



#### 2020 REORGANIZATIONAL MEETING BOONE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS ALBION, NEBRASKA

The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska convened at 9:00 A.M. on Monday, January 6, 2020, in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Alan Rasmussen, Chairman, called the Reorganizational Meeting to order as required by Nebraska State Statute. Commissioners present for roll call were Alan Rasmussen, Larry Temme and Ben Rutten. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Rasmussen noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to appoint Alan Rasmussen as Chairman of the Boone County Board of Commissioners for the year 2020. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Abstain: Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to appoint Larry Temme as Vice Chairman of the Boone County Board of Commissioners for the year 2020. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Rasmussen. Abstain: Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen that the budget committee for the ensuing 2020-2021 budget year is the Boone County Board of Commissioners, Boone County Clerk and Boone County Treasurer. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to reappoint Schmeits, Mueller & Martinsen, P.C., Richard Martinsen, CPA, Albion, Nebraska, to prepare the County Budget for the 2020-2021 budget year, to be paid from the County General fund. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried

Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to reappoint Stacey L. Ziemba, Fullerton, Nebraska, as full time County Highway Superintendent under the supervision of the County Board for 2020. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to reappoint Christopher C. Hays, Osceola, Nebraska, as Boone County Surveyor for a four year term commencing January 3, 2019 through December 31, 2022, per contract for services as provided in State Statute Section 23-1901.01. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to appoint the Boone County Veteran Service Officer as the American with Disabilities Act (ADA) Coordinator for 2020. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to appoint Larry Temme as Chairperson of the County General Assistance Program with the emergencies being handled by a Commissioner. The County Clerk or Deputy County Clerk shall contact the assistance program chairperson or a Commissioner when there is a request on a day there is no scheduled Board meeting. The County Board authorizes and empowers the Boone County Treasurer to invest any surplus funds in the custody of the office. Any surplus funds shall be invested to assure a beneficial rate of return to the County and confirmation of all pledged securities are on file. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten that the courthouse hours shall be 8:00 AM to 4:30 P.M. with a one-half hour unpaid break, and that all offices will post their hours, including the lunch break; and notice shall be posted on the respective office door only if an office is to be closed when it otherwise would be open. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the IRS mileage reimbursement rate of 57.5 cents per mile, effective January 1, 2020 as referenced in the Boone County Employee Handbook. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.



Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to approve County meal reimbursable dollar amount, as referenced in the Boone County Employee Handbook, for 2020 overnight travel policy: (1) Includes reimbursement by submitting an itemized receipt for actual expense up to \$11.00 for breakfast, \$12.00 for lunch and \$23.00 for supper; (2) No reimbursement of meals for one day travel; (3) If an unforeseen situation occurs for one day travel and return is after 7:00 P.M., the meal may be reimbursed and will be taxed and added to the employee W-2; (4) Itemized receipts are required for all travel expenses. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Rasmussen and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme that the Boone County full time employees are to receive twelve paid holidays which include the observed nine holidays as set forth in the NIRMA Guide to Creating a Personnel System for Nebraska Counties Handbook together with Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and Columbus Day. In addition, Arbor Day shall be a floating holiday for full time employees in 2020 and shall be used beginning April 24, 2020 and before December 21, 2020, if floating holiday is not used by employee, employee shall lose the benefit. **In addition**, the Board decided that the Courthouse will close at noon on December 24, 2020, with County full time employees scheduled to work receiving pay as follows:

#### Courthouse Employees:

- 8:00 AM 12:00 PM Regular pay for worked hours as evidenced by the timeclock.
- 12:30 PM 4:30 PM Regular pay for courthouse closed hours.

#### Road Employees:

- 7:00 AM 11:00 AM Regular pay for worked hours as evidenced by the timeclock.
- 11:30 AM 3:30 PM Regular pay for courthouse closed hours.

Employees on scheduled vacation leave on a day that the County closes the courthouse, will not be allowed to alter their vacation leave as scheduled to take advantage of the closure.

#### Sheriff's Office (Employees scheduled to work/Employees called in to work:

- 8:00 AM 12:00 PM Regular pay for worked hours as evidenced by the timeclock.
- 12:00 PM 4:00 PM Overtime rate of pay (1 ½) times the regular rate of pay) for time worked as evidenced by the timeclock.
- Non-scheduled employees receive no compensation for the December 24, 2020 four hour closure.

The Courthouse "Closed" notices will be posted by Board directive on the north and west outside entrance courthouse doors. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme that full time employees are to receive vacation and sick leave as set forth in the Boone County Employee Handbook. The employee's vacation and sick leave records are recorded with the time clock/attendance system effective January 2014. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.





Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Temme that agenda items must be provided to the Boone County Clerk's Office no later than noon (12:00 P.M.) on the Friday preceding a Board meeting in order to be considered for said Board meeting. Any agenda item submitted after 12:00 P.M. on Friday preceding a Board meeting will be an agenda item for the next scheduled Board meeting. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to appoint the following to be on the Health Board for Boone County as required by State Statute: County Sheriff, County Clerk and Boone County Health Center Chief of Staff for 2020. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Rasmussen and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

As required by Nebraska State Statute §48-443, each Nebraska county must have a working safety committee. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Temme that (1) the following will serve on the Safety Committee for 2020: Region 44 Emergency Management Director; County Sheriff; Board of Commissioners; County Highway Superintendent; County ADA Coordinator; and Custodial Maintenance Supervisor; (2) a tornado drill will be held in March at the same time/date as the Statewide tornado drill; (3) fire drills will be conducted in May and October; (4) Ben Rutten, Commissioner, will serve as safety chair and Rod Nelson, Maintenance, courthouse safety coordinator; and (5) the Safety Committee meetings are tentatively scheduled for February 18, May 18, August 17, and November 16, 2020, commencing at 9:00 A.M. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten that the Boone County Board of Commissioners will hold their Board meetings on Monday's **except** for the first Monday of each month; no meeting scheduled for March 30, August 31, and November 30, 2020; and when a payroll meeting is scheduled on a different day of the week than Monday in the year 2020, commencing at 9:00 A.M. Meeting dates/times are subject to change due to state statute regulations. Monday meetings that are on holidays will be held on Tuesday. The Accounts Payable Vendor meeting will be on the second Monday of the month and other Mondays will be regular public meetings. The Board meeting dates for 2020 were approved on November 12, 2019 and payroll meetings are subject to change from Monday to a different day for approval by the Board with the implementation of the time clock/attendance system and the 22/21 pay period. The Board meeting dates for payroll approval are as follows: January 27, February 26, March 25, April 27, May 27, June 24, July 27, August 26, September 28, October 26, November 25 and December 28, 2020. The County Clerk's office has charge and authority of the agenda for all meetings. The agenda will be made available for all meetings on the Boone County Website and the bulletin board located in the north courthouse entrance. Also, the following will be used to post notices in advance for emergency meetings and meetings that cannot be published in the legal newspaper(s): Boone County Website: Boone County Courthouse: lobbies of the Boone County Bank; Cornerstone Bank; Homestead Bank; and Albion News Office all located in Albion, NE. In addition, the Cedar Rapids State Bank, Cedar Rapids, NE; Cornerstone Bank, St. Edward, NE; and Great Plains State Bank, Petersburg, NE. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. The Grievance Procedure in the Employee Handbook says the County will use a Grievance Board consisting of five people. The Commissioners shall create the pre-designated list of ten impartial members to serve on the Grievance Board. The Board visited with county residents to create a pre-designated list. #### BOONE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS JANUARY 13, 2020 ALBION, NEBRASKA

The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska, met in regular session at 9:07 A.M. on Monday, January 13, 2020, in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Chairman Rasmussen called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Ben Rutten, Alan Rasmussen and Larry Temme. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Rasmussen acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

The Board reviewed and discussed the Accounts Payable Vendor Claims filed for payment. The Board reviewed the claim submitted by Vendor ID No. 1814 and discussed the substantial difference between the estimate submitted on October 21, 2019 and the invoice submitted for payment after the project was completed. The Vendor had contacted Board members and discussed the reasons for the invoice difference within the labor, machine rental, etc. regarding the road building repair project. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the Accounts Payable Vendor Claims filed for payment from the various funds: General - \$69,835.07; Road/Weed - \$399,177.77; Boone County Visitor's Promotion - \$500.00; Veteran's Aid - \$2,000.00; 911 Emergency Management (2910) - \$1,755.65; 911 Wireless Service (2913) - \$4,636.66; Ambulance - \$4,369.45. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board accepted and approved a written resignation from a full-time County Road employee at their December 16, 2019 Board meeting. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Temme to approve a Payroll Claim filed for payment on the Road Fund for a net amount of \$1,150.21 with the withholding amounts being included in the above approved Accounts Payable Vendor Claims as presented. If a resolution is not adopted by the County Board prior to February 1, 2020, the question of electing a County Surveyor must appear on the General Election ballot in November 2020.

At the November 2020 General Election, if a majority of votes cast are in favor of the election of the office of County Surveyor, the office continues to be elected. If a majority of votes cast are against the election of the office of County Surveyor, the elected office ceases to exist at the end of the term of the incumbent and the office becomes an appointed position.

