semi-annual maintenance for the Olympian generator of \$414.00 each inspection. The 'semi-annual' maintenance quote definition was for the May/June inspection and the 'annual' maintenance quote definition was for the September/October inspection and changing of the oil and filters. Connie Jensen contacted several organizations in the fall of 2016 and a letter was received by the Board of Commissioners in October 2016 regarding perpetual care for the Dahlsborg Cemetery. Jensen informed the Board that funds have been left by her father's estate for the stones to be set upright, signage and perpetual care of the Dahlsborg Cemetery that was established in 1888. The Clerk's office traced the real estate history of the Dahlsborg Cemetery. Jarecki reviewed the real estate transactions concerning the Dahlsborg Cemetery and the

statutes regarding abandoned cemeteries. Jarecki felt that the abandoned cemetery statutes do not apply to the Dahlsborg Cemetery due to real estate transactions indicate that the quarter of ground including the cemetery acres are privately owned. Jarecki plans to visit with Jensen and the present owners of the real estate to discuss perpetual care of the Dahlsborg Cemetery.

Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension Educator, presented quotes for a new laptop to be used by extension office personnel. Pritchard informed the Board that UNL purchases and is the owner of the equipment that could be leased to Boone County. Neidhardt said that the trees are to be planted twentyfive feet from the power lines. The Board informed the requestors that any trees planted will need to start at the required distance south of the potential Park View Street adjacent to the county fairgrounds through the new housing development area to be known as South Park Subdivision. A tree line needs to end at the existing fence line on the south that currently divides the two parcels of property owned by the County of Boone. If EMS Billing Services does not receive payment they send the file information to the Boone County Ambulance liaison. The Boone County Ambulance liaison mails three billing statements to the patient for the ambulance service with the third billing request saying, if no payment is received in 30 days the billing will be turned over to the County Attorney for collection. The Boone County Ambulance Service submitted an uncollectible ambulance account for a July 2015 ambulance service in the amount of \$2,070.00, as all methods of collection have been exhausted. The recommendation from the Boone County Ambulance Service liaison is to remove the \$2,070.00 from the EMS Billing Services account for purposes of bookkeeping and turn the account over to the County Attorney to attempt further collection. - Robinson and the Board discussed upcoming road projects, road employee work schedule and safety kits/issues.

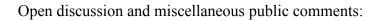

The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska, met in regular session at 9:00 A.M. on Wednesday, April 26, 2017 in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Chairman Maricle called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Hilary K. Maricle and Ken Luettel. Absent: Alan Rasmussen. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Maricle acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Carrie Rodriguez, Chief Probation Officer for District Five Probation, appeared before the Board. Rodriguez introduced herself as the recently appointed Chief Probation Officer for the eleven counties comprising District Five Probation. Rodriguez explained that three probation officers handle the Boone County area with one handling juvenile cases, one handling low-risk probationers and one handling high-risk probationers. Last year, the district prepared 23 reports and had 44 clients. Due to the increased number of clients served in the county, Rodriguez indicated that the probation budget for Boone County would be increased by approximately \$696.00 to \$8,496.00. The budget has been submitted for approval to the Platte County Commissioners as the principal county for the district. Rodriguez explained some of the programs provided by the district and indicated that they have been advocating using Northeast Nebraska Juvenile Services Inc. for detention purposes.

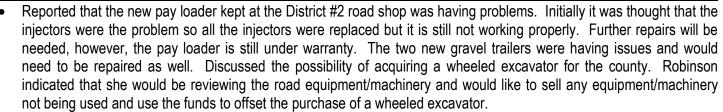
The Board reviewed the payroll claims and discussed the employee claims with overtime/compensatory time accumulation. Jack Nordeen, County Weed Superintendent/Signage Technician, came before the Board to report on the sprayer attached to the weed pickup. The sprayer was custom built by Superior Industries for the pickup. The valves on the booms are not working and it is difficult to get anyone to work on the sprayer once chemicals have been run through it. The valves will need to be replaced. Commissioner Luettel suggested checking with Helena about new valves. Nordeen reported that the pickup is running fine. Commissioner Luettel indicated to Nordeen that he had attended a meeting where it was discussed that some counties spray the 4 corners of bridge approaches. Discussion was had regarding whether or not the county had paid for a carport to be put up at the former Weed Superintendent's residence for purposes of storing the weed pickup.

Stacey Robinson, County Highway Superintendent, presented her report to the Board. Items discussed were as follows:

- The road employees began their 4 10 hour day rotation on April 24, 2017. Other employee procedures were discussed regarding reducing road time when hauling gravel and helping fix crooked signs.
- Discussed several road, bridge and culvert projects. Robinson indicated that equipment was being moved in regarding the bridge project east of town. Also reported that she had received reports of vehicles crossing the barricades put up for that project.



- Robinson indicated that there were a number of low water crossing signs in the county which are only allowed on minimum maintenance roads. Several signs are located on roads not classified as minimum maintenance. Robinson was going to do some research on whether those signs were placed correctly.
- Robinson indicated that she would be helping the Signage Technician with signage inventory. Once the inventory is complete, then sign maintenance would be easier. Also, Robinson will be conducting a thorough inventory of each road shop.
- Jackson Services contract for the road shops was received and given to the County Clerk's office for further review.

Denny Johnson, Boone County Sheriff, appeared before the Board regarding the purchase of office furniture. He requested the purchase of 5 chairs for the basement offices, 1 2-drawer file cabinet and 1 5-drawer file cabinet. Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel, to approve the purchase of 5 chairs, 1 2-drawer file cabinet and 1 5-drawer file cabinet for the Sheriff's Office. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Luettel. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen.

Paul Schilousky, Albion, Nebraska, appeared before the Board regarding a water issue that he is having at his residence along Highway No. 39 due to the water that flows along the West side of the railroad tracks. The Board indicated that the railroad is the cause of the water problem and that they have had similar issues and contacted the railroad and they refuse do anything about it. Schilousky indicated that the standing water problem also creates a breeding ground for mosquitos and West Nile virus. Schilousky would like to see a storm drain off of Fairview Street straight to the river. Commissioner Maricle inquired as to whether there was a water study done with regard to the Fairview project and how it may affect any changes. Commissioners recommended that he talked to the Albion City Council regarding the problem and if necessary possibly the County and City could work together to correct the problem.

Jacqueline Wells, Veteran Service Officer, has registered to attend the annual Nebraska Association of Professional Veteran Advocates (NAPVA) meeting in Valentine, Nebraska from May 1-4, 2017. The Board received information that other Veteran Service Officers from other counties may carpool with the Boone County Veterans Service Officer to Valentine. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to approve other Nebraska County Veteran Service Officers to occupy the Boone County vehicle that is being used for transportation to the NAPVA meeting in Valentine, NE. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

Open discussion and miscellaneous public comments:

- The Boone County Board of Commissioners published notice of a Special Informational Meeting in conjunction with the Boone County Planning and Zoning Commission Board meeting to be held on Monday, April 24, 2017. Said meeting was cancelled due to no quorum of the Boone County Planning and Zoning Commission Board.
- Commissioner Luettel indicated that they had a possible purchaser for the blue 2010 Ford Explorer. The vehicle had been put on the FFA sale but did not sell because the minimum bid was not met. Chairman Maricle acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

The County Safety Committee met at 9:00 A.M. to discuss routine business. The following committee members were present for the quarterly meeting: Commissioners Alan Rasmussen, Hilary K. Maricle, and Ken Luettel, Denny Johnson, Laurie Krohn, Rod Nelson, Stacey Robinson, Tom Smith, Kathy Thorberg and Jacqueline Wells. Nelson addressed old business regarding how to handle accident reports, NIRMA safety walk through, fire drills, phone notifications and review of an emergency action plan draft. New business was discussed: (1) Smith presented a Boone County Emergency Action Plan for the group to review and discuss; (2) Smith contacted NIRMA for the courthouse safety walk through and NIRMA plans to conduct the walk through on Tuesday, May 23, 2017 at 1:00 P.M.; (3) During the March 29, 2017 Tornado Drill test there were siren issues that need to be fixed; (4) Johnson informed the group that the telephone notification system has been installed in the County Sheriff's office; (5) Nelson plans to have a quote for the Board to review for repair of the sidewalk that is sinking in places around the courthouse; and (6) The county offices are asked to check their weather radios after a power loss to make sure they are working. Boone County had no accidents reported for first quarter 2017. The next safety committee meeting is scheduled for 9:00 A.M. on Monday, August 14, 2017. The Safety Committee meeting was adjourned by Alan Rasmussen at 9:14 A.M.

Adrian Mayer, Bader's Highway & Street of Norfolk, Nebraska, and Stacey Robinson, County Highway Superintendent, presented estimates for crack sealing for several county asphalt roads. The Estimate #229 for \$10,962.00 includes part of 255<sup>th</sup> Avenue from 250<sup>th</sup> Street North to gravel; Cargill Road from Highway 14 to gravel; and Old Mill Road from Albion West to gravel. Bader's Highway will remove all weeds, blow out all cracks, clean, seal and squeegee all cracks. The question is do we need to continue to rent a building that the motor grader has not been housed in for some time and/or would it be more justifiable to house the motor grader inside the County Road District 2 or 3 shop buildings and no longer pay rent and electrical bills on a non-owned county building? The Board suggested to the Highway Superintendent that the General Road Foreman be involved to review the status of the situation and report to the Board the pros/cons before a decision is made regarding the building rent for a motor grader.

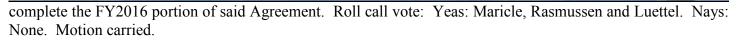

The Board entered into an Agreement on June 16, 2014 with Sequoia Consulting Group for Indirect Cost Allocation Services for FY2014, FY2015 and FY 2016. There is one year, FY2016, left to complete in accordance with the signed agreement. The County of Boone, Nebraska has been in contact with Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (NDHHS) regarding Title IV-D and Indirect Costs reimbursements. The County of Boone no longer receives an additional reimbursement for office space since NDHHS staff is no longer located in the County of Boone, Nebraska. Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to rescind the Board motion of October 11, 2016 that terminated said agreement and approve Sequoia Consulting Group to



The Board; Tom Smith, Region 44 Emergency Manager; Ed Meedel and Howard Nispel, Platte Valley Communications; Denny Johnson, County Sheriff; and John Buck, Deputy Sheriff, reviewed and discussed the Emergency Management Project EM4420172. The Region 44 Emergency Management counties are Boone, Nance and Merrick.

Meedel and Nispel presented the recommendations from the Region 44 Emergency Management project study and reminded the Board that these were only recommendations and that the final decisions were in the hands of the County Boards. The recommendations are as follows:

- SRS Mobile Radios for each County Sheriff Vehicles.
- New Tower, equipment shelter and HVAC at Petersburg, NE. Replacing current structure.
- Four (4) positon MCC7500 consolidated dispatch center in Nance County. Additional space required, or new dispatch center on East property. Two (2) position back-up.
- Re-programming Boone, Merrick and Nance counties land mobile radio assets to enhance emergency services interoperability.
- Replacement of approximately 30% of counties land mobile radio <u>legacy</u> assets.
- Additional sirens-Clarks West/Northwest and Lakes Area required.
- Replace back-up batteries at Boone County Law Enforcement, Petersburg, Chapman, Central City and Clarks Repeater sites.
- No additional VHF frequencies are required for coverage throughout the three (3) county area. Exception would be any vehicular repeaters for portable usage on the State Radio System (SRS).
- Incorporation of Next Generation 911 equipment (ECW NG9-1-1) at new Consolidated Dispatch Center.
- Minimal use of the "NRIN" system. Most of county repeater systems can be controlled by control stations in Nance County. Exception is one repeater in Boone County. Too many variables with "NRIN". How will the system be maintained in the future remains a big question mark!
- Phase out the Central City Paging network and put all pagers on the Central City Fire Dept. repeater.
- NRIN to control Petersburg repeater and Boone County Schools.
- Remove low band stations such as 39.9, 39.82 and 39.98.
- Leave high band (VHF) radios in law enforcement vehicles that are going to be equipped with "SRS" radios. SRS radios do not scan analog frequencies well. Older trunked mount analog VHF radios should be replaced with analog dash mount radios.
- Replace the Primrose and Petersburg repeater with a new 100 watt VHF system.

The Board and those present held a lengthy discussion on the possibility of consolidating Boone, Merrick and Nance Counties into a central communications dispatch system. Board members Luettel and Rasmussen expressed reservations about proceeding with the consolidation of communications. Maricle has mixed feelings and noted that consolidation in various areas of law enforcement communications may be mandated for rural counties at some point in the future. If Boone County decides not to be part of the three-county new communications system, the tower near Petersburg, radio repeaters at Petersburg and Primrose and the dispatch consoles in the sheriff's office need replacing soon.



Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Maricle for Boone County Board of Commissioners to continue participation in the discussions/planning of a new communications dispatch system regarding the Emergency Management Project EM4420172. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Maricle and Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Stacey Robinson, County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road/bridge maintenance, materials and projects. In addition, the following topics were discussed:

- Robinson and the Board discussed driveway requests.
- Robinson informed the Board that the plans are to pour the concrete deck tomorrow on the County Road Bridge Project #383 north of Albion.
- Robinson and the Board discussed the planting of crops in the county road right-of-way and irrigation pivots watering the county roads. Robinson informed the Board that the notices regarding these issues was published twice in the local newspapers and that there are crops planted in the county road right-of-way to date. The Zoning Administrator (Zoning Administrator/Administrative Assistant) position includes administrative assistant duties to the county highway superintendent. During certain months of the year the road department employees work four ten hour days, Monday through Thursday, to utilize the longer daylight hours while working on road projects. The Board felt that the position of Zoning Administrator/Administrative Assistant duties are primary office duties and not outdoor work. Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel that the Zoning Administrator/Administrative Assistant work hours coincide with the Courthouse hours. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Luettel and Rasmussen. The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska, met in regular session at 9:00 A.M. on Monday, June 19, 2017, in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Chairman Maricle called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Ken Luettel, Alan Rasmussen and Hilary K. Maricle. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Maricle acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Andy Devine, Albion City Administrator, Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc., and Rex Mahoney, Recreational Trails Committee, presented information to the Board regarding a possible Nebraska Game and Parks grant application for a potential trail project at the Albion City Park and Boone County Fairground areas. Devine said that the Recreation Trails Committee is here to present some information to the Board prior to requesting formal action on the grant application. The Recreational Trails Committee members are Jay Wolf, Chuck Rolf, Doug Koch, Mitch Glesinger, Mollie Morrow, Rex Mahoney, Ben Edwards and Andy Devine. Doug Koch and Mitch Glesinger, BCDA, Inc., and Ed Knott, Applied Connective Technologies, LLC, joined the informational meeting. Koch said recent area surveys indicated that there is interest for an area for individuals to walk safely and to not be walking in the city/village streets. Devine explained that the committee has held preliminary meetings to discuss potential grant applications to the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission Recreational Trails Program. This program provides eighty percent match up to \$250,000.00 for each approved trail project in the state and available only to political subdivisions. The group discussed submitting an application from the City of Albion for a proposed area around Fuller Park and extending south along Eighth Street, thence west to connect to County property. The discussion for submitting an application from the County of Boone, Nebraska for a proposed area beginning at the southeast corner of the property the County purchased in November 2016, running thence west to the Fairgrounds Road, thence North along the County property and County Fairgrounds property, thence East through the County Fairgrounds property to Fuller Park. The group estimated each project to be approximately one mile. The committee members emphasized that the trail routes are preliminary and subject to change. The committee members suggested asking for the twenty percent matching funds through a local/county wide fundraiser event.

Edmond Knott, Applied Connective Technologies, LLC, is the owner of the old county communications tower that sits on the real estate that the county purchased in November 2016. The Board and Knott discussed a Lease Agreement regarding the real estate that the old communication tower sits on and the possibility of moving Applied Connective Technologies equipment to the county's new tower in the future, if the old tower is removed. The Board and Knott agreed on a yearly lease in the amount of \$1,000.00. The current lease will end December 31, 2017 and this lease shall continue in effect from year to year thereafter until written notice of termination is given by either party to the other at least six (6) months before the annual expiration of this lease. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Luettel to approve a Lease Agreement between the County of Boone, Nebraska and Applied Connective Technologies, LLC as presented. After receiving approval to provide a quote, Dustin Will, Benefit Management, requested that the Board approve sharing of employee health insurance information with/from another insurance agent being NACO Benefits. In discussion, the Board felt that the Nebraska Blue Cross Blue Shield is the current trusted health insurance company in Nebraska. The Board felt that each insurance agent needs to complete their own application process and not ask the Board to tell another insurance agent that they have to share their application information with other insurance companies. Ross Davidson of Albion discussed irrigation pivots that are spraying water onto county roads and noxious weed problem areas with the Board, Denny Johnson, Boone County Sheriff, and Stacey Robinson, County



Highway Superintendent. The group held a lengthy discussion in regard to dangerous road conditions caused by the irrigation pivots spraying water onto the county roads. Davidson informed the group that within a two mile area that he travels there are five irrigation pivots that spray water onto the county roads. Sheriff Johnson explained the procedure that his office follows when they receive a telephone call complaint regarding any issue. Johnson showed the Board and Davison a copy of a file showing the date, time, location, type of complaint and any details/information provided during the telephone call. The Board asked the County Highway Superintendent to review state statutes, policies and legal enforcement procedures. Following review of the legal documents/requirements a policy may be drafted in regard to the county road issues. In addition, Davidson inquired of the status regarding the noxious weed issue he discussed with the Board on June 28, 2017. Robinson said that the county weed superintendent to discuss the status of the noxious weed complaint.

Tom Smith, Region 44 Emergency Manager, and Denny Johnson, Boone County Sheriff; presented information regarding the Emergency Management Project EM4420172, a study for a proposed joint communications center for the three counties. The Region 44 Emergency Management counties are Boone, Nance and Merrick. Smith presented comparisons and estimations regarding the operation of a joint communications center. The detailed analysis of costs estimates over five/ten years did show a potential sizeable cost savings for Boone County. The detailed analysis of costs included new building/equipment and costs savings after building/equipment payments are completed. Commissioner Luettel felt that there is a loss of local control when consolidating services. Commissioner Maricle said that from all of the meetings we have attended, we have heard and know that 'Next Generation 911' communications system is coming. Maricle asked the Board, should we be proactive and set up a Regional 44 Communications Center, or wait to see what changes the counties will need or be forced to make when the 'Next Generation 911' becomes effective. The Board asked about the Nebraska Regional Interoperability Network (NRIN) communications project that Homeland Security Funds helped place in counties. Smith said that the NRIN communication equipment dishes are in place and that the Homeland Security Funds were to start the project for equipment but not to sustain the operation or maintenance of the The maintenance of the equipment will possibly become the county governance NRIN equipment. responsibility. Smith said that the communications project goal that started in December 2016 was to complete an assessment of each of the three counties communications equipment and the equipment that needs updating/replaced has been accomplished. The Board said that they are open to future consolidation reviews as communication requirements and regulations change. Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen saying no to the three county communications center consolidation due to loss of local control. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Lower Loup Natural Resources District submitted a resolution for the Board to review. The purpose of the mitigation plan is to lessen the effects of disasters by increasing the disaster resistance of the Lower Loup Natural Resources District and prioritize mitigation strategies to reduce potential loss of life and property from hazards. FEMA regulations require documentation that the plan has been formally adopted by the governing body. This resolution shall supersede/void and take precedence over Resolution No. 2013-01 and all prior resolutions and written/unwritten policies that pertain to a Hazard Mitigation Plan for the County of Boone, Nebraska. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to adopt and approve Resolution No. 2017-22, the Lower Loup Natural Resources District Multi-Jurisdiction Hazard Mitigation Plan Update as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Denny Johnson, Sheriff, and the Board discussed base wages for starting a new law enforcement deputy employee. Johnson provided the Board with starting base wages from area counties and counties similar in

population with some of the figures including the insurance benefits to review. Johnson explained that the law enforcement academy is a sixteen week training that is available three times a year. Johnson said that a new non-certified law enforcement employee basically rides with a certified law enforcement employee for approximately a year. Johnson asked the Board to change the employee handbook starting base wage for new hired certified and non-certified law enforcement employees to a base wage range depending on their completed certifications and years of experience. Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to approve a change to the employee handbook starting base wage to a range base wage for non-certified law enforcement to be \$15.00 – \$16.00 per hour and certified law enforcement to be \$15.58 - \$18.50 per hour based on the certification(s) completed and years of experience and any cost of living increases that are figured on the base wages, will be figured on the lower amount of a base wage range effective January 1, 2018. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed Cost of Living scenarios that included two, three and four percent figured on the employee handbook current base wages for the respective employee's base wage. In addition, the two, three and four percent was figured by using the Elected Official's base wage including the respective sixty-five percent of the official's base for the chief deputies. In addition, the Board reviewed the June 2017 consumer price index of 1.6% that is sometimes used for a cost of living wage increase. The following figures using the official's base wage: 2%-\$50.00/month-\$.29/hour; 3%-\$76.05/month-\$.44/hour; and 4%-\$100.00/month-\$.58/hour. The Board reviewed the health insurance premium increase that the county full time employees receive based on monthly premium: Employee only - \$.63/hour; Employee & spouse/children - \$1.27/hour; and Employee & family - \$1.45/hour. Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel to approve the following cost of living wage increase as follows: \$.44 per hour wage increase for all full-time employees added to the employees present hourly wage at the end of the 2017 year; and Elected officials are to receive a 3% cost of living increase on their base wage and the four chief deputies to receive 65% of the respective elected official's cost of living, all being effective December 22, 2017 to coincide with the 22/21 pay period. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Luettel and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Stacey Robinson, County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road maintenance, hauling of aggregate materials, bridge projects and equipment repairs. Robinson said that the bridge project by St. Edward is completed and open to the public. Robinson plans to attend the Nebraska Department of Roads LTAP meeting/training in Lincoln on August 1 and 2, 2017.

The Board and Tanya Sharp, Boone County Health Center Chief Executive Officer, reviewed the applications and interviewed the applicants, beginning at 11:00 A.M., for the Boone County Health Center Board of Trustees. The Health Center Board of Trustees meet on the fourth Tuesday of each month. Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to table the Boone County Health Center Board of Trustees decision to the July 31, 2017 Board meeting at 10:00 A.M. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: Luettel. Motion carried.

The Board informed Tanya Sharp, Boone County Health Center Chief Executive Officer, of the information they received in regard to hospital real estate ownership. There were some changes made in regard to medical facilities operation and ownership authority within the Nebraska State Statutes Chapter 23 in 2012. The County Clerk's office will forward the information to Sharp for review.



The Board discussed the necessary procedure(s) in accordance with Nebraska State Statute 23-107.01, real estate owned by the County. The County is the owner of Lots 6, 7, and 8, Block 9, Mansfield's 2<sup>nd</sup> Addition to Albion, Boone County, Nebraska, known as the Boone County Fitness Center, Inc. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Maricle acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to approve the County Board Proceedings of July 26, 2017 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The primary use of the Boone County Visitors Promotion Fund is to promote, encourage and attract visitors to come to the county through advertisement of the event. The Boone County Visitors Promotion Committee received a request for advertisement funding. The Albion Chamber of Commerce requested assistance to advertise the Rhythm & Ribs Competition event scheduled for August 26, 2017. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Maricle to approve the application requesting funding assistance for advertisement from the Visitor's Promotion Fund as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Maricle and Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Pat Boilesen, President, and Mary Jane Noble, Vice President, of the Boone County Historical Society, Inc., presented information regarding the increased activity at the Boone County Historical Society Museum facility and the facility utility expenses for the Board to review. Boilesen and Noble said that it is exciting to see an increase of people spending more time going through the museum buildings since the installation of a heat/cool system in 2016. The Historical Society has been operating with volunteers and donations since 2000. The County has helped with a portion of funding for the telephone and internet expenses since 2010. The museum building(s) received new roofing, paint and windows the past few years through grants, donations and County assistance. The installation of the heat/cool system is helping with the air control for preservation of the artifacts, which has increased the utility expenses that will probably not be covered by donations. The Boone County Historical Society, Inc. is submitting a preliminary budget request of \$8,500.00 levy allocation for the 2017-2018 fiscal year to cover estimated utility expenses. Noble informed the Board that Rick Martinsen, CPA, will be helping the Historical Society prepare a budget and meet county audit requirements. Noble and Boilesen thanked the Board for their support of the Boone County Historical Society Museum and consideration in regard of their budget request.

The Board and Tanya Sharp, Boone County Health Center Chief Executive Officer, interviewed applicants for the Boone County Health Center (BCHC) Board of Trustees on July 26, 2017. The Board of Commissioners tabled a decision to their July 30, 2017 board meeting. BCHC Board of Trustees members Don Casper and Paul Groeteke were present to discuss the number of board members to represent the BCHC Board of Trustees with the Board of Commissioners, Tanya Sharp and Dr. Anthony Kusek. Sharp said that the BCHC is the only facility in Nebraska that is currently represented by a seven- member board. The group held a lengthy discussion in regard to Sharp's recommendation to reduce the number of members on the BCHC Board of Trustees about a year and felt that a benefit to a five-member board would be efficiency.

Casper felt that there are difficulties at times to have a quorum with a larger board and that a five-member board should be sufficient. Groeteke felt that all communities are and could still be represented with a five-member board. Kusek felt that a five-member board would be sufficient. Commissioner Luettel felt that they went through the effort of advertising and interviewing applicants and that the timing is wrong to reduce from a seven-member board to a five-member board. Commissioner Maricle felt that with the administration changes at the BCHC, she would support what is recommended by the CEO for the board of trustees. Commissioner Rasmussen agreed that the timing is not perfect for the reduction of board members, but to consider what the new CEO feels is best in regard to board members. Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to approve and allow the Boone County Health Center Board of Trustees to change their bylaws from trustee representation of a seven-member board to a five-member board as requested. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: Luettel. Motion carried.

Richard Martinsen, CPA, Schmeits, Mueller & Martinsen, P. C., prepares the annual county budget and submitted a preliminary 2017-2018 budget for the Board to review. The Board and Martinsen discussed the preliminary 2017-2018 budget requests submitted by the county departments. The courthouse renovation bonds are retired. The Inheritance Tax Fund has been used for several years to reduce the county's property tax request, resulting in a low levy. The Noxious Weed budget has been a function within the County General Fund since 2010. The Noxious Weed budget is now a function within the County Road Fund as of February 2017 due to a full time position of County Weed Superintendent/Signage Technician. The preliminary expense requests submitted decreased \$28,585.00 from the prior fiscal year expense requests.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel to set the budget hearing for the Fiscal Year 2017-2018 County Budget on Monday, September 11, 2017 at 10:00 A.M. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Luettel and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Boone County Board of Commissioners Reorganizational meeting each January addresses the appointment of the Board members to various supervisory positions and representation on boards that the county is affiliated with throughout the year. The Boone County Board of Commissioners are also the Boone County Weed Board. The Board discussed the appointment of a member of the Boone County Weed Board as supervisor of the appointed Boone County Weed Superintendent. Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to appoint Ken Luettel as the County Weed Superintendent supervisor for 2017 and to fulfill the appointment to the 2018 Board of Commissioners Reorganizational meeting. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Rasmussen and Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried.