On January 27, 2020, the Boone County Board of Commissioners, held a public hearing at its regular meeting upon publication of notice of the same in the legal newspapers of the Albion News, Petersburg Press and St. Edward Advance in the county. The public hearing was for the purpose of hearing public comments and to discuss the issue of the elected office of a County Surveyor.

The population of Boone County is less than one hundred fifty thousand inhabitants according to the most recent official United State Census. As of January 1, 2020 the office of County Surveyor of Boone County is considered elected as the office appears on the ballot. The Boone County Surveyor position has been filled by a County Board appointment for several years due to there is no County resident that is a licensed surveyor. A person appointed to the office of County Surveyor in any County shall not be required to reside in the County of appointment. No comments were received by the Board of Commissioners at the public hearing.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the County Payroll Claims filed for payment from the various funds: General \$105,263.60, BCBS \$45,596.16, Ameritas Ret \$7,266.93, EFTPS \$7,872.58, LTD Premiums \$2.27, Section 125 Fees \$10.00, Wellness Program \$109.90; Road \$64,561.72, BCBS \$31,578.68, Ameritas Ret \$4,357.91, EFTPS \$4,874.82; Ambulance \$3,020.41, Ameritas Ret \$90.40, EFTPS \$231.05; and Public Defender Contract \$3,358.21. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the County Board Proceedings of January 21, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Abstain: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Board received an update of activities from Carrie Rodriguez and Melanie Lueders, Probation Officers for District Five Probation. Rodriguez and Lueders presented the "All In For Kids" program and informed the Board that there is a critical need for foster care in Nebraska. They explained the various child foster care programs for infants to age nineteen. Foster care serves several different situations that may be a one night stay, short term of a few days and/or long term where juveniles are placed in foster care through the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services. A free showing of the movie FOSTER is scheduled for February 9, 2020 at 1:00 P.M. at the Widman Cinema in Central City, NE, followed by a panel discussion with several foster care agencies available to answer questions. The event is organized by The Eyes of the Child Team in order to bring awareness to the public of the shortage of foster care homes in the area counties. The consensus of the Board to allow District 5 Probation to distribute flyers for the free movie event scheduled for February 9, 2020, providing awareness of the need for various foster care situations and that one night of foster care can make a difference in the eyes of a child.

The County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road equipment repair/replacement, road/bridge maintenance, materials and projects. In addition, the following topics were discussed with no action taken by the Board:

- Road employee wage comparison to be further discussed at the time the 2020-2021 budgets are discussed.
- The County Highway Superintendent informed the Board that one of the motor graders and the 1991 Mack truck-tractor are in need of extensive repairs. A decision will need to be made to either repair or replace.
- The insulation that has been installed in the County Road District #1, Cedar Rapids, shop building appears to be an improvement with lower heating costs the past month and now the breakroom area appears to have water leaking through the roof that needs attention.





The County Highway Superintendent submitted a Non-Exclusive Contract For Services for the Board to review. A Non-Exclusive Contract For Services is by and between the County of Boone, Nebraska and truck drivers with a Nebraska Class "A" Commercial driver's license to haul gravel and rock from the various quarries to the county yards stockpiles. The service will be provided on an as-needed basis with compensation to the contractor of \$105.00 per hour. The consensus of the Board that this service is not needed at this time, the County has employees/trucks/trailers that can haul gravel/rock and the Board would like to obtain information on a compensation rate based on loaded mile verses paying an hourly rate for contractual services.

Jacqueline L. Wells, Boone County Veteran Service Officer, submitted a 2019 year-end Veterans report for the Board to review. The numbers within the report includes Veterans that live in other counties/states that are in the Boone County Veteran Service data base. Wells explained the differences of and who receives the Veterans tax free money income through compensation, GI Bill and Nebraska Veterans State Aid of which none of these funds are passed through the County budget system, the funds are directly distributed to the Veterans recipient. Wells informed the Board that there is approximately 535 Veterans residing in Boone County. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to accept the Boone County Veterans Service Officer 2019 year-end report as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

On January 21, 2020, Randall Bruland, County Ambulance Administrator, and the Board discussed possibly beginning the process to obtain quotes for a new County Ambulance unit. The Board and Bruland discussed that the Boone County Ambulance budget is a self-supporting budget through the revenue received from patient billings and does not receive tax payer funds through a levy. The Board was informed that the County Ambulance Fund may currently have enough funds to pay for a new ambulance unit, but then there may not be enough funds left to operate the ambulance in order to pay drivers, medical personnel, fuel, supplies, etc. The revenue that the County receives from patient transport billings has been dwindling each year in comparison to the expenses per patient transport. The Board discussed paying a portion of the new ambulance unit from the Inheritance Tax fund and a portion from the County Ambulance fund. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve advertising for sealed bids for a new County Ambulance unit for three weeks with sealed bids received through 4:00 P.M. on Friday, February 21, 2020 and opened at 10:30 A.M. on Wednesday, February 26, 2020 in the Boone County Commissioners Meeting Room. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The County of Boone used the Indirect Cost Allocation Services of Sequoia Consulting Group, Inc. since February 2011. The Board received a letter that David Lynn, President of Sequoia Consulting Group, Inc. that he asked Wesley J. Ehlers if he would form his own company, WJE Consulting LLC, to continue to provide cost allocation services to the Nebraska County clients. Ehlers has worked for Sequoia Consulting Group for several years. Lynn is dissolving his company due to health issues. Ehlers plans to provide the same services with no changes to the Agreement in regard to the recovered funds to be shared 60% by the County and 40% by the Consultant not to exceed \$3,650.00 annually by the Consultant. The only change is the name of the company. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign an Agreement for Indirect Cost Allocation Services with WJE Consulting LLC as presented for the indirect cost allocation plan for FY ending in 2019, which results in cost reimbursement for fiscal year 2020-2021 and prepare a letter of termination to Sequoia Consulting Group, Inc. regarding the agreement executed May 20, 2019. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.





A new telephone system was installed in the County Courthouse and Law Enforcement buildings in 2015 by Applied Connective Technologies. The leased complete program agreement for the new telephone system (hardware, software and maintenance) began September 16, 2015 and ending March 16, 2020. In March 2020 the County will own the current telephone system in the County Courthouse and Law Enforcement buildings.

Ed Knott, Applied Connective Technologies, presented the Board with a history of the previous telephone system and the current telephone system. Knott presented a Managed Remote Service & Maintenance Agreement for the current telephone system that the County will own on March 16, 2020. The Maintenance Agreement is \$265.00 per month for one year and renewable for a successive twelve months. Knott informed the Board that the current telephone system installed in 2015 should have ten more years of serviceable life span. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Managed Remote Service & Maintenance Agreement with Applied Connective Technologies for the Boone County Courthouse and Law Enforcement/Sheriff's office buildings telephone system for \$265.00 per month for one year for remote programming, software upgrades, etc. as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board held a Public Hearing on January 27, 2020 at 10:30 A.M. in the Boone County Courthouse Commissioners Meeting Room in Albion, Nebraska for the purpose of hearing public comments and to discuss the issue of the elected office of a County Surveyor. The Nebraska Revised Statute §32-525, County Surveyor; election; when required; terms; qualifications was discussed. The Board did not adopt a resolution to continue to elect the County Surveyor for the County prior to February 1, 2020. Therefore, the Board decided to submit to the voters of Boone County, Nebraska the question of electing a Boone County Surveyor at the November 3, 2020 General Election. At the 2020 General Election the voters will decide the future of the County Surveyor office to either continue to be an Elected Office or becomes an Appointed office by the Board of Commissioners.

The Board held a Public Hearing on January 13, 2020 in accordance with Nebraska State Statute for the purpose of hearing public comments for or against the County owned property to be leased, specifically a fractional part of the Northeast Quarter (NE1/4) of Section Twenty-eight (28), Township Twenty (20) North, Range Six (6) West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska commonly known as the Boone County Fairgrounds. The Board advertised to receive sealed bids for said property to be leased until 4:00 P.M. on Friday, January 24, 2020, at the Boone County Clerk's office with bids to be opened/reviewed at 11:00 A.M., on Monday, January 27, 2020 in the Boone County Commissioners Meeting Room located in the courthouse, Albion, Nebraska. No sealed bids were received for the Board to open for said lease of the advertised property known as the Boone County Fairgrounds. Present for the bid opening: County Board; Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. members Dave Noble, Mike Mapel, Jeryl Kettelson and Chuck Rolf; UNL Extension Educator, Steve Pritchard; Pat Neidhardt; and Pam Jochum. If the County Board receives no bids, the County Board may negotiate a contract for lease if such negotiated contract is in the best interests of the County. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to negotiate a Lease Agreement with the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. for the County owned property to be leased, specifically a fractional part of the Northeast Quarter (NE1/4) of Section Twenty-eight (28), Township Twenty (20) North, Range Six (6) West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska commonly known as the Boone County Fairgrounds. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. board members and individuals present for the lease bid opening reviewed and discussed a proposed lease document. A proposed Lease Agreement was discussed at the January 21, 2020 Board meeting. Some members of the Agricultural Society have met since January 21, 2020 to review and have some questions, concerns and would like to make some suggestions to the Lease Agreement document.



A few of the questions, concerns and/or suggestions are:

- The Agricultural Society requested that a survey of the fairgrounds property and an aerial photo of the fairgrounds showing the buildings with the buildings being identified on the aerial photo to be included with the Lease Agreement.
- Each of the buildings on the fairgrounds be identified with signage to further aide emergency personnel.
- The Agricultural Society earlier request to address the ownership of the building contents has been completed in the Lease Agreement.
- Agricultural Society proposed the County pay for the electricity metered for the new Boone County Agricultural Education Center building.
- Agricultural Society to pay for all other utilities associated with the Boone County Agricultural Education Center building and all utilities for the fairgrounds leased property and improvements.
- Questions and clarification relating to the responsibly and expense of the insurance coverage of the property and improvements. The Board plans to visit with NIRMA.

The Board plans to clarify the various questions/concerns of the proposed Lease Agreement and further discuss/consider the Lease Agreement issues at their February 10, 2020 Board meeting.

The chief deputy salaries shall be fixed by the County Board at such times as necessity may require. The Board and Denny Johnson, Sheriff, discussed the wage process for the Sheriff Chief Deputy. The consensus of the Board is to not change the wage process that was set in 2017 for the Elected Official term of 2019-2022, the chief deputy being a percentage of the respective elected official salary.

Vice Chairman Temme called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Larry Temme and Ben Rutten. Commissioner Alan Rasmussen was absent due to illness. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Vice Chairman Temme acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

The Board reviewed and discussed the Accounts Payable Vendor Claims filed for payment. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the Accounts Payable Vendor Claims filed for payment from the various funds: General - \$46,062.21; Road/Weed - \$153,561.58; Boone County Visitor's Promotion - \$1,440.16; Inheritance Tax - \$183,952.98; 911 Emergency Management (2910) - \$453.17; 911 Wireless Service (2913) - \$512.14; Fair Building (4025) - \$220,674.06; Ambulance - \$1,498.37. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Board accepted and approved a written resignation from a full-time County Sheriff office employee at their January 13, 2020 Board meeting. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve a Payroll Claim filed for payment on the General Fund for a net amount of \$855.04 with the withholding amounts being included in the above approved Accounts Payable Vendor Claims as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the County Board Proceedings of January 27, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the County Board Public Hearing Proceedings of January 27, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Board received Payment Application Nos. 13 & 14 from Rathman Manning Construction for the fairgrounds building. The payment request is for a portion of the concrete, fire suppression, plumbing, HVAC system, doors, windows, electrical, utilities and fire alarm/communications system. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve payment number thirteen for \$128,045.42 and fourteen for \$92,628.64 from Rathman Manning Construction for a total of \$220,674.06 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Board received a change order to review for consideration for the new livestock building project for the The original project quote was \$2,966,035.00 from Rathman Manning Boone County Fairgrounds. Construction. Construction Change Orders #1 and #2 were reviewed and discussed on December 10, 2018 when the Board approved Change Order #2 for \$38,680.00 and part of Change Order #1 for \$16,281.00. The architect then merged Change Orders #1 and #2 to AIA Document G701 known as Change Order Number: 001 for \$54,961.00 increasing the project construction amount to \$3,020,996.00. On September 25, 2019 a change order was reviewed and discussed to change the Fire Sprinkler main piping from a 4" line to a 6" line per onsite Fire Marshal inspection for \$6,034.60. The AIA Document G701 Change Order Number: 002, which should be Change Order #3 document request, for \$6,034.60 increased the project construction amount to \$3,027,030.60. A change order was received for the Board to review as AIA Document G701 Change Order Number: 003, which should be Change Order #4 document request, for \$7,978.44. Some of the changes were faucets; flood protection valve; thermostats; light switch, TV outlet, electrical meter, etc. and partial deduction of sidewalk on north side of building. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the AIA Document G701 Change Order Number: 003 as submitted, which should be Change Order #4 document request, for \$7,978.44 to add and delete changes as presented with the building project construction amount now being \$3,035,009.04. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Boone County Board of Commissioners authorized the Boone County Treasurer to transfer funds from the General Fund to the Road Fund on a monthly basis each fiscal year. The County Treasurer disperses the percentage of delinquent taxes received each month to the respective funds. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to adopt and approve Resolution No. 2020-03, authorizing the Boone County Treasurer to discontinue the transfer of funds from the General Fund to the Road Fund for the delinquent tax year 2018 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

Boone County has been a County member of the Northeast Nebraska Economic Development District (NENEDD) for several years. NENEDD contacted the Board and asked that Boone County appoint a Commissioner as a Boone County representative for the Council of Officials for NENEDD. The Council of Officials are invited to attend each monthly meeting and comment on items being discussed. However, they only have voting rights at just two meetings a year being June and December. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to appoint Commissioner Larry Temme as Boone County representative for the Council of Officials for NENEDD for year 2020. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Boone County Board of Commissioners approved Resolution No. 96-26, joining with other Nebraska public agencies in accordance with Nebraska law and the Interlocal Cooperation Act, by becoming a participant in the Nebraska Public Agency Investment Trust (NPAIT) on June 17, 1996. The NPAIT account allowed public agencies to invest surplus or excess funds. On May 30, 2010 the Boone County NPAIT account balance was zero and the Boone County Treasurer has not used the NPAIT account since May of 2010. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve and authorize Laurie Krohn, Boone County Treasurer, to complete and sign the NPAIT document "Close Sub-Account/Master Authorization" permanently closing the NPAIT account effective February 10, 2020 and Boone County will no longer be a participant with NPAIT, therefore voiding





Resolution No. 96-26. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

Stacey Ziemba, County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road equipment repair/replacement, road/bridge maintenance, materials and projects. Ziemba informed the Board that Road District #1, Cedar Rapids, is in need of a power washer to clean their machines. The consensus of the Board is that the Highway Superintendent will decide on the most economic purchase under \$10,000.00 of either a used or new power washer for Road District #1.

Stacey Ziemba, County Highway Superintendent, submitted two state quotes from Nebraska Machinery Company (NMC) for a new motor grader for the Board to review. The quote for a Caterpillar 140-13AWD with v-plow is \$302,040.00 and a Caterpillar 140-13AWD with ADJ wing is \$311,230.00. Ziemba informed the Board that the 1998 Caterpillar 140H motor grader will be a trade-in for the new motor grader. Ziemba informed the Board that if the new motor grader is ordered now that the new machine may possibly be delivered in April. Ziemba informed the Board that the plans are to utilize the Nebraska Machinery Company CAT Financial plan and pay a financing cost of \$250.00 in order to have the new machine in use in April and not pay for the new machine until July. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the purchase of a new Caterpillar 140-13AWD motor grader with v-plow from Nebraska Machinery Company for \$261,140.00 (\$302,040.00 less a trade-in allowance of \$40,900.00) and use the CAT Financial plan to defer the full payment to the new fiscal budget year of July 2020. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

On January 21, 2020 the County Highway Superintendent and Board discussed the purchase of a new drag carrier that would be mounted on the new motor grader located at Road District #3, Petersburg with brackets to accommodate snow wing so it can be left on year around. The Board asked the Highway Superintendent to obtain additional quotes. The following quotes were received: Molt Mfg., Inc. of Spalding, NE - \$10,850.00; Front Runner FAB., Inc. of Fullerton, NE - \$5,200.00; and Beaver Creek Machine, LLC of Petersburg, NE - \$4,578.60. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the quote for a new drag carrier from Beaver Creek Machine, LLC for approximately \$4,578.60. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

Andy Zoucha, Don Casper and Gayle Noble met with the Board to discuss their concerns regarding County road issues and needed repairs on asphalt roads. The County Highway Superintendent and Brian McDonald, JEO Consulting Group, Inc., were also present for the discussion. The group discussed several sizes of pot holes, soft spots, deterioration of asphalt roads and the edges of roads. Some of the road areas discussed were 260<sup>th</sup> Street between the intersection of 11<sup>th</sup> Street and Fairview Street, thence west to the intersection of 240th Avenue and Fairgrounds Road, Fairgrounds Road and 240<sup>th</sup> Avenue south of State Highway 91, vicinity of the Albion Country Club, Cemetery Road, roads in the area of Bob's Country Acres, Cuddy's Ark Acres and Golf Course View Subdivisions. Some questions being asked: which of the area roads are considered open roads for County maintenance; what roads are not considered open roads and who is responsible for maintenance and repairs; are any of the area roads in discussion on the County One Year Road Improvement Plan; and any plans for the County to accept and maintain subdivision roads. McDonald informed the group that if the County physically accepted the area platted subdivision roads, the roads would have to meet the Nebraska DOT minimum standards. McDonald plans to inspect the roads while he is in the area today.

The Board, County Highway Superintendent, Brian McDonald, JEO Consulting Group, Inc., Ralph Pieke and Scott Wallin discussed the Bridge Project #6(393), located at 150<sup>th</sup> Street east of 330<sup>th</sup> Avenue. The plans are for an existing 24 foot bridge to be replaced with a triple 10 x 9 foot box culvert at an estimated cost of \$160,000.00. The box culvert would accommodate a larger volume of water, but a heavy rain will still likely continue to overtop the bridge due to the road needs to be built up. Pieke and Wallin were in favor of a larger





bridge like the bridge further upstream and build the road up. McDonald said that the channel capacity of the Shell Creek is a determining factor and that can't be changed. McDonald said that there is no justification for what it would cost to build the road up 2 to 3 foot and install a larger bridge for a minimal daily traveled road.