It shall also be the duty of the County Board of each county of this state to visit the jail of its county per Nebraska State Statute 47-109. The Board conducted a routine visit of the Boone County Jail per Nebraska State Statute.

- Mark Jensen, Boone County Planning and Zoning Board member, informed the Board that there is a vacancy on the County Zoning Board of Adjustments.
- Commissioner Maricle informed the Board that Dustin Will, Benefits Management, plans to re-visit with the Board this fall in regard to health insurance quotes.

The Board did not take up the agenda item relating to the county general assistance request at 9:30 A.M. because the person requesting the assistance did not appear.

### MINUTES OF PUBLIC HEARING PROCEEDINGS

Hilary K. Maricle, Chairman of the Boone County Board of Commissioners called for a motion to open a public hearing on Monday, August 14, 2017 at 11:00 A.M. in the Boone County Courthouse Commissioners Meeting Room in Albion, Nebraska. Motion made by Commissioner Luettel, second by Commissioner Rasmussen to open said public hearing. Notice of the hearing was given in advance by publication and the convened hearing was open to the public. Commissioners present for said public hearing were Ken Luettel, Alan Rasmussen and Hilary K. Maricle. Chairman Maricle read the notice for the record.

The County Board of Commissioners has power to lease real estate owned by the county, specifically Lots 6, 7, and 8, Block 9, Mansfield's Second Addition to Albion, Boone County, Nebraska. The County Board shall hold an open and public hearing in accordance with Nebraska State Statute 23-107.01 prior to any such lease at which any interested party may appear and speak for or against the lease and raise any issue(s) concerning the County Board leasing said property.

In accordance with Nebraska State Statute 23-107.01, real estate owned by the county; sale or lease; terms and procedures: any county board has power to sell or lease real estate owned by the county and not required for county purposes at a fair market value regardless of the value of the property. The county board of such county shall hold an open and public hearing prior to any such sale or lease at which any interested party may appear and speak for or against the sale or lease and raise any issue(s) regarding the fair market value of the property as determined by the county board. Public notice of any such public hearing shall be run once each week for two consecutive weeks prior to the hearing date in any newspaper or legal publication distributed general thought the county.

The County Board of Commissioners ran a public notice the weeks of July 31 and August 7, 2017, prior to the hearing date of August 14, 2017 in the Albion News newspaper in accordance with state statute to lease county owned real estate.

The following were present to voice their concern and oppose the leasing of the Boone County Fitness Center, Inc. (BCFC): Jeff Jarecki, Attorney representing Jay Wolf and BCFC; Jay Wolf, Wolf Foundation and BCFC board member; Anji Kendrick, BCFC Manager; Heather Rankin, BCFC board member; Melinda Johnson, BCFC Assistant Manager; Denny Johnson, Sheriff; Bryce Spann, BCFC board member and insurance provider; and Ed Knott and Tim Kayton, former BCFC board members.

Their opposition concerns to the government statutorily lease requirements is that the sealed bids are open to the general public and how the Board would explain to the public if the Board of Commissioners did not accept the highest bid. It was explained that the Board may advertise to reserve the right to reject any and all proposals received and to waive any informalities or technicalities. The Board is not obligated to accept the highest or lowest bid. If counties receive no bids or if the bids received are substantially lower than the fair market value, the County Board may negotiate a contract for lease of the real estate if such negotiated contract is in the best interests of the county.

Wolf said that the real estate was gifted to the County by his parents and that he felt the operation of the BCFC has worked well the past thirty years and that the BCFC is an asset to the community. BCFC wants to continue the successful relationship with the County. Wolf said that the Boone County Fitness Center, Inc. has adequate resources left by his parents, which is underwritten through the Wolf Foundation, to keep the BCFC operational for future years.



It was explained to those present that an entity reports business transactions under one federal identification number in regard to labor laws. The BCFC for several years has been reporting payroll under the County federal identification number and other operating expenses, etc. under a non-profit 501 (C)(3) federal identification number. The Board and BCFC held several discussions in 2016 regarding the payroll, audits and operation of the BCFC being reported under two separate federal identification numbers. The December 19, 2016 Board proceedings discussion references the ownership of the real estate, insurance coverage, lease agreement and operation/payroll changes effective January 1, 2017.

Kayton said that the BCFC is like the Boone County Health Center, the County owns the property. It was explained that the Health Center (medical facilities) are different as they are considered a separate political subdivision with separate governing state statutes. The BCFC is not a political subdivision.

Jarecki suggested an indemnification agreement between the County and BCFC instead of a lease agreement as discussed in December 2016. The Board informed Jarecki that they will not sign an agreement until it has been reviewed and agreed upon by Vince Valentino, Attorney at Law. The County signed an Agreement for Legal Services with Vince Valentino regarding the drafting of legal documents between the County of Boone, NE and BCFC. Jarecki has been asked by the Board to converse with Valentino and to have the County/BCFC documents ready to review for the September 27, 2017 Board meeting.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to close said hearing at 11:24 A.M. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to continue discussion with Boone County Fitness Center, Inc. and not move forward with an advertisement for lease bids on said property at this time. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Rasmussen and Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried.

#### BOONE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS AUGUST 21, 2017 ALBION, NEBRASKA

The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska, met in regular session at 9:00 A.M. on Monday, August 21, 2017, in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Chairman Maricle called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Hilary K. Maricle, Ken Luettel and Alan Rasmussen. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Maricle acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to approve the County Board Proceedings of August 14, 2017 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to approve the County Board Public Hearing Proceedings of August 14, 2017 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board discussed allowing the employee's time to view the total solar eclipse. The Board notified the public that the courthouse offices will not be available for normal business from 12:45 p.m. to 1:15 p.m. on August 21, 2017 to allow employees to view the solar eclipse. The Board said it is not considered a closing with locked courthouse doors, that it is a notification to the public that someone may not be available in an office during the advertised time frame. Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to allow the employee's time to view the solar eclipse between 12:45 p.m. to 1:15 p.m. on August 21, 2017. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Andy Devine, Albion City Administrator, Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc., and Rex Mahoney, Recreational Trails System Committee, presented information to the Board regarding a potential Boone County Recreational Trails System project. The Recreational Trails System Committee discussed a potential trails project with the Board on June 19, 2017. The trails committee presented a map of a proposed trail around the Albion City Park, County Fairgrounds and the County owned property south of the present fairgrounds. The trails committee presented the following:

- Phase 1 Project The Fairgrounds & Fuller Loop approximately 1.8 miles \$250,000.00 estimated project budget Goal is to start construction in 2018 utilizing local fundraising and local contractors.
- Project Entails: Complete a Fuller Park Loop and create a larger loop through and around Boone County Fairgrounds and then along the 8<sup>th</sup> Street new subdivision.
- Funding Plan: City is proposing to allocate \$45,000.00 of Capital Improvement Funds to the project; the trails committee is requesting that the County consider a similar commitment; remaining funds to be raised via the Big Give and facilitated by partnership with the Boone County Area Foundation Fund; and the trails committee recommends foregoing the Recreational Trails Program Grant that was previously discussed due to time, red-tape and additional costs associated with pursuing such grant.
- Upon successful fundraising stakeholders from the County, the City, and the Committee will coordinate and direct the placement and construction of this trail section.
- Future phases of the trail system may also be considered in the future, but the committee is not requesting financial commitment for such future phases from the County at this time.
- The Recreational Trails System Committee: Rex Mahoney, Jay Wolf, Chuck Rolf, Ben Edwards, Mollie Sullivan, Michelle Keele, Mitch Glesinger, Hilary Maricle and Andrew Devine.

The group discussed recent area surveys that indicated there is interest for an area for individuals to walk safely and to not be walking in the city/village streets. The proposed trail is for the area around the City of Albion Fuller Park and extending south along Eighth Street, thence west to connect to County property at the southeast corner of the property the County purchased in November 2016, running thence west to the Fairgrounds Road, thence North along the County property and County Fairgrounds property, thence East through the County Fairgrounds property to Fuller Park. Devine informed the Board that the trails committee is proposing the trail to be 6' wide concrete. Commissioner Luettel asked if they thought about starting the trail with cinder material and change over to concrete as the funds become available. The group said they were proposing concrete. The group discussed maintenance when there is inclement weather, upkeep/replacement of concrete and liability insurance. Devine said that the City of Albion is asking for a participation partner. Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to table a decision to the August 28, 2017 Board meeting. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Rasmussen and Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The primary use of the Boone County Visitors Promotion Fund is to promote, encourage and attract visitors to come to the county through advertisement of the event. The Boone County Visitors Promotion Committee received a request for advertisement funding. The Rae Valley Heritage Association, Inc. requested assistance to advertise the Nebraska State Antique Tractor and Horse Plowing Bee event scheduled for August 25-27, 2017. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to approve the application requesting funding assistance for advertisement from the Visitor's Promotion Fund as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Russell Stokes, Eric Petsche, Corey Strokes and Roger Beckman were present to discuss their concerns regarding the asphalt portion of a county road known as 145<sup>th</sup> Street west of Petersburg with the Board and Stacey Robinson, County Highway Superintendent. The Board heard similar concerns from the Petersburg Volunteer Fire Department/Rescue Squad on June 12, 2017 regarding the same portion of 145<sup>th</sup> Street. The group said that 145<sup>th</sup> Street west of Petersburg is a main route for areas west and northwest of Petersburg. The first mile of asphalt that is mostly in Petersburg village limits is in good condition with a thicker base and the remaining length of asphalt is what is in need of good repair. The asphalt has been ground up and relayed with armor coat over the years, but is not holding up with increased traffic, weight of trucks and farm equipment. Even with the asphalt portion being patched often it is still not holding up which makes for a dangerous road. The discussion the last few years has been to keep the first mile as asphalt and restore the rest of the asphalt to a solid gravel surface or to appropriate funds for the present asphalt portion of 145<sup>th</sup> Street for a five inch asphalt road to handle the weight of trucks and equipment. Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel to approve Stacey Robinson, County Highway Superintendent, to have an engineer study completed to determine costs and options for permanent repairs for the asphalt portion of 145<sup>th</sup> Street. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Luettel and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board held a meeting with the department heads:

- County officials/department heads reported on activities with regard to their respective office.
- Boone County Government Day has been changed to November 1, 2017.
- County Clerk reminded those present that the adopted Legislative Bills take effect on August 24, 2017, except the Bills passed with an emergency clause or specific operative date.
- 2017 Valuation Certifications have been delivered to the State of Nebraska and respective entities and shows a County valuation loss from previous year of \$13,835,719.00.
- The department heads present reviewed some of the County Employee/Employer Handbook changes that have been approved by the Board of Commissioners through the respective Board Proceedings since the approval of the newly revised handbook adopted in 2016. The 'Travel Expenses' Exhibit "F-1" in



the employee handbook was the main discussion. The County Handbook language updates are to be approved at a later date.

Laurie Krohn, County Treasurer, presented a quote from Applied Connective Technologies, LLC for two Dell OptiPlex 7450 All-in-One Non-Touch 23" Workstations with Microsoft wireless desktop set, office 365 business and quick books pro 2017 for \$2,793.50. Krohn informed the Board that the current units were purchased in 2012 and that they work together/share the same programming. One of the units has been needing technical service. Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to approve the quote of two Dell Workstations for the County Treasurer's office from Applied Connective Technologies for \$2,793.50 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The County budget document was prepared and filed with the Board on July 31, 2017 by Richard Martinsen, CPA. The fiscal year budget documents are to be filed with the County Board on or before August 1<sup>st</sup> each year. The Board discussed the respective office budget requests submitted for fiscal year 2017-2018 for possible adjustments with elected official(s) or department head(s) as requested. Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to correct the July 26, 2017 Board Proceedings motion by including the \$.44 per hour wage increase for permanent part-time, part-time and as needed employees all being effective December 22, 2017 to coincide with the 22/21 pay period. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Commissioner Luettel excused himself at 12:55 p.m. for a 1:00 p.m. medical appointment.

James Ely, County Attorney, asked to be placed on the Board agenda regarding 2017-2018 attorney's office budget. Ely did not file a preliminary budget with the Board by the July 31, 2017 Board meeting. The preliminary county budget on file included figures for a county attorney budget of \$97,701.00, more than the requested amount from the prior fiscal year. Ely submitted a budget request for \$109,675.48 on August 2, 2017. A quote of \$2,307.50 was submitted by Ely for a new Apple 27" iMac computer for his use for the Board to consider. Ely also submitted the following for the Board to review to support his request of a \$2.50 per hour wage increase for the office legal assistant vs. the \$.44 per hour January 2018 cost of living approved for county employees: letter of appreciation from U. S. Department of Justice for Pam's involvement from 2013-2017 of the Big Drive Cattle feedlot fraud case; replies from the survey sent to other Nebraska County Attorneys; base pay wage for starting new employees; letter from August 2014 former county attorney; and a revised January 2017 job description for a county attorney office legal assistance. The Board plans to review Ely's information and will be on the August 28, 2017 Board agenda.

The Board received the County Officers Inventories that have been filed for the close of the fiscal year end June 30, 2017. The Board plans to review the respective office inventories with the department heads this week.

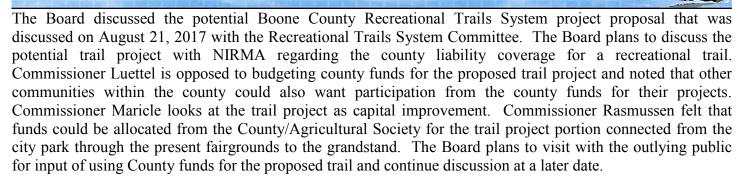

The Board, Bill Huey, Prochaska & Associates, and Denny Johnson, County Sheriff, were present to open and review the sealed bids for renovation of the Boone County Jail/Law Enforcement building at 9:30 A.M. on August 28, 2017. Three sealed bids were received for the advertised renovation of the Boone County Jail/Law Enforcement building. Bids were received from Integrated Construction Management Services, Inc. (ICMS) of Grand Island, Nebraska; Paladin, LLC of Omaha, Nebraska; and RaDec Construction Co., Inc. of Hartington, Nebraska. ICMS had a representative present for the bid opening. Huey informed the Board that when opening the bids the following should be enclosed: bid bond, acknowledgement of receiving addendums #1 & #2, construction calendar days, base bid price, alternate #1 detention door retrofit and additional under-slab compacted fill as required. The following base bids were received: ICMS - \$195,000.00; Paladin -\$225,000.00; and RaDec - \$172,700.00. The base bid figures do not include the bid quote for the alternate items. Huey informed the Board that the addendums were a result of questions after the walk-through of the present law enforcement building held on August 9, 2017 for interested contractors. Huey informed the Board that there were more contractors for the walk-through and less bids submitted for the project than expected. Huey said that typically general contractors like to bid against each other, whereas special authority bidding (example: detention industry) usually do not compete against each other. The group discussed the substantial differences in the bids. Huey explained the bidding process and asked that the Board table their decision today and recommended due diligence to make sure all bids are covering the same advertised construction phase and material. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to approve Resolution No. 2017-24, authorizing the levy allocation requests for the 2017-2018 fiscal year for the Albion, Cedar Rapids, Petersburg, Primrose and St. Edward Rural Fire Districts, Boone County Historical Society, Inc. as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Ed Knott, Applied Connective Technologies, LLC, and the Board discussed email security on June 28, 2017 and previous meetings. Knott prepared information and a subscription quote for the Board to review. The recommendation is to convert the county email subscription from the current POP3 solution to a Hosted Microsoft Exchange platform. Currently the POP3 mail cost with SPAM filtering is \$2.50/mo. per user with 200MB of mailbox storage. Due to even more security being needed, the POP3 type services are being phased out. The Hosted Exchange is a subscription based service at \$5.00/mo. per user with 50GB of storage. All existing messages, contacts and calendars would be moved to Hosted Exchange. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to approve the email subscription change from POP3 to Hosted Exchange and a fee of \$5.00/mo. per user with Applied Connective Technologies, LLC as presented. Roll call vote. Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Roberta Miksch and Caitlin Schneider, East-Central District Health Department (ECDHD), presented a report of public health activities in Boone County for January through June 2017. ECDHD has provided a number of different services to the residents of Boone County. Some of the services provided were: cancer prevention presentations, the WIC program and disease investigations. Miksch said that Boone County residents were assisted by Certified Application Counselors (CAC's) who assist people with applying for health care services and/or insurance. The CAC's are available at the Boone County Health Center on Thursday's to assist county residents.

Commissioner Alan Rasmussen excused himself due to illness at 10:35 A.M.

The Board and department heads discussed and reviewed County Employee Handbook changes/updates in regard to Catastrophic Illness Donation. Upon the termination/resignation/retirement of an employee, the remaining earned sick leave is a benefit that is not paid out. The Catastrophic Illness Donation Pool/Sick Leave will be updated to allow the unused sick leave of said employees to be automatically transferred to the pool beginning with those employees who were terminated, resigned or retired effective January 1, 2016 and subsequently thereafter. In addition, requests for sick hours from the pool shall be allowed to be submitted for consideration effective as of the August 22, 2017 payroll period. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to approve the updated change to the Catastrophic Illness Donation Pool/Sick Leave section of the Employee Handbook to automatically transfer any unused sick leave of employees terminated, resigned or retired as of January 1, 2016 and subsequently thereafter to the Catastrophic Illness Pool and to allow requests for leave to be submitted and considered effective with the August 22, 2017 payroll period. The Board and department heads have discussed and reviewed County Employee Handbook changes/updates in regard to Travel Expenses-Exhibit "F-1" during several Board meetings. The Travel Expenses-Exhibit "F-1" in the employee handbook will have several updates/changes to clarify mileage and meal reimbursement(s). Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel to approve the changes/updates to the County Employee Handbook Travel Expense-Exhibit "J" effective August 28, 2017. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle and Luettel. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

Jim Ely, County Attorney, and the Board continued the discussion of the County Attorney Office budget that was submitted and discussed at the August 21, 2017 Board meeting. Ely submitted the attorney office budget on August 2, 2017 at 2:00 p.m. The preliminary budget prepared by CPA firm in accordance with state statute is to be filed with the Board on or before August 1<sup>st</sup> each year. The prepared preliminary budget was submitted and filed at the July 31, 2017 Board meeting by Richard Martinsen, CPA. The county attorney office budget was addressed using the preliminary 2017-2018 requested budget amount of \$97,701.00 due to the county attorney office budget not being filed in accordance with state statute(s).



The 2016-2017 requested amount was \$97,253.00 with expenses of \$86,559.17. Ely's budget submitted on August 2, 2017 was for \$109,675.48. Ely and the Board held a lengthy discussion in regard to the documents he submitted on August 21, 2017 to support a \$2.50 per hour increase for the office assistant's wage in comparison to a cost of living approval of \$.44 per hour wage for county employees in January 2018.

Ely's proposed budget request of \$109,675.48 which is \$12,422.48 more than the 2016-2017 requested amount includes: \$5,000.00 for a new computer for his office and if any other new equipment is necessary; \$2,000.00 for lease payments for a new color copy machine; \$1,000.00 for a new chair for the office assistant; \$5,220.00 additional wage above the approved \$.44 per hour increase for the office assistant; and less \$797.52 for other budget line items. Following a lengthy discussion of the preparation of the county attorney office budget request, the pro and cons of salaries and the statutory budget deadlines, the Board adjusted the line amounts within the preliminary budget. Richard Martinsen, CPA, met with the Board to discuss the proposed fiscal year 2017-2018 County Budget. The proposed property tax request is \$3,606,824.00, which is a decrease from the 2016-2017 property tax request of \$3,635,029.00. The proposed 2017 county tax rate is 0.150708, which is different from the 2016 county tax rate of 0.151013. Martinsen provided answers to questions asked with regard to the proposed budget. The new 2017 Nebraska Legislation eliminates delinquent tax allowance unless Federal Prime Rate is Above 10%; eliminates budgeting for anticipated litigation claims (LB 432) and Highway Allocation is removed from Authority and removed from restricted funds listings (LB 382). In addition, (LB 51) impacts the county budget in regard to Interlocal Agreement report, budget hearing, audits and contracts. The group discussed the overall County valuation loss from the previous year of \$13,835,719.00, with the possibility of additional valuation loss next year. the Board following the July discussion. The Board did not receive an updated report from the requestor. The Board and Ex-officio Clerk of the District Court feel it is not necessary to approve a three year agreement with Sequoia Consulting Group at this time. A letter will be sent to Sequoia Consulting Group informing them that the Board is not interested in a three year agreement at this time.

Rod Nelson, Maintenance, and Denny Johnson, Sheriff, presented quotes regarding a new or used AED Defibrillator for the County Law Enforcement building. The quote presented for a used 2008 Phillips OnSite AED with no warranty is \$646.00 for the law enforcement building. The quote for five new HeartStart FRx Defibrillators with 8 year warranty is \$9,460.00, one for the law enforcement building and four for the sheriff patrol vehicles. The quote for one new HeartStart OnSite Defibrillator with a trade in of four used units is \$1,101.00 for the law enforcement building. The Board, Nelson and Johnson discussed the quotes and replacement of the AED Defibrillator(s). Johnson felt that there was a need to update/replace the defibrillator located in the law enforcement building and that it was not necessary at this time to place defibrillators in the patrol vehicles. Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel to approve the quote of \$1,101.00 from Lifeguard MD for a new HeartStart OnSite Defibrillator with 8 year warranty and trade in of four used units as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Luettel and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Rod Nelson, Maintenance, presented quotes for the Board to discuss and review regarding a refrigerator for the courthouse building. The present refrigerator was purchased used in 2007 and the ice maker is no longer working. Nelson received quotes from Ray's Appliance Sales and Service of Columbus, NE and Criss Company of Spalding, Nebraska Quotes for replacement of the side by side refrigerator were: Amana-\$1,099.00; Whirlpool-\$1,299.00; bottom mount freezer with dispenser will start at \$1,400.00 and up; and delivery-\$75.00. The price of refrigerator and delivery includes removal and disposal of old refrigerator and hookup water to existing supply line. Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to approve the purchase of a Whirlpool side by side new refrigerator for \$1,299.00 with no delivery charges from Criss Company of Spalding, Nebraska. Stacey Robinson, County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road/bridge maintenance, materials and bridge/culvert projects. In addition, the following topics were discussed:

Jerad Reimers, representative for Congressman Adrian Smith's office, updated the Board and those present of Congressman Smith's committee assignments and agricultural trade agreements. Reimers and the group discussed concerns regarding farm bill, crop insurance, maintain trade relations and tax cuts/post card filers inflationary tax. Reimers was available to visit with the public and hear their concerns.

Randall Bruland, County Ambulance Administrator, and the Board discussed service option quotes for the ambulance cot and power-load devise. Scott Pufahl, Stryker, was unable to attend the meeting. The Board and Bruland reviewed the one, four and seven year service plans. The Boone County Board of Commissioners created a new full time employee position by combining the County Weed Superintendent position with a new position of Sign Technician for the County Road Department



at their February 24, 2017 Board meeting. They approved the new position of County Weed Superintendent/Sign Technician effective March 1, 2017, with the position answering to the Board regarding the weed program and the Highway Superintendent regarding the signage program. The Noxious Weed Control budget is/was Function (733) within the County General Fund (0100) and in March 2017 with the new full time combined employee position the Noxious Weed Control/Sign Technician Function (733) is now within the County Road Fund (0200). The Boone County Board of Commissioners have determined that there is no longer a need to have the Noxious Weed Control Function (733) within the County General Fund (0100). Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to approve Resolution No. 2017-26, to close the Noxious Weed Control Function (733) within the County General Fund (0100) effective September 11, 2017. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Boone County Historical Society, Inc. requested a tax levy allocation for the Fiscal Year 2017-2018 for telephone, internet, utility expenses and building repair. The Boone County Board of Commissioners have determined that there is no longer a need to have the Historical Society Function (852) within the County General Fund (0100). The Boone County Board of Commissioners have authorized a levy allocation for the Boone County Historical Society, Inc. for the 2017-2018 fiscal year. Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to approve Resolution No. 2017-27, to close the Historical Society Function (852) within the County General Fund (0100) effective September 11, 2017. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Rasmussen and Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The County Budget Act (State Statute Section 23-904) requires a budget message to be completed by the budget making authority outlining the fiscal policy for the budget period. The budget message must include a list of all cash amounts being held by officials that do not appear in the County Treasurer's Office six month balance reports. The Board has approved and authorized accounts within County Offices to receive and disburse fees, etc. Some of the accounts balance to zero and some accounts have a beginning balance. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to approve Resolution No. 2017-28, authorizing the accounts within County Offices as stated in the resolution. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Nebraska Revised Statute 77-1601.02 provides that the property tax request for the prior year shall be the property tax request for the current year for purposes of the levy set by the County Board of Equalization unless the Governing Body of the County of Boone passes by a majority vote a resolution setting the tax request at a different amount. The Governing Body of the County of Boone, by a majority vote by the Boone County Board of Commissioners, resolves that: the 2017-2018 property tax request be set at \$3,606,824.00, which is different from the 2016-2017 property tax request of \$3,635,029.00; and the 2017 county tax rate is at 0.150708, which is different from the 2016 tax rate of 0.151013. Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to approve Resolution No. 2017-29 at the September 11, 2017 public hearing to adopt and approve the County Budget for 2017-2018 as published and presented with the above property tax requests. The public hearing was for the purpose of hearing support, opposition, criticism, suggestions or observations of taxpayers relating to the 2017-2018 Boone County proposed budget in compliance with the provisions of State Statute Sections 13-501 to 13-513. Also, to set the final tax request for the 2017-2018 Boone County proposed budget at a different amount than the prior year tax request in compliance with the provisions of State Statute Section 77-1601.02 The hearing was open for one hour and the proposed budget was published in the September 6, 2017 issue of the Albion News, Albion, Nebraska.

The County Board and those present for the hearing discussed with Martinsen the differences from last year's fiscal budget in the areas of asking dollars, land valuation, tax rate, property tax requirement and fund balances. Martinsen provided answers to questions asked with regard to the proposed budget and publication. The proposed property tax request for 2017-2018 is \$3,606,824.00, which is different from the 2016-2017 property tax request of \$3,635,029.00, being a decrease of \$28,205.00 from fiscal year 2016-2017. The proposed tax rate for 2017 of 0.150708 is lower than the 2016 tax rate of 0.151013. It takes a 75% vote to exceed the 2.5% lid limitation by an additional 1% budget authority growth. The levy authority of 50 cents includes the County levy and all the entities such as Agricultural/Historical Societies, Fire Districts, etc. added together. The County allowable levy limit is 45 cents of the 50 cents. The 2017 County valuation is \$2,393,259,621.00 compared to the 2016 valuation of \$2,407,095,340.00 a decrease of \$13,835,719.00. The majority of the County valuation decrease is in regard to Personal Property.