The Board, County Highway Superintendent, and Brian McDonald, JEO Consulting Group, Inc., discussed two FEMA bridge projects. McDonald presented two FEMA projects for the Board to review and let for bidding. The two bridge projects are due to the 2019 flooding. The Cedar Rapids Northwest bridge project on 150<sup>th</sup> Avenue south of State Highway 52 estimated cost is \$450,000.00. The St. Edward South bridge project, which connects to the City of St. Edward sewage lagoon is estimated at \$100,000.00. Copies of the contract documents are on file in the County Clerk's office for examination by bidders. Project bidding documents are available from JEO Consulting Group. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to authorize the County Clerk to advertise for bids for the Cedar Rapids Northwest bridge project and the St. Edward South bridge project, with the Invitation to Bid as prepared by JEO Consulting, Group, Inc. and bids to be received until 10:00 A.M. on March 9, 2020 by the Boone County Clerk's office. Roll call vote: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Board, County Highway Superintendent, and Brian McDonald, JEO Consulting Group, Inc., discussed several road/bridge issues/projects. Some of the following projects discussed with no final decisions made at this time:

- A bridge on Pilot Knob Road near Primrose.
- A bridge south of St. Edward on 350<sup>th</sup> Street west of State Highway 39.
- A bridge east of Raeville on 260<sup>th</sup> Avenue north of 120<sup>th</sup> Street.
- Culvert replacement on Ridge Road west of Albion.
- The asphalt (black top roads that were milled and packed in fall of 2019: 260<sup>th</sup> Street between intersection of 11<sup>th</sup> Street and Fairview Street, thence west to the intersection of 240th Avenue and Fairgrounds Road; A Street going north out of St. Edward; and 170<sup>th</sup> Avenue known as Water Tower Road going South out of Cedar Rapids.

The Board; Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. board members Dave Noble and Chuck Rolf; UNL Extension Educator, Steve Pritchard; and Pam Jochum continued the review and discussion of a proposed lease document. The Lease Agreement being discussed would be between the County of Boone and the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. for the County owned property commonly known as the Boone County Fairgrounds. The Ag Society asked for the language of #35 Budget be changed from "provide a separate detailed report of revenue and expenses for each of the activities" to a "monthly summary report of revenue and expenses and a detailed report for the activities when requested by the Board." The language regarding insurance coverage changes will be provided by NIRMA and a revised legal description of the fairgrounds property will be provided by the County Surveyor.

Rod Nelson, Courthouse Safety Coordinator presented the old and new business. The primary use of the Boone County Visitors Promotion Fund is to promote, encourage and attract visitors to come to the county through advertisement of the event. The Boone County Visitors Promotion Committee received a request for advertisement funding. The Cedar Rapids Community Club requested assistance to advertise the Cedar Rapids Melodrama event scheduled for March 20, 21, 22, 27 and 28, 2020. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the application requesting funding assistance for advertisement of the Cedar Rapids Melodrama event from the Visitor's Promotion Fund as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.





The County of Boone DBA Boone County Ambulance Service and EMS Billing Services, Inc. (EMS) of Omaha, Nebraska signed an Agreement in March 2014 for EMS to provide the patient transport billing services. In December of 2019 the Board signed a document acknowledging that EMS Billing Services, Inc. was acquired by Quick Med Claims, LLC. The Boone County Ambulance is an ALS Unit and is used primarily for transport of patients from/to the Boone County Health Center to another facility and a doctor in charge must recommend the ambulance services. Quick Med Claims submitted documents for the Board to review that are in need of updated information regarding personnel contacts, collection agreement, and transport billing rates, etc. for the Boone County Ambulance Service. The Board reviewed the information provided and decided to make no changes regarding the Boone County Ambulance Service rates due to the rates were changed in March of 2019. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve and authorize Kathy Thorberg, Boone County Clerk, to complete and sign the documents submitted by Quick Med Claims, LLC with no changes to the Boone County Ambulance Service rates for 2020. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension, presented a quote for new furnishings for the UNL Extension office space for cabinets/counter tops and meeting/conference room space for cabinets, counter tops, sink, etc. to be located in the new building at the fairgrounds on February 10, 2020. The Board asked Pritchard to obtain additional quotes to present at a future meeting due to the furnishings appears to be greater than \$10,000.00. The following quotes submitted: Mark's Custom Woodworking of Creston, NE – Office \$23,628.53 and Conference Room \$5,747.74; RMK Enterprise (Roger Ternus) of Albion, NE – Office \$24,249.00 and Conference Room \$6,265.00; and Dave Jochum, Elgin, NE – Office \$25,108.07 and Conference Room \$6,624.74. The Board would like to see the UNL Extension office move and use as much of the existing cabinets and furnishings from the current office in the courthouse to the new office at the fairgrounds. Kurt Kruse and Chuck Rolf were present for the UNL Extension office furnishings discussion. Kruse suggested that the Board meet Pritchard at the new building to determine the furnishings needed as he would hate to see a new office with different type of furnishings. Kruse said that if the County does not want to fund the new furnishings, the Boone County Agricultural Education Center, Inc. might provide some cost share funds. No action was taken by the Board regarding the quotes presented. The Board agreed to visit the new building before adjourning today's meeting.

In addition, Pritchard asked the Board how the following expenses will be covered for telephone, internet and mail services and who is responsible for janitorial and maintenance services for the Extension office new location at the fairgrounds. Also, discussion was held on use of the new UNL Extension meeting/conference room by organizations that may be conducting events in the arena, civic organizations and if the meeting/conference room may be used when the UNL Extension Educator is not present. No decisions made by the Board at the meeting.

On February 10, 2020 the Board approved the purchase of a new Caterpillar 140-13AWD motor grader with v-plow from Nebraska Machinery Company for \$261,140.00 (\$302,040.00 less a trade-in allowance of \$40,900.00) and use the CAT Financial plan to defer the full payment to the new fiscal budget year of July 2020. The Board received the NMC CAT Sales Agreement and the Caterpillar Financial Services Corporation Finance Proposal to review for the purchase of a new Caterpillar motor grader. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve and authorize the Board Vice-Chairman to sign the documents as submitted for the purchase of a new Caterpillar motor grader with trade-in, delivery of the ordered new motor grader in April 2020 and a finance plan to defer the full payment to the new fiscal year budget in July 2020. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.



Members of the Boone County Agricultural Education, Inc., Kurt Kruse, Bill Robinson and Chuck Rolf were present to discuss with the Board and John Morgan, County Attorney, the use of up to \$120,000.00 of the pledged funding received for the payment of the bonds for the new fairgrounds building in order to purchase furnishings for the new fairgrounds building. They would like to purchase bleachers, concession area equipment, a soil conditioner and packer for arena and drainage work is needed for the south side of the new building. They would like to purchase the items so that the building is ready for the events scheduled in May. Kruse said that there is adequate funds in the Building Bond Account in the County Treasurer's office to make the 2020 and 2021 Building Bond payments. Morgan suggested a resolution to be signed for the use of up to \$120,000.00 of the bond pledged fund account to be used by the building improvement fund account and payable back to the bond fund account within a year of the signed resolution. A resolution to be drafted for signatures for the February 26, 2020 Board meeting.

The Board, John Morgan, County Attorney, Chuck Rolf and Dave Noble, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. and Pat Neidhardt discussed a proposed Lease Agreement in regard to the County owned property known as the Boone County Fairgrounds. A Lease Agreement by and between the County of Boone, Nebraska, a political subdivision in and for the State of Nebraska and the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc., a Nebraska Nonprofit Domestic Corporation has been discussed the past several months. Commissioner Temme attended the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. meeting that was held on Monday, February 17, 2020 and reviewed the revised Lease Agreement with the Ag Society regarding the changes from the prior Board meetings. There were no more suggested changes to the proposed Lease Agreement except for the new real estate surveyed legal description. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve and authorize the Board Vice Chairman to sign the three year Lease Agreement entered into and shall be deemed to have commenced effective as of the 1<sup>st</sup> day of January 2020, by and between the County of Boone, Nebraska and Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. for a three year lease, with the document being signed by both entities upon receipt of the new surveyed legal description. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

## BOONE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS FEBRUARY 26, 2020 ALBION, NEBRASKA

The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska, met in regular session at 9:00 A.M. on Wednesday, February 26, 2020 in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Vice Chairman Temme called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Ben Rutten and Larry Temme. Commissioner Alan Rasmussen was absent due to illness. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Vice Chairman Temme acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

The Board reviewed the County Payroll Claims filed for the pay period of January 22, 2020 through February 21, 2020. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the County Payroll Claims filed for payment from the various funds: General \$101,431.07, BCBS \$50,486.32, Ameritas Ret \$6,989.96, EFTPS \$7,573.05, LTD Premiums \$2.27, Section 125 Fees \$10.00, Wellness Program \$125.60; Road \$67,303.58, BCBS \$31,578.68, Ameritas Ret \$4,543.00, EFTPS \$5,084.57; Ambulance \$3,108.74, Ameritas Ret \$82.95, EFTPS \$237.82; and Public Defender Contract \$3,358.21. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the County Board Proceedings of February 18, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Board received an update of activities from Patrick Peer, Chief Executive Officer, and Chuck Sepers, Chief Public Health Officer, East-Central District Health Department. The East-Central District Health Department is located in Columbus, Nebraska and serves Boone, Colfax, Nance and Platte Counties. Peer presented and reviewed a Boone County Health Report for October-December 2019. The Nebraska East Central Health District's public health system is defined with the line between public health (East-Central District Health Department) and healthcare (Good Neighbor Community Health Center) within our health district. Healthcare focuses primarily on tertiary prevention or preventing of the progression of disease within the patient. Public Health focuses primarily on helping to implement new or modified programs, policies, and practice that prevent people from getting sick to begin with. Peer and Sepers highlighted part of the twenty-two page report: ten essential public health services; Social Determinants of Health; 2020 flood outlook; lead poisoning, usually found in older homes built before 1978; influenza surveillance; youth tobacco and substance abuse prevention; building healthy families; COVID-19; and Boone County Community Snapshot. The Albion location that offers Outreach and Enrollment services for WIC, Medicaid, CHIP, etc. moved to a new location at 2583 State Highway 14, Suite 3, Albion. The Board, Peer and Sepers discussed meeting quarterly to review the County's health assessment and public needs. The consensus of the Board is to meet with East-Central District Health representatives to receive an update of programs and activities on a quarterly basis for year 2020.