The adopted 2017-2018 County Budget has a tax request expense decrease from the 2016-2017 County Budget. The County of Boone, Nebraska financial contribution to the BCDA, Inc. is 80% of the corporation budget and is from the Inheritance Tax Fund, no longer from County General Fund.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to close said public hearing at 11:00 A.M. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Discussion: The county tax rate will be 0.150708. If it were not for the use of inheritance tax dollars, the county rate would be increased in order to maintain the current level of services that are both mandated under state law and that our county taxpayers deserve and expect.



Martinsen explained that Inheritance Tax funding is considered a local tax. Inheritance Tax funds stay in the respective county and benefit the respective county taxpayers with a lower property tax rate. If the legislature removes the Inheritance Tax funding, then the state and federal levels will receive the taxes generated from "Inheritance" and the local county level will need to increase their property tax rate to maintain mandated services.

The group discussed the overall County valuation loss from the previous year of \$13,835,719.00, with the possibility of additional valuation loss next year.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to approve, as presented, the Application for a Special Designated Liquor License request from Rae Valley Market LLC for a wedding reception at St. Bonaventure Church Hall, Raeville, Nebraska on October 28, 2017 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Rex Mahoney, Recreational Trails System Committee, and Tina Stokes, Big Give Committee, were present to ask the Board for their vote of support in regard to the fund-raising efforts and an application to the Lower Loup NRD for the funding of a potential Boone County Recreational Trails System project. The Recreational Trails System Committee discussed a potential trails project with the Board on June 19 and August 21, 2017. The trails committee presented a map of a proposed trail(s) around the Albion City Park, County Fairgrounds and the County owned property south of the present fairgrounds. Mahoney said that the Trails Committee is seeking grant funding from Lower Loup NRD. Stokes informed the Board that the trails project will be part of the 2017 Big Give in December to be known as the Boone County Trails System-Fairgrounds and Fuller Park Loop. The maintenance when there is inclement weather, upkeep/replacement of concrete, liability insurance and ownership agreement of the recreational trail will be discussed at a later date. Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel to approve allowing a citizens committee to raise funds for a Boone County Recreational Trails System and to build a walking trail on the property known as the Boone County Fairgrounds and County of Boone, Nebraska property connected to the south of the Boone County Fairgrounds. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Luettel and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board received a written resignation from a full time County Sheriff's office employee. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to accept the resignation of full time employee Shelby Hrabik effective October 6, 2017. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board and department heads present held a lengthy discussion with Benefit Management representatives. Dustin Will and Dan Duren are brokers for Benefit Management. Will and Duren presented information for those present to review and answered questions regarding other health insurance alternatives. They explained Health Savings Account and why employees were asked to fill out insurance questionnaire forms. In regard to health insurance, Nebraska considers a small employer with 49 employees and under and a large employer with more than 50 employees. A large group (50 and over) complete personal questionnaires for underwriters in order to obtain a health insurance quote. Will said that the goal is to find a sustainable plan that is beneficial to both the county and employees. Benefit Management representatives provided information regarding HSAs, Section 125 (flexible accounts) and answered several questions. The Board may have Benefit Management return at a later date to provide their information to all county employees. No action was taken at the meeting.

Jim Ely, County Attorney, presented information regarding a new color copy machine to replace the 2011 copy machine in the county attorney's office for the Board to review. Ely informed the Board that the price of a new color copy machine MX-3050N is \$6,600.00 and that he plans to lease a MX-3050N for 48 months at \$149.00/month. Ely said that there is no trade-in of the 2011 copy machine, because there's a possibility the sheriff's office plans to use the 2011 copy machine. Ely plans to sign a lease agreement upon delivery of the new copy machine from Eakes Office Solutions. Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to approve a 48 month lease at \$149.00/monthly payment for a new color copy machine for the County Attorney's office. Jim Ely, County Attorney, requested approval from the Board to allow him to receive assistance from Rodney Wetovick, Nance County Attorney, to help him defend a juvenile parental rights case. The Board asked Ely what Wetovick's attorney fees would be to help him with the case. Ely said he had no idea but figured top around \$2,000.00. Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to approve Rodney Wetovick, Nance County Attorney, to assist Boone County Attorney, Jim Ely, with a juvenile case. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Rasmussen and Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board, Bill Huey, Prochaska & Associates, and Denny Johnson, County Sheriff, were present at the August 28, 2017 Board meeting when the sealed bids for renovation of the Boone County Jail/Law Enforcement building were opened. Bill Huey, Prochaska & Associates, and Denny Johnson, County Sheriff, reviewed the three opened bids/recommendations for comparability of advertised construction phase and to make sure all bids are covering the same material. Huey submitted the recommendation of granting the bid to RaDec Construction Co., Inc. of Hartington, Nebraska. RaDec had submitted the lowest bid of the three bids received on August 28, 2017 for the advertised renovation of the Boone County Jail/Law Enforcement building. The Board and Huey discussed the possible changes and alterations of supplies that were quoted in the initial bidding. Engineering items that may be considered include the PVC pipe in lieu of cast-iron soil piping, PEX water piping in lieu of copper, clear sealer on floors and change all paint to water based paint system in lieu of an epoxy based system. The base bid was \$172,700.00 plus alternate #1 retrofit of detention doors of \$15,500.00 for a total of \$188,200.00. Huey said with the recap of addition/deletion changes, the project cost may possibly be \$153,108.00, which would be \$35,092.00 less than the original bid. Huey informed the Board that he would be responsible for contacting the three bidders regarding the Board's decision. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Luettel to award the renovation project of the Boone County Jail/Law Enforcement building to RaDec Construction Co., Inc. of Hartington, Nebraska for approximately \$188,200.00 dependent upon addition/deletion conditions. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Maricle acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to approve the County Payroll Claims filed for payment from the various funds: General \$95,523.53, BCBS \$51,758.56, Ameritas Ret \$6,613.41, EFTPS \$7,101.76, Section 125 Fees \$15.00, Wellness Program \$103.46; Road \$59,247.11, BCBS \$30,495.80, Ameritas Ret \$3,999.19, EFTPS \$4,470.03; Ambulance \$2,143.01, Ameritas Ret \$58.12, EFTPS \$163.95; and Public Defender Contract \$3,120.00. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to approve the County Board Proceedings of September 18, 2017 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to approve the County Board of Equalization Proceedings of September 18, 2017 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Rasmussen and Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Donny Baker, Farm 4 A Cure, Inc., presented an application for a Special Designated License (SDL) for September 30, 2017. The Board reviewed the application for a Special Designated License (SDL) for a cancer fundraiser event scheduled for Saturday, September 30, 2017 at 3386 360<sup>th</sup> Street, St. Edward, Nebraska. Baker informed the Board that the event includes several activities such as a silent auction, mud run and four bands. Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel to approve, as presented, the Application for a Special Designated Liquor License request from Donny Baker, Farm 4 A Cure, Inc., for a cancer fundraiser event on September 30, 2017 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Luettel and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Boone County Board of Commissioners, in accordance with Nebraska State Statute Chapter §23-107.01, real estate owned by county, held a public hearing on August 14, 2017. The County Board of Commissioners has power to lease or sell real estate owned by the county, specifically Lots 6, 7, and 8, Block 9, Mansfield's Second Addition to Albion, Boone County, Nebraska. Jeff Jarecki, Attorney representing Jay Wolf and Boone County Fitness Center (BCFC) board members, and BCFC employees expressed their concerns and opposition to a lease agreement. Jarecki suggested an indemnification agreement between the County and BCFC instead of a lease agreement as discussed in December 2016. The Board informed Jarecki that they will not sign an agreement until it has been reviewed and agreed upon by Vince Valentino, Attorney at Law. The County signed an Agreement for Legal Services with Vince Valentino regarding the drafting of legal documents between the County of Boone, NE and BCFC. The Board asked Jarecki to converse with Valentino and to have the County/BCFC documents ready to review for the September 27, 2017 Board meeting.



The following were present at the September 27, 2017 Board meeting regarding the leasing of the Boone County Fitness Center, Inc. (BCFC): Jeff Jarecki, Attorney representing Jay Wolf and BCFC; Jay Wolf, Wolf Foundation and BCFC board member; Anji Kendrick, BCFC Manager; Melinda Johnson, BCFC Assistant Manager; Denny Johnson, Sheriff; Bryce Spann, BCFC board member and insurance provider; David Skillstad, BCFC board member; Dennis Tyson, former BCFC board member; and Todd Kramer. Their opposition concerns to the government statutorily lease requirements were similar to what was expressed at the August 14, 2017 Public Hearing.

Valentino drafted a Lease and Bid Specification for Jarecki and the Board to review in accordance with state statute. Jarecki presented an Indemnification Agreement for the Board to review and sign. The Indemnifications Agreement was not forwarded to Valentino prior to the Board meeting for review.

The Board contacted Valentino by telephone during the Board meeting. Valentino explained to the group the statute that the county government entity needs to follow, the bid specifications are well written to limit it to an operator who is qualified, the Board can accept any bid, an agreement/lease may be for 1, 2, or 3 years due to one Board cannot bind a future Board and explained the process of a lease renewal at the end of the third year as a Board agenda item unless there is questionable changes in the operation of the facility. The Board, Jarecki and Valentino held a lengthy discussion exchanging questions and opinions.

Commissioner Luettel said that we have the information regarding state statutes, documents and dates in order to publish for bids. Commissioner Maricle felt that the Indemnification Agreement looks like a really good fit for Boone County. Commissioner Rasmussen said that he needed more time to review both documents. Commissioner Maricle asked that Valentino and Jarecki correspond with each other regarding what the County can or cannot do statutorily and agree on a document. The Board met with the Terry Baxter, NIRMA, Tom Smith, Region 44 Emergency Manager, Denny Johnson, County Sheriff, and Rod Nelson, Courthouse Maintenance, to discuss the security assessment conducted on May 23, 2017. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Maricle to come out of the executive session at 11:23 A.M. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Maricle and Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried. No action was taken by the Board at this time.

The Board discussed the County employee health insurance premiums at previous meetings. The Board approved NACO Benefits to provide a stand-alone BCBS Health Insurance quote through the employee application procedure at their May 30, 2017 Board meeting. Judd Allen, NACO Benefits representative, presented to the Board for their review the results of the application procedure for a stand-alone BCBS Health Insurance policy that was provided by the BCBS underwriters. The Board discussed the premium differences between the group policy and a stand-alone policy with Judd Allen. Allen answered the Board's questions in regard to health insurance policy upersions. Commissioner Maricle felt the Board did their due diligence in receiving comparable policy information. The Board expressed their appreciation to NACO Benefits for the work on the application process in order to obtain premium quotes. The Board may have NACO Benefits return in early November to conduct a health insurance policy education seminar with the county employees.

Dailey said that the pipe in the county road right-of-way would be trenched for approximately one mile and that they would tunnel bore under county roads in order not to disturb the road surface. Stacey Robinson, County Highway Superintendent, and Dan Stankoski, County General Road Foreman, physically viewed the area being discussed with Delmer Pelster. The lagoon is located in the NW1/4 of Section 2 and the property to receive the effluent would be the NW1/4 of Section 11, all in Township 21 North, Range 6 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska. Following the discussion the Board asked Dailey and Niewohner to bring back to the Board more information at a later date, after they call digger hot line to be sure of what is or is not in the one mile of the county road right-of-way and designate either east or west side of 260<sup>th</sup> Avenue for trenching in the county road right-of-way.

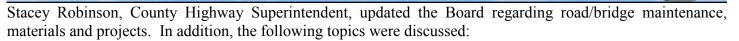


At their June 28, 2017 meeting, the Board made a motion to support the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. in moving forward to seek an architect/engineering firm to design a new building to replace the existing livestock facility located on the fairgrounds property. Due to a previous campaign project for an enclosed arena/multi-purpose proposed building for 7.5 million did not materialize the committee decided to down size the project and replace the existing arena and livestock building. Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc.; Kurt Kruse of Albion, Bill Robinson of Cedar Rapids, and Kevin Rasmussen of Albion, fairgrounds building committee; Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension; Andy Forney, D.A. Davidson & Co.; and Ryan D. Stearns, Joseph R. Hewgley and Associates, reviewed a proposed new livestock building for the Boone County Fairgrounds with the Board. The proposed all enclosed facility includes space of 220' x 250' for the UNL Extension office, a conference room, restrooms, concession stand, show arena, 100 large animal stalls, 100 small animal stalls. The approximate cost is 3.2 million and that does not include livestock panels, architect fees, etc. The plans would include a dirt floor for the show arena and concrete floor for the animal stalls. The building committee group plans to meet with the Board on Wednesday, October 25, 2017.

The Board contacted Vince Valentino by telephone during the Board meeting to continue their discussion with Jeff Jarecki, Attorney representing Boone County Fitness Center (BCFC), Jay Wolf, Anji Kendrick and Melinda Johnson, regarding Nebraska State Statute Chapter §23-107.01, real estate owned by county, specifically Lots 6, 7, and 8, Block 9, Mansfield's Second Addition to Albion, Boone County, Nebraska. Following a lengthy discussion at the September 27, 2017 Board meeting, the Board tabled a decision to their October 10, 2017 Board meeting. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to proceed in accordance with state statute and advertise to accept sealed bids for the following property to be operated and leased as a fitness center: Lots 6, 7 and 8, Block 9 Mansfield's Second Addition to Albion, Boone County, Nebraska to be opened on Wednesday, October 25, 2017. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

David Merrell, requested permission to trench an electrical line across a county road commonly known as 290<sup>th</sup> Avenue running north and south between the SE1/4 of Section 31 and the SW1/4 of Section 32, all in Township 19, Range 5 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska. The electrical line will commence from a power pole located in the SE1/4 of Section 31, thence running east to a bin to be located in the SW1/4 of Section 32, all in Township 19 North, Range 5 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to approve Resolution No. 2017-36, granting permission to David Merrell to trench an electrical line across a county road known as 290<sup>th</sup> Avenue to a bin to be located in the SW1/4 of Section 32, Township 19 North, Range 5 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska, as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Stacey Robinson, County Highway Superintendent, submitted an agreement for the Board to review regarding the State of Nebraska, Department of Transportation Project Number STP-56-5(107). The State intends to construct a Federal-Aid Resurfacing, Restoration, and Rehabilitation project along a portion of State Highway N-56 between Cedar Rapids and St. Edward. The State plans to remove and replace the existing bridge. Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel to approve Resolution No. 2017-37 and authorize the Board Chairman to execute the agreement with the State of Nebraska, Department of Transportation, for Project Number STP-56-5(107) as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Luettel and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The firm of Schumacher, Smejkal, Brockhaus & Herley, P. C. of Norfolk, Nebraska are providing audit services for the County of Boone, Nebraska's fiscal year end June 30, 2017. A Business Associate Agreement between Schumacher, Smejkal, Brockhaus & Herley, P. C. and County of Boone, Nebraska was submitted for the Board to review. The Business Associate Agreement is for the purposes of complying with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPPA). The Board and Recreation Trails System Committee discussed maintenance when there is inclement weather, upkeep/replacement of concrete, liability insurance and ownership agreement of the recreational trail at prior meetings with decisions to be made at a later date. The Board discussed funding for the Boone County Recreational Trails System and the Boone County Board of Commissioners do not plan to contribute tax funds for the trail project.



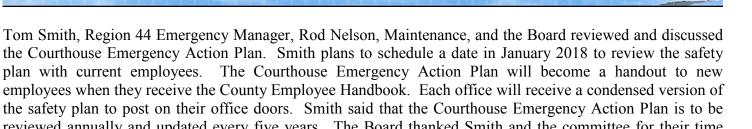
The Board approved allowing a citizens committee to raise funds for a Boone County Recreational Trails System and to build a walking trail on the property known as the Boone County Fairgrounds and County of Boone, Nebraska property connected to the south of the Boone County Fairgrounds at their September 18, 2017 Board meeting. The trails project will be part of the 2017 Big Give in December to be known as the Boone County Trails System-Fairgrounds and Fuller Park Loop. The Board received information that the Nebraska Community Foundation wants an edited Board motion in order to open the sub account for the 2017 Big Give trails project. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Maricle to not contribute tax funding to the Boone County Recreational Trails System, but to approve the construction of a Boone County Recreational Trails System on the County of Boone, Nebraska property to be located on a fractional part of the NE1/4 of Section 28, Township 20 North, Range 6 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska presently referred to as the county fairgrounds and the cropland acreage south of the present fairgrounds, with such improvements to be owned and maintained by the County of Boone, Nebraska subject to a group of citizens raising sufficient funds for construction of the improvements. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Maricle and Luettel. Nays: None.

Jack Dailey and Mark Niewohner met with the Board to discuss their concerns in regard to Zoning Conditional Use Permit applications for residential housing/acreages in the A-1, Agricultural Primary District (A-1 Zones). The Board is faced with four Zoning Conditional Use Permit Application Public Hearings today in regard to residential property in the A-1, Agricultural Primary District. Dailey asked the Board if the County Zoning Comprehensive Plan is for guidelines or regulations that are to be enforced and followed. Dailey said that the purpose of the A-1 Zones is to protect agriculture and allowing all the conditional uses for residential dwellings limits agricultural operations and expansion. Niewohner said that we are not opposed to any of these specific proposals we just want protection for agricultural uses in the A-1 Zones and that agriculture is the main resource for Boone County, Nebraska. Mark Wagner, County Planning and Zoning Commission Board member, informed the group that the push is to have the new residential housing built in the A-2, Agricultural Secondary District. Wagner pointed out that the County Zoning Comprehensive Plan allows twenty acres to be sold/split off in the A-1 Zones and that any acreage less than the twenty acres needs an application for a waiver through the Conditional Use Permit process. In addition, the current regulations require rectangular shaped lot splits and that this requirement has not been enforced in the past, but is still part of the regulations. Discussion included that if the Conditional Use Permit rectangular shape requirement is not going to be enforced, then the shape requirement should be eliminated from the regulations. Commissioner Maricle distributed zoning information for the Board and interested individuals to review from the counties of Adams, Cuming and Knox and a March 20, 2008 study by Chris Henry, Extension Engineer, University of Nebraska, regarding the impact of arbitrary setback distances on the land available for livestock siting and expansion. The group discussed what zoning regulation formality could be used in going forward to capture both livestock and residential development in order to stay ahead/continue the growth of the County both residentially and agriculturally, but still protect the livestock growth. The Board plans to seek a legal opinion in regard to applicants being required to sign waivers/easements and if such document(s) are enforceable and binding to the real estate.

Maurice R. Palmer, Trustee, is the property owner of the real estate referenced herein. The application request is to divide  $5.67\pm$  acres from a parcel of farm land to residential located in a fraction of the N1/2 of the NE1/4 of Section 34, Township 19 North, Range 6 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska.

Alison Kuester explained to the Board that the purpose for dividing the  $5.67\pm$  acres from the farm land is to move back to the rural life to construct a new residential home on family property. A survey for  $5.67\pm$  acres is completed. The Board asked why the divided acreage did not appear to meet the rectangular shape within the County Zoning regulations. Kuester said no particular reason just chose a spot close to highway access and left the rest as farm/pasture land. The Boone County Planning and Zoning regulations require conditional use permits in order to split off any parcels of less than 20 acres within the A-1, Agricultural Primary District, which gives priority to agricultural land uses. Wagner pointed out that the current regulations require rectangular shaped lot splits and that this requirement has not been enforced in the past, but is still part of the regulations.

The group discussed several items regarding the Boone County Zoning Comprehensive Plan and the Zoning Conditional Use Permits. Some of the issues discussed were minimum lot sizes, proximity of other houses and allowable housing density in the A-1 Agricultural Primary District, lower interest rates in the secondary mortgage market for smaller acreages with residential dwellings, the need to capture developments in agriculture and housing to keep the county progressing, possibility of enforceable waivers/easement requirement to be signed in regard to residential acreages in agricultural surroundings, more clarity in zoning regulations for applicants, the past approved Conditional Use Permit applications has set a precedence and the county needs to decide on the zoning regulations and stick with the decision. - Robinson informed the Board of the action taken regarding an ongoing driveway issue in the county road right-of-way west of Albion.
- Robinson and the Board discussed disposal procedure(s) of road equipment.
- Robinson and the Board discussed the condition of the asphalt portion of a county road known as 145<sup>th</sup> Street west of Petersburg.
- Robinson informed the Board that the county road employees will be attending a Nebraska Local Technical Assistance Program (LTAP) sponsored snow removal training in Norfolk on Monday, October 30, 2017.
- Robinson and the Board discussed the information they have received in regard to a recent inquiry of the possibility to obtain an easement from the County to transfer lagoon effluent by pipe to be buried in a county road right-of-way to an irrigation pivot and possibly a natural gas line in the same trench. The Board said that they have received several calls asking the Board not to allow such buried pipe in the county road right-of-way(s). Robinson has visited with DEQ, NIRMA and other counties in regard to the request. The information received from the research was not favorable for the County to allow said buried pipe transporting effluent in the County road right-of-way(s) due to liability risks. In addition, permission through a signed document will be needed from the adjacent landowners to the County road right-of-way(s) that a buried pipe would be placed in.



At their June 28, 2017 meeting, the Board made a motion to support the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. in moving forward to seek an architect/engineering firm to design a new building to replace the existing livestock facility located on the fairgrounds property. At their October 10, 2017 meeting, the Board; Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc.; Kurt Kruse of Albion, Bill Robinson of Cedar Rapids, and Kevin Rasmussen of Albion, fairgrounds building committee; Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension; Andy Forney, D.A. Davidson & Co.; and Ryan D. Stearns, Joseph R. Hewgley and Associates, reviewed a proposed new livestock building for the Boone County Fairgrounds to replace the existing arena and livestock facility. The proposed all enclosed facility includes space of 220' x 250' for the UNL Extension office, a conference room, restrooms, concession stand, show arena, 100 large animal stalls, 100 small animal stalls. The plans would include a dirt floor for the show arena and concrete floor for the animal stalls. The Board received a resolution as an agenda item to discuss at their October 25, 2017 meeting, authorizing the issuance of limited tax building bonds for the purpose of a new county owned livestock building for the Boone County Fairgrounds as an agenda item. The Board; Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc.; Kurt Kruse of Albion, Bill Robinson of Cedar Rapids, and Kevin Rasmussen of Albion, fairgrounds building committee; Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension; Josephine Weltruski, Boone County Extension office; Kristine Schrad, Boone County 4-H Council; Karen Benes; Andy Forney, D.A. Davidson & Co.; Ryan D. Stearns, Joseph R. Hewgley and Associates; and by telephone Mike Rogers, Gilmore & Bell, held a lengthy discussion regarding the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. and fairgrounds building committee request to build a new building to replace the present livestock facility.

The group discussed the issuance of bonds upon the taxable property in the County to build a new proposed building at the fairgrounds to be known as the Agricultural and Educational Activities Building. The group discussed other possibilities of funds, grants and fund raising events for the new building to help offset the project from being all funded through tax bonding. In accordance with State Statute the County of Boone, Nebraska (Board of Commissioners) would need to approve the issuance of tax bonds for the new building, the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. cannot issue bonds statutorily. The Board asked that there be a general public meeting outside the Board of Commissioners meeting for the public to have input and to answer questions. ### MINUTES OF PUBLIC HEARING PROCEEDINGS COUNTY ROAD VACATION

Hilary K. Maricle, Chairman of the Boone County Board of Commissioners, called for a motion to open a public hearing on Wednesday, October 25, 2017 at 10:00 A.M. in the Boone County Courthouse Commissioners Meeting Room in Albion, Nebraska. Notice of the hearing was given in advance by publication and the convened hearing was open to the public. Motion made by Commissioner Luettel, second by Commissioner Rasmussen to open said public hearing. Present for roll call were Commissioners Ken Luettel, Alan Rasmussen, Hilary K. Maricle and Stacey Robinson, County Highway Superintendent.

The purpose of the public hearing was to hear testimony in favor of, opposition to, and to answer questions in relation thereto the proposed vacation of a portion of county road:

• A portion of a county road known as 190<sup>th</sup> Street, commencing at the SW corner of the SW1/4 of Section 14 and the NW corner of the NW1/4 of Section 23, all in Township 21 North, Range 6 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska, running thence east one-half (1/2) mile.

Stacey Robinson, County Highway Superintendent, had previously submitted a written feasibility study for the Board's review dated September 27, 2017 recommending that said portion of county road known as 190<sup>th</sup> Street be officially vacated, with all right-of-way rights to be relinquished and shall revert to the owners of the adjacent real estate, one-half on each side thereof, with the understanding that all utilities with assets that may be affected by this vacation continue to have full access to their property. This portion of road is classified as a minimum maintenance road in the county's current inventory with the Nebraska Department of Roads. The one-half (1/2) mile of road appears to be used heavily as a main travel artery for the landowner(s). The maintenance that is required for said portion of road is greater than what the county can provide because the road is classified as a minimum maintenance road. There are definite safety concerns for the general public, employees of the company and safety of the motor grader operator. It does not appear that vacating said road will land lock any landowners in this section. Robinson visited with the adjacent landowner and said that they have no problem with recommendation to vacate said portion of road. No opposition was received at the hearing.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to close said hearing at 11:00 A.M. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to officially vacate said portion of 190<sup>th</sup> Street, commencing at the SW corner of the SW1/4 of Section 14 and the NW corner of the NW1/4 of Section 23, all in Township 21 North, Range 6 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska, running thence east one-half (1/2) mile, with all right-of-way rights to be relinquished and shall revert to the owners of the adjacent real estate, one-half on each side thereof, with the understanding that all utilities with assets that may be affected by this vacation continue to have full access to their property. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.





BOONE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS OCTOBER 30, 2017 ALBION, NEBRASKA

The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska, met in regular session at 9:00 A.M. on Monday, October 30, 2017, in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Chairman Maricle called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Hilary K. Maricle, Ken Luettel and Alan Rasmussen. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Maricle acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel to approve the County Board Proceedings of October 25, 2017 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Luettel and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to approve the County Board Road Public Hearing Proceedings of October 25, 2017 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to approve Resolution No. 2017-46, vacation of a portion of a county road known as 190<sup>th</sup> Street. This resolution follows the public hearing held on October 25, 2017 at which time no opposition was received. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Mary Ziemba, County Zoning Administrator, presented a Resolution No. 2017-47, to place a moratorium on any new conditional use applications for small parcel splits in the A-1 Agricultural-Primary District, from October 31, 2017 through January 31, 2018 and/or until such time the approval of the new and/or revised zoning regulations are finalized by a vote of approval and signed by the Boone County Commissioners. Ziemba indicated that it would be best to work on the implementation of new and/or revised regulations without the threat of new applications. Ziemba said that the matter would be on the Planning & Zoning Commission agenda for November 27, 2017. This moratorium would not affect the A-2 District. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to approve Resolution 2017-47, placing a moratorium on any new small parcel split conditional use applications effective October 31, 2017 through January 31, 2018 and/or until such time the approval of the new and/or revised zoning regulations are finalized. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

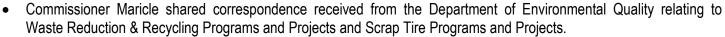
Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to approve the Material Testing Proposal with Thiele Geotech Inc. regarding 145th Street, Petersburg, Nebraska. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Discussion was held with regard to the subdivision approval of Fairgrounds 1st Subdivision and subsequent conveyance of part of the property to the City of Albion, Nebraska. The Board was concerned regarding water right to the fairgrounds buildings and museum. Commissioner Luettel indicated that he would talk to the City Administrator regarding a possible written agreement concerning these matters prior to conveyance of the real estate. Commissioner Maricle indicated that she would be attending the Albion Planning Commission meeting on November 6, 2017. It was noted that Chris Hays, County Surveyor, also would be present at the meeting.