The County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road equipment repair/replacement, road/bridge maintenance, materials and projects. In addition, the following topics were discussed with no action taken by the Board:

- County Road Dist. #2, Albion tagged some surplus items for disposal. The County Highway Superintendent plans to consign some of the surplus items on the annual FFA auction scheduled for April 5, 2020.
- City of Albion has applied to host a disposal site for collection of used tires in May.
- The 6,000 gallon tanker that receives used oil located in the Road Dist. #2, Albion yard is nearing full. The County Highway Superintendent plans to research how to dispose of the used oil.
- The purchase of a new Caterpillar motor grader was approved on February 10, 2020 and use the CAT Financial plan to defer the payment to July. The consensus of the Board is to not finance and pay approximately three months of interest. Nebraska Machinery Company to be paid \$261,140.00 upon delivery of the new motor grader and picking up of the 1998 Caterpillar that was traded-in.

The Board, County Highway Superintendent, Ryan Figgner and Richard (Rick) Figgner, Primrose, Nebraska discussed the status of the Pilot Knob Bridge. Figgner's expressed to the Board that they would like to have the bridge reconstructed for through traffic. The said bridge collapsed in the middle following the 2019 spring flooding. Highway Superintendent informed the group that an engineer from JEO Consulting Group has studied the bridge and surrounding area. If the decision is to repair/replace the said damaged bridge it would need to be extended in length. The County Highway Superintendent expects to have the engineer report and estimated costs for reconstruction of said bridge within a month. The Pilot Knob Bridge project would be considered a FEMA project. Figgner's plan to gather signatures from area residents that would like to see the bridge replaced for through traffic. The Board indicated that the order of funding for repair to damaged roads and bridges throughout the County from the 2019 flooding will be repaired in the order of the higher traffic use to the lower traffic use.

The County Highway Superintendent prepared a Non-Exclusive Contract For Services for each of the interested truckers to back-haul aggregate for the County. The contracts are for the year 2020 with the contractor compensation being \$7.00 per ton for road gravel and \$11.00 per ton for other aggregate. The interested truckers needed to attach a copy of the truck driver's CDL and Certificate of Liability Insurance coverage to the contract. In addition, the back-hauler is to contact the County Highway Superintendent before any load is accepted by Boone County. The Board reviewed the Non-Exclusive Contract for Services submitted by Ron Beckman/Beckman Lumber, Inc.; Ken Luettel/JACK Dynamic, LLC; Jason Hoefer/Jason Hoefer Trucking; Rollie C. Huffman/RCH Transfer; and Randy Schlecht/Schlecht Trucking, LLC. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to authorize the Board Vice Chairman to sign the Non-Exclusive Contracts for Services as accepted and approved by the County Highway Superintendent. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The County Highway Superintendent and Board, continued the discussion in regard to Non-Exclusive Contract for hauling services of aggregate from quarries to the county stockpiles at a different rate than the Non-Exclusive Contracts to back-haul for 2020. In 2019 some Non-Exclusive Contract hauling services of aggregate form quarries to the county stockpiles received an hourly rate to haul aggregate. The Board has concerns with an hourly rate, such as the County may be paying for the time the trucker is waiting at the gravel pit to be loaded and while being loaded. A discussion to possibly use a compensation rate based on a loaded mile or loaded weight. The consensus of the Board that this service is not needed at this time, the County has employees/trucks/trailers that can haul gravel/rock at this time. No decision was made by the Board.



On January 21, 2020, Randall Bruland, County Ambulance Administrator, and the Board discussed possibly beginning the process to obtain quotes for a new County Ambulance unit. On January 27, 2020 the Board approved advertising for sealed bids for a new County Ambulance unit with sealed bids received through 4:00 P.M. on Friday, February 21, 2020 and opened at 10:30 A.M. on Wednesday, February 26, 2020. The Board received sealed bids from two companies: Arrow Manufacturing, Inc. of Rock Rapids, Iowa (Arrow) - \$189,900.00 and \$199,900.00; and Danko Emergency Equipment Co. of Snyder, Nebraska (Danko) - \$259,898.00. Jeff Horn, Danko, was present to represent the company and answer question in regard to their quote. There was no representative present for Arrow. The Board, Bruland and Jeff Horn discussed the differences within the sealed bids and that Arrow includes a 40% deposit at the time of the ordering of a new unit. Horn asked Bruland about the replacement of the cot that is in the 2016 County Ambulance unit. Bruland replied that the County Ambulance cot was like new and that the plan is to keep the current cot. Horn indicated that the price of a new cot will be removed from the quote. Horn said that if the County FIN# (Ford discount) is still active that will also lower the quote. Bruland also noted that Danko is closer to Albion when the ambulance unit is in need of service.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to authorize the Board Vice Chairman to sign the Proposal for Demers Ambulance and a Sales Contract with the changes from the original quote of removal of the new cot price and Ford discount for the purchase of a 2020 Demers MXP-170 Type 1 Ambulance installed on a Ford F-450 Chassis including graphics and power load from Danko Emergency Equipment Co. for \$238,420.00 with delivery in approximately seven to nine months. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

On February 18, 2020 members of the Boone County Agricultural Education, Inc., Kurt Kruse, Bill Robinson and Chuck Rolf were present to discuss with the Board and John Morgan, County Attorney, the use of up to \$120,000.00 of the pledged funding received for the payment of the bonds for the new fairgrounds building in order to purchase furnishings for the new fairgrounds building. Morgan suggested a resolution to be signed for the use of up to \$120,000.00 of the bond pledged fund account to be used by the building improvement fund account and payable back to the bond fund account within a year of the signed resolution and a resolution to be drafted for signatures for the February 26, 2020 Board meeting. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve Resolution No. 2020-04, authorizing Kurt Kruse and William J. Robinson, Boone County Agricultural Education Center, Inc. representatives to transfer up to and not to exceed \$120,000.00 as needed from the accounts of the Boone County Agricultural Education Center, Inc. Bond Payment Account 10875 to the building Improvements Account 10923 and amount transferred to Account 10923 be transferred back to Account 10875 on or before March 1, 2021. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays. None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

On February 10 and 18, 2020 the Board and Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension, discussed quotes for new furnishings for the UNL Extension office space for cabinets/counter tops and meeting/conference room space for cabinets, counter tops, sink, etc. to be located in the new building at the fairgrounds. The Board had indicated they would like to see the UNL Extension office move and use as much of the existing cabinets and furnishings from the current office in the courthouse to the new office at the fairgrounds. The Board agreed to visit the new building to observe the UNL Extension space before making a furnishings decision. Those present to further discuss the furnishings issue were: Kurt Kruse, Chuck Rolf, Kevin Rasmussen, Hilary Maricle, Josephine Weltruski and Pam Jochum. The Board acknowledged the Board Proceedings from 2018 that the furnishings for the building were not included in the three million dollar construction quotes and any expenses beyond the three million dollar building project will need to come from fundraising/donations, not from the County or a tax levy assessed upon the tax payers.



Maricle informed the group that she is the University of Nebraska, Lincoln Engagement Zone 6 Coordinator and it is proposed for Maricle to office in the new Boone County Agricultural Education Center building. The proposal is for Maricle to utilize the third office room at the new fairgrounds building and the same space would be available for Regional Educators to use when they are in the County. The group said that the existing cabinets and furnishings in the courthouse UNL Extension office may be utilized in the three office areas and storage room at the new fairgrounds building and the new furnishings quote from Mark's Custom Woodworking still be purchased for the new conference/meeting room of \$5,747.74 and the new main office/reception area of \$23,628.53. Kruse said that if the County does not want to fund the new furnishings, the Boone County Agricultural Education Center, Inc. would provide some cost share funds. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the quotes of \$5,747.74 for meeting/conference room and \$23,628.53 for office/reception area furnishings for UNL Extension office from Mark's Custom Woodworking of Creston, Nebraska with a one-half cost share being Boone County Agricultural Education Center, Inc. paying \$14,688.14 and the County of Boone, Extension Office budget paying \$14,688.13. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

Denny Johnson, Sheriff, presented a one-time fee of \$2,112.00 for installation of five new Equature Voice Licenses. Johnson informed the Board that there are two lines to the Equature Voice Recorder in the County Law Enforcement building and that five more lines need to be added to the Equature Voice Recorder for communications with the new Statewide Radio System. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the five new Equature Voice Licenses for a one-time fee of \$2,112.00 for the Equature Voice Recorder for communications with the new Statewide Radio System with part of the fee being paid from the 911 Wireless Service Fund 2913. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried

The County of Boone auditing services contract expired with the fiscal year end June 30, 2019 audit. After reviewing records, the last time the Nebraska Auditor of Public Accounts completed an audit for County of Boone was in 1992. The Board feels it would give them comfort to have a State Audit completed and to know if everything is on the right track. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to request the Nebraska Auditor of Public Accounts to send the Boone County Board a contract to consider for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020 audit. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

They explained the renovations completed to change an old milk barn structure to a distillery structure. Brugger's plan to grow the necessary crops/grain for the distillery business. The spirits must be marketed through distribution companies and cannot be sold directly from their distillery. They explained that the distillation will allow them to diversify as farmers beyond their crop and cattle production and also produce high quality farm-crafted spirits. Distillation will also allow them to capture more value from products already being grown on their farming operation.

Vice Chairman Temme acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

The Boone County Health Center contacted the County Clerk's office and asked that their scheduled meeting with the Board today be re-scheduled at a later date. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to table a





meeting with the Boone County Health Center to the March 16, 2020 Board meeting. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The requestor for the General Assistance request did not appear before the Board. No action was taken by the Board.

The County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road equipment repair/replacement, road/bridge maintenance, materials and projects.

The County Highway Superintendent prepared a Non-Exclusive Contract For Services for each of the interested truckers to back-haul aggregate for the County. The contracts are for the year 2020 with the contractor compensation being \$7.00 per ton for road gravel and \$11.00 per ton for other aggregate. The interested truckers needed to attach a copy of the truck driver's CDL and Certificate of Liability Insurance coverage to the contract. In addition, the back-hauler is to contact the County Highway Superintendent before any load is accepted by Boone County. The Board reviewed the Non-Exclusive Contract for Services submitted by Joshua Hollibaugh/Country Partners Cooperative and Corey Dobson/Dobson Transfer, LLC. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to authorize the Board Vice Chairman to sign the Non-Exclusive Contracts for Services as accepted and approved by the County Highway Superintendent. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Board, County Highway Superintendent and Brian McDonald, JEO Engineer discussed FEMA's Alternative Procedures 428 Program. McDonald did not favor FEMA's Alternative Procedures 428 Program. The County Highway Superintendent and the Board contacted a FEMA representative by teleconference for more information on the Alternative Procedures 428 Program.

On January 29, 2013, President Obama signed into law the Sandy Recovery Improvement Act (SRIA). This SRIA law amends Title IV of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (Stafford Act) that was signed into law in 1988 to create an orderly system to get federal assistance to state and local governments in the wake of natural disasters. Specifically, the SRIA law adds Section 428, which authorizes alternative procedures for the Public Assistance (PA) Program under sections of the Stafford Act. It also authorizes the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to implement the alternative procedures through a pilot program.

The FEMA representative said that if the Board approves the signing of Appendix A it does not lock the County in to the Alternative Procedure 428 Program, but gives the County the option to choose which FEMA program best meets its needs. The 2019 flood damaged FEMA repair projects reimbursed funds are based on actual repair costs and reimbursement may take up to ten years to be received. With the Alternative Procedure 428 Program the County may be reimbursed by FEMA funds based on estimated amounts and the funds may possibly be received sooner. If the project bid comes in higher than the estimate, the County would be responsible for covering the difference. If the actual cost was lower than estimated, the County could use the excess funds to help pay for another FEMA approved project. The infrastructure 2019 flood damaged projects filed with FEMA may be filed based on actual repair costs or the estimated amounts (428 Program). The County funds are used for the infrastructure repairs as needed and may receive some reimbursement funds from FEMA in the future. Motion made by Rutten, Second by Temme to authorize the Board Vice Chairman to sign Appendix A, Alternative Procedures Pilot Program for Permanent Work Acknowledgement, a voluntary program. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Board, County Highway Superintendent, and Brian McDonald, JEO Consulting Group, Inc., discussed and reviewed construction plans for two Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), bridge projects on February 10, 2020. The two bridge construction project bid lettings were advertised to open sealed bids on





Monday, March 9, 2020. The two FEMA bridge repair projects are a result of the 2019 flood. The sealed bids received for the Cedar Rapids Northwest Bridge 6(00715) on 150<sup>th</sup> Avenue south of State Highway 52: JJK Construction, LLC of Ceresco, NE - \$469,073.75 and Theisen Construction, Inc. of Norfolk, NE - \$352,821.48. The St. Edward South Bridge 6(05015P) project, which connects to the City of St. Edward sewage lagoon: JJK Construction, LLC of Ceresco, NE - \$136,863.24 and Theisen Construction, Inc. of Norfolk, NE - \$98,494.60. Jeremy Kyncl, JJK Construction, was present to represent the company. There was no representative present for Theisen Construction. The Board, Highway Superintendent and McDonald reviewed and discussed the bids. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to accept and recommend approval of the Theisen Construction, Inc. of Norfolk, NE bids for the Cedar Rapids Northwest Bridge 6(00715) for \$352,821.48 and St. Edward South Bridge 6(05015P) for \$98,494.60, dependent upon full review of the construction cost bids by Brian McDonald. JEO Engineer. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Board, County Highway Superintendent, and Brian McDonald, JEO Consulting Group, Inc., discussed several road/bridge issues/projects. Some of the following projects discussed with no final decisions made at this time:

- A bridge on Pilot Knob Road near Primrose. McDonald plans to prepare estimates for repair/replacement of bridge.

- County Highway Superintendent informed the Board that Bridge Project #6(393), located at 150<sup>th</sup> Street east of 330<sup>th</sup> Avenue is ready for repair upon receiving signed document signature from the adjoining landowner(s).
- County Road Department cleaned out two tubes on 320<sup>th</sup> Avenue south of 350th Street that were tightly plugged with trees and debris.
- Commissioner Rutten plans to contact a county resident to remove the beaver doing depredation of dam building on the Bogus Creek two miles south of St. Edward on 357<sup>th</sup> Street.

The enhancements are that frames will be available every twelve months and they increased the frame allowance. Bruland received information that the 2003 M Series defibrillators will no longer be supported by FDA or have parts available for repairs after February 2021. The Board approved the purchase of a new 2020 County Ambulance unit on February 26, 2020. The expected delivery of the new ambulance unit is between September and November 2020.

The Board and Bruland reviewed a quote from Zoll Medical Corporation for a new X-Series Manual Monitor/Defibrillator and accessories for \$31,429.48. Bruland informed the Board that the Zoll X-Series Defibrillator will be supported by FDA. Bruland informed the Board that expected delivery date of a new defibrillator is two to four weeks. The Board felt that there is time to pursue a possible grant or other resources



to help with funding of a new defibrillator for the new ambulance unit. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to table ordering a new defibrillator at this time to allow time to pursue a grant or outside funding to help pay for a new defibrillator. The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska, met in regular session at 9:00 A.M. on Monday, March 16, 2020 in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Vice Chairman Temme called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Ben Rutten and Larry Temme. Commissioner Alan Rasmussen was absent due to illness. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Vice Chairman Temme acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the County Board Proceedings of March 9, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

On February 26, 2020 the Board approved to request the Nebraska Auditor of Pubic Accounts to send the Boone County Board a contract to consider for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020 audit. The Board received a letter to review that summarizes the scope of the audit services and the fee for services. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve a one year auditing services agreement with the State of Nebraska, Auditor of Public Accounts for an approximate cost not to exceed \$15,000.00 for auditing of the Boone County Financial Statements for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

Tanya Sharp, Boone County Health Center President/Chief Executive Officer, and Rita Liss, Boone County Health Center Chief Financial Officer, presented the Boone County Health Center audit report for year ending September 30, 2019 to the Board for their review. Sharp reviewed areas of the financial audit in regard to the statements of net position, revenue, expenses, cash flow and statistical highlights with the Board. The audit report shows composition of patient receivables to consist of the following: Medicare – 34%; Medicaid – 8%; Self Pay – 18%; and Other Third-party pay – 40%. Sharp noted that revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 49% and 4%, respectively, of the Health Center's net patient revenue for the year ended September 30, 2019. Liss reviewed areas of the history graph reports in regard to cash on hand, outpatient revenue, long-term debt, etc. The Boone County Health Center Clinics are located in Albion, Elgin, Fullerton, Newman Grove and Spalding. A copy of the Boone County Health Center fiscal year audit of October 1, 2018 through September 30, 2019 is on file at the Boone County Clerk's office.

In addition, Sharp updated the Board in regard to the Boone County Health Center new addition. An environmental study of the former swimming pool property needs to be completed and meet the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission requirements. The completion of the sale of the former swimming pool property and issuance of a building permit to the Boone County Health Center for the new building project is pending. Sharp asked the Board to sign an Application for Vacation document in order for the Boone County Health Center to request vacation of Fuller Street between Seventh (7) and Eighth (8) Streets, Albion, Nebraska from the City of Albion. When the new building project was first discussed the County had title ownership of the real estate. The County transferred ownership of the real estate to the Boone County Health Center in October 2019.