It shall also be the duty of the County Board of each county of this state to visit the jail of its county per Nebraska State Statute 47-109. The Board conducted a routine visit of the Boone County Jail per Nebraska State Statute.

Public Comments:





- Commissioner Maricle indicated that notification was received from the Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice that the annual jail inspection will be held on November 20, 2017.
- After speaking with Sheriff Denny Johnson, it was noted that a NIRMA Assist Grant was submitted.
- Commissioner Maricle reported that the Emergency Management Meeting for Region 44 Commissioners has been postponed from November to December. An exact date in December is yet to be determined.
- Commissioner Luettel indicated that he had received feedback regarding the fire drill held on October 26, 2017. Further discussions regarding the fire drill will continue with the Emergency Manager when he submits his report.
- Commissioner Rasmussen indicated that he spoke with Rex Mahoney, a member of the trails committee, and that notification has been received that an NRD grant has been approved for the project.
- Commissioner Luettel noted that Stacey Robinson, County Highway Superintendent, and all road employees were taking part in LTAP training in Norfolk which included instruction in snow removal.
- Steve Pritchard, County Extension Agent, reported to the Board the progress being made regarding the upcoming County Government Day on November 8, 2017.

The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska, met in regular session at 9:01 A.M. on Monday, November 13, 2017, in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Chairman Maricle called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Hilary K. Maricle, Ken Luettel and Alan Rasmussen. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Maricle acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to approve the County Board Proceedings of October 30, 2017 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed and discussed the Accounts Payable Vendor Claims filed for payment from the various funds. The Board reviewed an Accounts Payable Vendor ID No. 1077 for \$222.25, for meeting mileage and meal reimbursement requests. The Boone County Employee Handbook addresses Travel Expense. The Board decided that the submitted evening meal ticket of \$22.03 did not qualify for reimbursement. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to partially deny \$22.03 submitted for reimbursement from the General Fund on Vendor ID No. 1077 and approve the Accounts Payable Vendor Claims filed for payment from the various funds as follows: General - \$42,597.69; Road/Weed - \$137,675.43; County Visitors Promotion - \$659.20; Inheritance Tax - \$52,892.40; 911 Emergency Management (2910) - \$502.34; 911 Wireless Services (2913) - \$672.48; Ambulance - \$1,280.13. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to approve the following reports of the County Officials as presented for October 2017:

The Clerk's office was approached by courthouse employees to ask the Board if a Christmas tree may be purchased for the courthouse building. The Board discussed the request and the consensus of the Board is to allow up to \$250.00 for a Christmas tree/lights for the courthouse building.

The State of Nebraska, Department of Roads needs the county board to designate the official county newspaper(s) in order to comply with the state statute when advertising their projects for bids in the county. The Cedar Rapids Press no longer has their legal status. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to designate the official county newspapers for 2018 to include the Albion News, Petersburg Press and The St. Edward Advance. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.



The Boone County Board of Commissioners accepted a three year renewable lease bid with an annual rental of One Dollar (\$1.00) from Boone County Fitness Center, Inc., at their meeting on October 25, 2017 with the terms of the Lease to be finalized on November 13, 2017, for the following property owned by the county to be operated and leased as a fitness center, specifically Lots 6, 7, and 8, Block 9, Mansfield's Second Addition to Albion, Boone County, Nebraska. Jay Wolf, representing Boone County Fitness Center, Inc., was present at the Board meeting. The Board contacted Larry Pelan, NIRMA, by telephone during the Board meeting to discuss changes within the Lease to items 8, 10 & 11. The Board, Pelan and Wolf discussed the changes that NIRMA will approve. Wolf said that the Boone County Fitness Center Board meeting to review/sign the Lease is scheduled for December 12, 2017. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Maricle to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Lease by and between the County of Boone, Nebraska and Boone County Fitness Center, Inc. with the changes as discussed with NIRMA. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Maricle and Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Laurie Krohn, County Treasurer, submitted a Distress Warrant Report for the Board to review. There were eight distress warrants delivered to the Boone County Sheriff on November 1, 2017 for collection of unpaid 2016 personal property taxes. The amount of uncollected 2016 personal property taxes, not including penalties is \$2,835.39. The total to be collected on distress warrants, with penalties is \$2,962.78. Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to accept and approve the County Treasurer's Distress Warrant Report as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The primary use of the Boone County Visitors Promotion Fund is to promote, encourage and attract visitors to come to the county through advertisement of the event. The Boone County Visitors Promotion Committee received four requests for advertisement funding.

The Albion Area Arts Council requested assistance to advertise the String Beans concert scheduled for December 2, 2017. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to approve the application requesting funding assistance for advertisement from the Visitor's Promotion Fund as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Albion Area Arts Council requested assistance to advertise the Jerry Barlow concert scheduled for December 10, 2017. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Maricle to approve the application requesting funding assistance for advertisement from the Visitor's Promotion Fund as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Maricle and Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Boone County Historical Society, Inc. requested assistance to advertise the Boone County Historical Society, Inc. (museum fundraiser) open house and music by area musicians scheduled for December 1, 2017. Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel to approve the application requesting funding assistance for advertisement from the Visitor's Promotion Fund as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Luettel and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Boone County Historical Society, Inc. requested assistance for printing of new museum brochures for distribution. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to deny the application requesting funding assistance for printing of museum brochures based on the recommendation of the Visitor's Promotion Committee that printing of brochures does not qualify as an event. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.





An annual certification of a County Highway Superintendent is due each year by December 31<sup>st</sup> to the Nebraska Department of Roads per Nebraska Revised Statutes §39-2501 through §39-2505. The performance of the duties listed in the certification determines federal highway allocation funds incentive payments. Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Certification for the Nebraska Department of Roads of Stacey L. Robinson, Boone County Highway Superintendent, for the calendar year 2017 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Rasmussen and Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Stacey Robinson, County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road equipment repair/replacement, road/bridge maintenance, materials and projects. In addition, the following topics were discussed:

- Robinson and the Board discussed necessary repairs to the county road shop buildings located in Albion, Cedar Rapids and Petersburg.
- Robinson and the Board discussed the installation of the new waste oil burner in the road shop building located in Albion.
- Robinson and the Board discussed low water crossing markings, maintenance and documentation.

Denny Johnson, Sheriff, was unable to attend the Board meeting for the agenda item #12. Rod Nelson, Maintenance, and the Board discussed courthouse security. No action was taken.

At their June 28, 2017 meeting, the Board made a motion to support the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. in moving forward to seek an architect/engineering firm to design a new building to replace the existing livestock facility located on the fairgrounds property. At their October 10, 2017 meeting, the Board; Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc.; Kurt Kruse of Albion, Bill Robinson of Cedar Rapids, and Kevin Rasmussen of Albion, fairgrounds building committee; Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension; Andy Forney, D.A. Davidson & Co.; and Ryan D. Stearns, Joseph R. Hewgley and Associates, reviewed a proposed new livestock building for the Boone County Fairgrounds to replace the existing arena and livestock facility. At their October 25, 2017 meeting, the Board received a resolution as an agenda item to discuss authorizing the issuance of limited tax building bonds for the purpose of a new county owned livestock building for the Boone County Fairgrounds not to exceed \$4,250,000.00. The Board; Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc.; Kurt Kruse of Albion, Bill Robinson of Cedar Rapids, and Kevin Rasmussen of Albion, fairgrounds building committee; Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension; Josephine Weltruski, Boone County Extension office; Kristine Schrad, Boone County 4-H Council; Karen Benes; Andy Forney, D.A. Davidson & Co.; Ryan D. Stearns, Joseph R. Hewgley and Associates; and by telephone Mike Rogers, Gilmore & Bell, held a lengthy discussion regarding the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. and fairgrounds building committee's request to build a new building to replace the present livestock facility.

The Board received a revised resolution as an agenda item to discuss at their November 13, 2017 meeting, authorizing the issuance of limited tax building bonds for the purpose of a new county owned Agricultural and Educational Activities Building for the Boone County Fairgrounds. The Board; Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc.; Kurt Kruse of Albion and Bill Robinson of Cedar Rapids, fairgrounds building committee; Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension; Josephine Weltruski, Boone County Extension office; and Kristine Schrad, Boone County 4-H Council continued the lengthy discussion from the prior Board meetings regarding the new fairgrounds building project. Chuck Rolf said that the initial proposed building size has been changed to add fifty feet of length to the building, while eliminating the concrete floor under the large animal pen spaces,



for about the same approximate total cost of \$4,250,000.00. The additional feet would make the arena more useable for horse show/events, such as barrel racing that require more space.

The proposed building size of 150 feet by 300 feet includes space for a show arena with dirt floor; pen space with dirt floor for 100 large animals; pen space with concrete floor for 100 small animals; two wash stations; portable pen panels; portable bleachers; insulated roof and walls and large ceiling fans to provide air movement. In addition, the proposed office area size of 70 feet by 150 feet to be located on the main entrance side of the building includes office area for UNL Extension; conference room; multi-use concession stand; restrooms; and this area will be heated and cooled for year-round use.

The Board had asked the fairgrounds building committee to prepare an informational brochure regarding the project. The following information was prepared and submitted to the Board:

- The current 80 plus year old facilities have limited use (show ring is not well lighted, not ADA accessible, un-safe when showing larger classes of livestock). Stall barn has narrow alleys that are unsafe when moving animals amongst the public, inadequate electrical power and outlets for modern show needs, and the building has spreading foundations. Currently large animals are stalled in two locations.
- The proposed location of the new facility allows the current outdoor arena to remain in place along with the concession stand/restrooms for the outdoor arena. Removal of the present show ring building and west livestock building creates additional parking in an area that has shade trees.
- The facility can accommodate 100 plus large animal stalls and 100 small animal pens including two wash stations accessible from inside the building. The entire new building will have maximum insulated roof and walls plus large ceiling fans that will provide air movement along with exhaust fans to aid in humidity control in the livestock area.
- A multi-use concession stand is located near the arena designed with serving capabilities to inside or outside events. The main show concession area and office space will be climate controlled with heating and air conditioning providing utilization throughout the year.
- Locating the Extension Office on site allows critical office and storage space needed in the Courthouse. It will also allow easy access for all Extension programs and activities that take place at the fairgrounds. Easy access and a large parking area contribute to the possibility of enticing events. Also, easy access to both the Boone County Event Center and the Casey Building provide additional classroom/meeting areas, if needed.
- The new facility provides the space, amenities and year-around-use options to host many events in our community, in addition to the usual county fair events. Examples of events include: livestock production sales, team penning's, bull rides, horse shows, machinery shows/auctions, small animal shows, cattle events, regional FFA events, Ag shows, 4-H shooting sports meetings/events, and car shows.

Commissioner Maricle and Rolf shared the information they received from visiting with representatives in Merrick County regarding their new fairgrounds building that is similar to the proposed building for Boone County. Merrick County has an electronic keypad for arena users to check in and out; the arena users pay an annual membership; there is a daily arena user fee for non-members; and the scheduling is handled by a web based calendar. Merrick held informational public meetings in each of their towns for public input in regard to their new facility before a final building/financial decision. The Board felt that informational public meetings



should be held in each of the towns. Robinson said it is a waste of time to have area meetings and that the Board is the steward of the tax payers funds.

The actual cost of the proposed building has not been determined yet. The group discussed some options when determining ways to finance the project. The Boone County Board of Commissioners have the authority to issue County of Boone, Nebraska limited tax building bonds without the vote of the people for a set amount of years not to exceed twenty years. The Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. cannot issue limited tax building bonds statutorily. Also, in accordance with State Statutes the Boone County Board of Commissioners have the authority to approve/allow the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. budget to levy an additional Building Levy of three and five-tenths cents on each one hundred dollars of taxable valuation, or any part thereof, separate from their general operation levy. In addition, the group discussed the possibility of fund drives, grants and private donations to help offset the full funding of the project. The Board of Commissioners have discussed an appropriation of \$1,300,000.00 from the County Inheritance Tax Fund for the project, leaving \$2,950,000.00 to bond or levy. If the County issues bonds for the project, the building becomes County owned until the bonds are paid. If the Agricultural Society budget institutes a building fund levy they pay on a loan for a set number of years.

Robinson and Kruse asked the Board to approve a commitment to the project so that the committee and Agricultural Society could move forward. Robinson said that at the prior meetings Andy Forney, D.A. Davidson & Co., said that the document is a "Parameters Resolution" and that if the Board decides not to issue limited tax building bonds they can rescind the resolution. The Board decided to hold one informational public meeting regarding the new fairgrounds building to be known as the Agricultural and Educational Activities Building on Wednesday, December 6, 2017 at 7:30 P.M. at the Albion Country Club. The Board will make a decision in regard to the funding of the project following more informational research and the public informational meeting.

Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Maricle to approve Resolution No. 2017-48, known as a parameters resolution, authorizing the issuance, sale and delivery of limited tax building bonds of the County of Boone, Nebraska in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$2,950,000.00 for the purpose of constructing, equipping and making site preparations for a building owned by the county and initially to be used as an Agricultural and Educational Activities Building for the County as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Maricle and Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Public Comments:

- Commissioner Maricle updated the Board regarding the vision meeting held by BCDA, Inc.
- Meetings: Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. November 20, 2017; Fairgrounds building committee meeting December 4, 2017; and Informational public meeting for a proposed new Boone County Fairgrounds Agricultural and Educational Activities Building December 6, 2017.
- The Board extends an appreciation and thank you to the Boone County American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary for the Boone County Government Day event held on Wednesday, November 8, 2017.