A resident/landowner was reviewing the real estate records in the Boone County Register of Deeds office on February 21, 2020 with regard to the alleys platted for record in Raeville, Nebraska. The County Clerk's office was informed that a petition had been circulated several years ago to vacant all of the alleys in Raeville. The real estate records in the Register of Deeds office and Assessor's office do not show the alleys in question as





being vacated, but still open. In researching the Commissioners Proceedings, it was found that in March 1998, the vacating of the alleys in Raeville was addressed at the Board of Commissioners meetings held on March 2<sup>nd</sup>, 23<sup>rd</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup>, 1998. Further review indicated that there was reference made to a resolution, however, no resolution has been found to be filed for record. The adjoining record landowners to an alley platted within Raeville, Nebraska were notified that the Boone County Board of Commissioners plan to review the prior documentation of record on Monday, March 16, 2020. The notice is to make the current landowners aware that upon the filing of an adopted resolution to vacate the alleys, the alleys will become taxable real estate to the adjacent landowner. JoAnn Mattner, real estate owner in Raeville, was present for the Board meeting.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to adopt and approve Resolution No. 2020-09, supersedes the unrecorded Resolution No. 98-17, that all of the alleys platted in Blocks 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6, Village of Raeville, Boone County, Nebraska, shall be and hereby are officially vacated by the County of Boone, State of Nebraska, with all right-of-way rights to be relinquished and shall revert to private ownership to the owner(s) of the adjacent real estate, one-half on each side thereof, subject however, with the understanding that all utilities that may be affected by this vacation continue to have full access to their property and no permanent structures are permitted in the alleys that have any power poles, in accordance with the March 1998 board proceedings. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Board received two proposals for the advertised Courthouse Lawn Care for 2020. The Board opened and reviewed the two sealed proposals. The Board, Rod Nelson, Maintenance, and Jim Jarecki DBA Jarecki Lawncare & Greenhouse, LLC discussed the 4-Step program and spraying of the entire lawn to control Yellow Nutsedge. The 4-Step program with fertilizer, weed control, grub control, insecticide, iron and Yellow Nutsedge control proposals were received from Jarecki Lawncare & Greenhouse, LLC - \$1,241.09 and Schrad's KLawn - \$1,180.00. The Board noted that the last several years the lawn care services have been alternated between the two businesses due to the businesses both being located in Boone County and do a good job. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the 2020 lawn care proposal for the courthouse lawn care from Jarecki Lawncare & Greenhouse, LLC for \$1,241.09 for the 2020 year as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

In addition, Jim Jarecki DBA Jarecki Lawncare & Greenhouse, LLC submitted a bid for aerification and thatching of the courthouse lawn for 2020. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the 2020 bid for Aerification - \$270.00 and Thatching – estimated cost \$340.00 from Jarecki Lawncare & Greenhouse, LLC for the 2020 year as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The County Highway Superintendent prepared a Non-Exclusive Contract For Services for each of the interested truckers to back-haul aggregate for the County. No contracts were received for approval by the Board at the March 16, 2020 Board meeting.

Mary Ziemba, County Zoning Administrator, discussed zoning services with the Board in regard to the Interlocal Agreement with the City of St. Edward. Ziemba informed the Board that the City of St. Edward has formed their own Planning/Zoning Board for the City of St. Edward and that the St. Edward City Council voted not to utilize the Boone County Planning Commission.

The Interlocal Agreement/County Resolution No. 2019-07 and the City of St. Edward Resolution No. 2019-04-01R is written the same as the Cedar Rapids and Petersburg Zoning Interlocal Agreements. Ziemba informed the Board that the County should not have to compensate any expenses incurred for supplies, newspaper publications, advertising or any necessities for meeting preparations. Ziemba views the St. Edward Planning/Zoning Board as a separate entity. The present Interlocal Agreement states "Either political





subdivision may terminate this agreement with 90 days written notice to the other political subdivision." Ziemba and the Board discussed allowing the St. Edward City Council the opportunity to make the decision of retaining the Boone County Zoning Administrator as the City of St. Edward Zoning Administrator and the standard set by the Boone County Commissioners relating to the St. Edward Planning/Zoning Board or the City of St. Edward, once again, may assume the City of St. Edward zoning responsibilities. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to send a letter from the Boone County Board of Commissioners to the St. Edward City Council, hereby giving a ninety day notice terminating the current Interlocal Agreement between the County of Boone and City of St. Edward, with an effective termination date of June 30, 2020. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

Commissioner Ben Rutten, Chairman of the Boone County Safety Committee, opened the safety meeting at 10:30 A.M. to discuss routine business. The following committee members were present for the quarterly meeting: Commissioners Ben Rutten and Larry Temme; Rod Nelson, Courthouse Maintenance; Denny Johnson, Sheriff; Jacqueline Wells, Veteran Service Officer; and Kathy Thorberg, County Clerk. Also in attendance were Lisa Langan, County Court Magistrate and Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension. Rod Nelson, Courthouse Safety Coordinator presented the old and new business. Each county is to annually develop, adopt, and maintain as a public record its One and Six Year Road Improvement Program, a plan for specific road improvements for the current year. The hours are monitored on the motor grader in order for the oil and filter changes be completed and tested in a timely manner. The secondary representative appointed in 2017 is no longer an employee of the County. Jack Nordeen, County Weed Superintendent/Signage Technician, discussed his insurance and benefits concerns with the Board. Nordeen inquired if changes were made to the County NACO/BCBS insurance coverage plan. Nordeen said that his doctor has ordered a certain medical test that was denied by the insurance company. Nordeen said that he personally visited with the insurance company and once again he is advocating for the County to employee a separate individual as HR in order for the HR person to discuss his situation with the insurance company. Following a telephone call to NACO/BCBS personnel Nordeen was informed that neither NACO/BCBS nor a County HR individual cannot discuss your medical situation or interfere with medical decisions with your doctor/insurance and if they could it would not change the outcome of the doctor/insurance decision due to HIPPA protection. Either the insurance company decided it was not a necessary exam/procedure or possibly the medical personnel needs to re-code the doctor's request. Commissioner Temme plans to contact NACO/BCBS personnel for clarification and will relay information to Nordeen.

In addition, Jack Nordeen, County Weed Superintendent/Signage Technician and Steve Rasmussen, Road District #2 employee, discussed with the Board recent information received in regard to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA), Emergency Paid Sick Leave Act (EPSLA) and Emergency Family and Medical Leave Expansion Act (EFMLEA). The first four (1-4) qualifying reasons for leave related to COVID-19, the individual(s) are quarantined for fourteen (14) days, which is described as not leaving your home. Rasmussen suggested possible changes for the County Road Department employees and shop buildings in order to more effectively limit the chance of Coronavirus infection. The County Clerk's office has ordered the time clock cards for employees to use verses the finger print; keep the shop building doors locked to coincide with the courthouse locked doors; and have freight shipments dropped off outside the door and an employee takes it into the shop later.

Barb Hanson, County Assessor and the Board discussed re-appraisal projects for the fiscal year 2020-2021. Hanson said that the current 2019-2020 re-appraisal project of residential property in the City of St. Edward and Village of Petersburg is almost completed. A re-appraisal fly-over (aerial photos) project of the rural area has been postponed the past several years and needs to be completed. Hanson estimated a rural aerial photo re-appraisal project to be approximately \$25,000.00. Hanson informed the Board that a re-appraisal of the rural parcels needs to be completed, but may be delayed a year. A re-appraisal estimate for all rural parcels is approximately \$140,000.00-\$160,000.00. The consensus of the Board to complete the re-appraisal fly-over (aerial photos) project and delay the re-appraisal of the rural parcels for a year.

John Morgan, County Attorney, met with the Board in regard to a personnel matter. Morgan informed the Board that in his opinion the employee situation and employee information should have been handled by the respective elected official and not by a non-respective department head/elected official. With the opinion of the County Attorney and a written statement from the respective elected official, the consensus of the Board is to restore the five days of benefits/pay to said employee. The Board apologized to the employee and respective elected official for any inconvenience and misunderstanding from all involved with the action that was addressed with the respective employee.

The Board met with the county elected officials: Assessor, Attorney, Clerk, Treasurer and Sheriff to discuss any issues. The Board reviewed request forms, policy, etc. in regard to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA). The elected officials received a set of the information/forms to share with their respective employees. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve a policy through the forms: Request for EFMLA, Request for Leave of Absence, Notice of Eligibility and Rights & Responsibilities, and Designation Notice. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.



The Board met with the county department heads: Highway Superintendent, Maintenance, and Veteran Officer to discuss any issues. In addition, UNL Extension was on teleconference call/video conference. In addition, Janice Rasmussen of Albion was on teleconference call. The Board reviewed request forms, policy, etc. in regard to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA).

The department heads received a set of the information/forms to share with their respective employees. Janice Rasmussen suggested that during a teleconference call that the individual speaking state their name. The elected officials and department heads meetings were separate in order to comply with the Chief Public Health Officer issued Directed Health Measure Order on April 4, 2020 concerning COVID-19 of no more than ten patrons present and a minimum of social distance of six feet.

In addition, the following was discussed for all county employees:

- Wash your hands often or clean your hands with alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- Clean all touched surfaces every day before use and after use (ex: doorknobs, phones, counters, fixtures, vehicle steering devices, etc.)