Chairman Maricle declared the meeting adjourned at 1:14 P.M., with the next Board meeting scheduled for Monday, November 20, 2017.

#### BOONE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS NOVEMBER 20, 2017 ALBION, NEBRASKA

The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska, met in regular session at 9:00 A.M. on Monday, November 20, 2017, in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Chairman Maricle called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Hilary K. Maricle, Alan Rasmussen and Ken Luettel. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Maricle acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

The County Safety Committee met at 9:00 A.M. to discuss routine business. The following committee members were present for the quarterly meeting: Commissioners Alan Rasmussen, Hilary K. Maricle, and Ken Luettel, Denny Johnson, Laurie Krohn, Rod Nelson, Tom Smith and Kathy Thorberg. Nelson addressed old business regarding the county safety assessment meeting held with Terry Baxter, NIRMA Safety Specialist; solar eclipse observed in August; and courthouse fire evacuation drill in October. The courthouse fire drill went fairly well, as some of the employee participants did not join the briefing and discussion. Smith said that the employees that joined the briefing held a good discussion and questions that prompted some office responsibilities to be assigned in checking for people in the courthouse for an evacuation. Nelson and Johnson completed their responsibilities to make sure everyone was out of courthouse and said the evacuation took about four minutes for everyone to be across the street to an off-site location. New business was discussed: (1) Monday, December 4, 2017, county employees are highly encouraged to participate in the NIRMA Fire Extinguisher Training and Loss Leader Prevention Training that will be held at the courthouse; (2) Tornado awareness is a national/statewide drill one time a year in the spring the last Wednesday of March at 10:00 A.M.; (3) Smith said the suggestion is to have two fire evacuation drills a year, one in the fire safety month of October and one other time during the year. The group suggested spring season for a fire evacuation drill; and (4) The departments of Emergency Management, Road and Sheriff have applied for grant assistant through the NIRMA ASSIST program for the purchase of safety equipment. The group discussed some options when determining ways to finance the project. The Boone County Board of Commissioners have the authority to issue County of Boone, Nebraska limited tax building bonds without the vote of the people for a set amount of years not to exceed twenty years. The Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. cannot issue limited tax building bonds statutorily. Also, in accordance with State Statutes the Boone County Board of Commissioners have the authority to approve/allow the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. budget to levy an additional Building Levy of three and five-tenths cents on each one hundred dollars of taxable valuation, or any part thereof, separate from their general operation levy. Total cost of the building is estimated at \$4,250,000.00. The Board of Commissioners plan to appropriate \$1,300,000.00 from the County Inheritance Tax Fund. The \$2,950,000.00 is the portion being discussed to bond or levy. If the County issues bonds for the project, the building becomes County owned until the bonds are paid. If the Agricultural Society budget institutes a building fund levy they pay on a loan for a set number of years.

The 2017-2018 levy for the County of Boone, Nebraska governmental entity is 0.150708. The Board asked Martinsen if he foresees a significant change in the County of Boone levy if the Board appropriates the \$1,300,000.00 from the Inheritance Tax for said building project. The Inheritance Tax Fund acts as a reserve for the County of Boone, Nebraska. Martinsen said that the Inheritance Tax Fund balance (cash reserve) would be reduced by said amount, but probably would not affect the asking levy percentage unless there is a significant drop in the county valuation. The group discussed an estimate on financing/bond payments of \$2,950,000.00, over 10 years at three percent interest. Based on the current county valuation, a levy of approximately 1.47 cents on each one hundred dollars of valuation would amount to \$14.70 in property tax on a home valued at \$100,000.00. Martinsen noted that county entities are under an annual levy lid, allowing a maximum increase of 3.5 percent each year in operating budgets. A building fund levy is outside the operation levy and levy lid.

The actual cost of the proposed building has not been determined yet. The financing of the \$2,950,000.00 has not been determined yet. The Board needs to decide either County ownership (bonds) or Agricultural Society ownership (building levy). No contract has been signed yet with an architect and architect fees are usually based on a percentage of total project cost. A public meeting regarding the fairgrounds building project is scheduled for Wednesday, December 6, 2017 at 7:30 p.m. at the Albion Country Club. The Board encourages all county residents to attend.

Steve Pritchard, Extension Educator, presented the Boone-Nance County Extension Board's member recommendation. The Boone-Nance County Extension Board has four representatives from each county. The board members may serve two consecutive three-year terms. The board meets quarterly, alternating the meetings between the counties. Mark Grundmayer has completed two consecutive three-year terms. Ken Schriver has completed a one year term. There are ten counties in category three of which Boone is fifth position in valuation and tenth in population. The Board discussed the minimum recommended salary for 2019 of category three being \$54,300.00. It was noted that the elected County Assessor, Clerk, Treasurer and Part Time Attorney salaries for 2018 is \$51,948.00, being \$2,352.00 less than the recommended minimum salary for 2019. The Board plans to review the information provided by the NACO committee and visit with counties of like size before setting the 2019-2022 salaries for the elected county offices.

The consensus of the Board is that Commissioner Maricle will serve as a member on the building committee and the Board will include the building committee appointment at their reorganizational meeting. In addition, the group discussed the Fairgrounds 1<sup>st</sup> Subdivision property and upcoming negotiation of the property with the City of Albion. The Agricultural Society has not been paying for water for the fairgrounds due to the City of Albion wells that were on county property. One of the wells is now capped and the other well is within the Fairgrounds 1<sup>st</sup> Subdivision property that the Board planned to deed ownership to the City of Albion. Rolf said that the Board should negotiate with the City of Albion so that the fairgrounds continues to receive free water. The Board plans to meet with the City of Albion and Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. on January 16, 2018.

The Boone County Board of Commissioners met on December 11, 2017 and authorized the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. to proceed to execute a document regarding a design for the proposed Agricultural and Educational Activities Building at the fairgrounds with Ryan D. Stearns, Architect with Joseph R. Hewgley and Associates. The Board agreed to provide the sum of \$1,300,000.00 from the County Inheritance Tax Fund for use towards the proposed new Agricultural and Educational Activities Building at the fairgrounds with Ryan D. Stearns, Architect with Joseph R. Hewgley and Associates. The Board agreed to provide the sum of \$1,300,000.00 from the County Inheritance Tax Fund for use towards the proposed new Agricultural and Educational Activities Building at the fairgrounds in lieu of the issuance of bonds. The Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. shall obtain a loan for the approximate amount needed to complete the project in the sum of \$2,950,000.00, with loan payments to be paid through an additional building levy not to exceed an additional levy of three and five-tenths cents on each one hundred dollars of taxable valuation. Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to approve Resolution No. 2017-50, funding of the proposed new Agricultural and Educational Activities Building at the Boone County Fairgrounds as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Nebraska Revised Statutes 23-1114 provides that "The salaries of all elected officers of the county shall be fixed by the county board prior to January 15 of the year in which a general election will be held for the respective offices." The Board reviewed the financial situation of County Government; the Nebraska Association of County Officials' (NACO) salary study; employee benefits; and salaries of comparable positions in other governmental sectors. The Board and elected county officials present at the meeting discussed the NACO salary study, percentage of 1.5% - 3% of the 2018 elected official salaries and flat dollar amount salary increases for the elected officials 2019-2022 term. The Board plans to set the elected officials 2019-2022 salaries at their December 27, 2017 Board meeting.

Rod Nelson, Courthouse Maintenance, presented a repair estimate from NMC for the WINCO generator located at the Boone County Law Enforcement Building. The new supply pressure is limited to 5 psi due to a code change. The estimate to repair engine for a low power issue caused by different gas pressure regulator installed on fuel tank is \$4,075.00. The estimate repair is above the NMC yearly maintenance agreement. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Luettel to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the repair estimate of \$4,075.00 from NMC for the WINCO generator located at the Boone County Law Enforcement building. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Luettel and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.



Denny Johnson, County Sheriff, requested an exception in regard to the compensatory (overtime) policy for an employee in the sheriff's office. Johnson and the Board discussed payroll policy of the norm is what an employee earns (comp, vacation, and sick) during the pay period is available for use by the employee in the next pay period. Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to approve this one time unique exception for the requesting employee to use the compensatory time in the same pay period as when it was earned. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Rasmussen to recess said meeting at 11:36 A.M. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Rasmussen and Maricle. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel to reconvene said meeting at 1:18 P.M. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Luettel and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board of Commissioners attended the Boone County Planning and Zoning Commission meeting scheduled for 1:30 P.M. on December 18, 2017 at the Boone County Courthouse. The Board of Commissioners and the County Planning and Zoning Commission Board discussed possible changes that would allow for growth of livestock operations and other types of agriculture in the A-1 Agricultural-Primary District. The group discussed setback distances that are different for enclosed vs. open facilities; lot split requirements differ for farm families vs. non-farm residential applicant; different lot split regulations for existing homes vs. new construction; and several other County Zoning Comprehensive Plan changes/regulations are being reviewed and discussed.

Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Maricle acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Kathy Thorberg, County Clerk, presented three quotes for HP LaserJet MICR Laser Printer(s). The present Lexmark T632 MICR printer was purchased in 2004 for flash check printing. The last several months the check printer has been jamming and not working correctly. Premium MICR Toner is needed when printing onto blank stock checks. If MICR Toner is not used when printing onto the blank stock checks, the checks are not valid through FDIC. Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to approve the purchase of a HP LaserJet M608N MICR Laser Printer and MICR Toner Cartridge for approximately \$1,225.00 from Advantage Laser Products, Inc. for the County Clerk's office to use for flash check printing. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Absent: Luettel. Motion carried.

Commissioner Luettel arrived at 9:06 A.M.

Stacey Robinson, County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road equipment repair/replacement, road/bridge maintenance, materials and projects. In addition, the following topics were discussed:

- Robinson informed the Board that Thiele Geotech has completed the sight visit in regard to the asphalt portion of a county road known as 145<sup>th</sup> Street west of Petersburg. Robinson has not received a recommendation report regarding repair/replacement of the asphalt portion to date.
- Robinson informed the Board that the Cedar Rapids Road District shop building has been without heat for a couple of days due to damage to the natural gas line that supplies the shop building.



The Board and Stacey Robinson, County Highway Superintendent, have held several discussions in regard to the County Road District #1 Shop Building, Cedar Rapids. The Board and Robinson held a lengthy discussion in regard to the quotes for repair of the present office space that is attached to the shop building and/or a new lean-to office space to be attached to the present shop building. Rasmussen and a contractor will physically inspect the present office portion of the road shop that is in need of repair. The Board will decide at a later date the feasibility of repair or a new lean-to in regard to the office space in question.

The Board approved a resolution on November 13, 2017 that pertained to the issuance of tax building bonds of the County of Boone, Nebraska for the purpose of constructing a new building at the Boone County Fairgrounds to be used as an Agricultural and Educational Activities Building. The Board approved a resolution on December 18, 2017 where the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. shall obtain a loan for the approximate amount needed to complete the project and make the loan payments through the Agricultural Society budget building levy. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Maricle to approve Resolution No. 2017-52, hereby rescinds Resolution No. 2017-48 dated November 13, 2017, known as a parameters resolution that pertained to the issuance of tax building bonds effective December 27, 2017 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Maricle and Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed the information received from NACO for the procedure(s) to follow for a government entity to lease cropland acres. The Board leased the approximately 24.68 acres of dry cropland in 2017 that the County of Boone purchased south of the present County Fairgrounds property in 2016. The term(s) of the 2017 cropland lease expired December 31, 2017. In accordance with state statute, the Board will set a public hearing date prior to any such lease. Motion made by Maricle, second by Rasmussen to advertise the weeks of January 1<sup>st</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup>, 2018 for a Public Hearing to be held on Monday, January 22, 2018 at 11:00 A.M., an open and public hearing prior to any such lease at which any interested party may appear and speak for or against the lease and raise any issue concerning the County Board leasing cropland. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Rasmussen and Luettel. Nays: None. Motion carried.





The Nebraska State Auditor's Office have audited several counties in 2016 and 2017. The State Auditor's Office is making County Government aware that the counties are not to be making a vendor payment to another entity without actual supporting documentation. A County must be able to point to a statute that allows a procedure to occur before the county can perform such procedure. Constitution XIII-3 outlines that subdivisions of the State cannot expend public money for private purposes. A non-profit is not a public entity.

The County has to restructure the manner in which it distributes funds to other agencies. The County has supported the five fire departments for several years with an annual amount to purchase supplies for the respective Ambulance. In addition, the County has supported the five public libraries for several years with an annual amount to purchase books/media for the respective library. The library support for books/media continued following the closing of the rural mobile libraries (bookmobiles on wheels). The County has no supporting documentation such as a procedure (agreement) in place or copies of invoices showing how the money was spent.

Motion made by Luettel, second by Maricle to forgo the annual support to the fire departments effective December 31, 2017 due to state statute, no supporting documentation and that fire departments have been receiving funding through a tax levy. In the future, if additional funding above a tax levy is necessary, the fire departments may approach the County Board of Commissioners for additional support. Roll call vote: Yeas: Luettel, Maricle and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Maricle, second by Luettel that effective December 31, 2017 the libraries will be required to submit paid itemized receipts showing the purchase of books/media material for the respective year on the first day of December each year. The books/media material reimbursement support will be in the amount of the itemized receipts and will not exceed the annual support. The submission for 2017 reimbursement support may be submitted in January or February 2018. The submission for 2018 and thereafter reimbursement support are to be submitted by the first of December each year. Roll call vote: Yeas: Maricle, Luettel and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.