The Drop Box that is for public use is being blocked or hard to access when the parking lot is filled with employee vehicles.

- Commissioner Temme updated the Board on the progress of the new fairgrounds building.
- The Board acknowledged receiving a letter from the Nebraska Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice that determined the Boone County Jail facility to be in full compliance.

Vice Chairman Temme declared the meeting adjourned at 1:15 P.M., with the next Board meeting scheduled for Monday, April 20, 2020.

Vice Chairman Temme acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to approve the County Board Proceedings of April 13, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Rasmussen and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed an EFMLA/EPSLA request that was submitted by a county road employee. The Board reviewed and discussed the EFMLA/EPSLA request with the county road employee and county highway superintendent in regard to the reason for leave due to school/daycare closing. The EFMLA/EPSLA request for the fourteen days/eighty work hours was granted.

Jacqueline Wells, Boone/Greeley County Veterans Service Officer submitted written reports for the months of January, February and March 2020 for the Board to review. The Board reviewed the written reports in regard to the Veterans Service office first quarter of 2020 activity. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve as submitted the first quarter of 2020 reports by the Boone/Greeley County Veterans Service Officer. In November of 2016 the County of Boone purchased a fraction of the NE1/4 of Section 28, Township 20 North, Range 6 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska, known as the Kohtz property south of and adjacent to the Boone County Fairgrounds property. In December 1967 a permanent easement was assigned to the City of Albion to maintain and construct an earthen dam with spillways on said property that is currently owned by the County. The "Kohtz-City of Albion Detention Dam" was approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service and filed with the State of Nebraska, Department of Water Resources in December 1967. The City of Albion is planning to sell the former swimming pool property to the Boone County Health Center for their facility expansion project.

The Board's decision to transfer the approximate 10.93 acres of property known as the "Kohtz-City of Albion Dam" to the City of Albion, could possibly help the City of Albion to fulfill their requirement of replacing the former swimming pool property (a grant from the Game & Parks Department for purpose of outdoor recreation) with property of equal or greater value for outdoor recreation. The county board shall print and publish in a legal county newspaper a notice stating the legal description/address of the real estate at least thirty days prior to the transfer. Ziemba informed the Board that the shared copy machine was a used copy machine purchased in July 2016 and it has stopped working. The agreement being reviewed is a Lease Agreement for a new color copy machine, Sharp MX-3071 System for sixty-three months at \$85.56 per month, plus a monthly maintenance fee based on an amount for black & white copy images and color copy images. The County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road equipment repair/replacement, road/bridge maintenance, materials and projects. In addition, the following was discussed:

- The annual Highway Superintendent conference in June has been cancelled.
- Bob Thompson Construction plans to start erecting the replacement building at Road District #3, Petersburg this week. The original building was damaged in June 2018 and removed in 2018.
- Discussed a drainage issue off of State Highway 56 west of St. Edward. Commissioner Rutten suggested that the Highway Superintendent set up a meeting with the Nebraska Department of Transportation at the site/location of the drainage issue.

The consensus of the Board to allow the County Highway Superintendent to advertise for the positions she discussed and the Board informed the Highway Superintendent that they may not approve hiring any additional help at this time, due to they have mentioned possible layoffs/furloughs due to possible lack of work during the coronavirus epidemic.

The Board and Barb Hanson, Assessor, discussed the Notice of Hearing received from the Nebraska Tax and Equalization and Review Commission (TERC). Hanson explained that the level of value indicated on the transcript submitted for the Valuation Group 1 subclass of the residential class of real property (Albion) is 101.91% of actual or fair market value. The acceptable ratio range for the median of the assessment/sales ratio for said subclass is 92% to 100% of actual value or fair market value. Hanson explained the findings of the internal office error to the Board. TERC has recommended a downward adjustment in the amount of 6% for the land and improvement components of all parcels in the Valuation Group 1 subclass of the residential class of real property. Hanson plans to attend the hearing on April 28, 2020 at 9:00 A.M. by videoconference. Hanson said that her recommendation to TERC will be to reduce dwelling and outbuilding values by 6% and to maintain the current land values.

Vice Chairman Temme called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Ben Rutten and Larry Temme. Commissioner Alan Rasmussen joined the meeting by teleconference call/video conference at 9:20 A.M. The State of Nebraska, Office of the Governor, issued Executive Order Number 20-03 Coronavirus Public Meetings Requirement Limited Waiver, shall apply to all public governing body meetings that occur March 17, 2020 through May 31, 2020. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Vice Chairman Temme acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

The Board reviewed and discussed the Accounts Payable Vendor Claims filed for payment. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Abstain: Temme. Motion carried.

The Board accepted and approved a written resignation from a full-time County Sheriff's office employee at their April 27, 2020 Board meeting. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve a Payroll Claim filed for payment on the General Fund for a net amount of \$1,091.48 with the withholding amounts being included in the above approved Accounts Payable Vendor Claims as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Abstain: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Board received Payment Application No. 17 from Rathman Manning Construction for the fairgrounds building. The payment request is for completion of the concrete and masonry. Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to approve payment number seventeen for \$13,887.00 from Rathman Manning Construction as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Rasmussen and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed the information provided by NACO BCBS regarding the employee health/dental insurance. This year the overall increase to the NACO Health and Dental insurance pool with Blue Cross Blue Shield Nebraska will be 0% for health and dental base rates for fiscal year 2020-2021. The sub-group application/coverage election form needs to be received at BCBS Nebraska no later than May 29, 2020. The County Clerk's office plans to distribute a copy of the premium rates with the employees' May payroll. The County of Boone pays all of the health insurance premiums and employee only dental premium. An employee has the option to pay dental coverage for their spouse/children. The NACO BCBS policy premium also includes Cobra administration by NACO, Long-Term Disability and a \$15,000.00 Life Insurance on the policyholder. Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to approve the NACO BCBS Medical PPO Health Plan with \$1,500.00 deductible and Dental PPO Plan (Premier Option 3) for the period of July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021 and authorize Larry Temme, Board Vice Chairman, to sign the 2020 NACO Subgroup Application Coverage Election Form. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Rasmussen and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed the Long-Term Disability Insurance renewal from Madison National Life Insurance Company, Inc. for July 1, 2020 to July 1, 2023. There will be no rate adjustment and the rate will remain at \$2.27 per month per full-time employee (40 hour work week). The Long-Term Disability insurance rate is included for the employee (policyholder) within the NACO BCBS health insurance monthly premium. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve and authorize the Board Vice Chairman to sign the Long-Term Disability Insurance document for July 1, 2020 to July 1, 2023 with Madison National Life Insurance Company. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Navs: None. Motion carried.

The Boone County Ambulance Service submitted a July 2018 uncollectible ambulance account that the Board reviewed on April 29, 2019 and turned over to the County Attorney for further collection. The patient passed away August 31, 2018 and no payments were received or collected on said County Ambulance Service account. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to write off the July 2018 County Ambulance Service account in the amount of \$2,280.00. Roll call vote: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Edmond Knott, Applied Connective Technologies LLC, submitted a Managed Service Agreement for the Board to review. The present agreement with Applied Connective Technologies for technical support services, maintenance of county equipment and help desk services expires June 30, 2020. The term of this Agreement shall be for twelve months beginning July 1, 2020 and ending on June 30, 2021. This Agreement shall automatically renew for successive terms of the same duration unless either party submits written notice of their intent to terminate this Agreement. Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to approve and authorize the Board Vice Chairman to sign the Managed Service Agreement between Applied Connective Technologies LLC and County of Boone, Boone County Courthouse for \$13,750.00 for the fiscal year 2020-2021 to be billed and paid in monthly payments for only County owned equipment as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Rasmussen and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Edmond Knott, Applied Connective Technologies LLC, submitted a Software As A Service (SaaS) Agreement for the Board to review. The present agreements with Applied Connective Technologies for software, email, Microsoft 365, firewall and security subscription services expires June 30, 2020. The term of this Agreement





shall be for a period of twelve months beginning July 1, 2020. This Agreement shall automatically renew for successive terms of the same duration unless either party submits written notice of their intent to terminate this Agreement. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Temme to approve and authorize the Board Vice Chairman to sign the Software As A Service (SaaS) Agreement between Applied Connective Technologies LLC and County of Boone, Boone County Courthouse for \$6,765.00 for the fiscal year 2020-2021 to be billed and paid in monthly payments for only County owned equipment as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The fiber optic internet services for the courthouse has been provided by Netlink LLC, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Great Plains Communications LLC since 2014. Also, Great Plains Communications LLC has fiber optic to the courthouse for the State of Nebraska equipment. The present Agreement with Great Plains Communications LLC/Netlink LLC has expired. Ed Knott, Applied Connective Technologies LLC, provides technical support service for the County and obtained quotes for internet services for the Board to review. The quotes for 50 x 50 Mbps for 48 months: Eagle Communications - \$300.00/month and Great Plains Communications - \$200.00/month. The Board discussed the quote differences and that there is no need to change the current internet services to the courthouse. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to approve and authorize the Board Vice Chairman to sign the Service Order Agreement for Internet Services at a rate of \$200.00 per month for a term of 48 months between Great Plains Communications LLC/Netlink LLC and County of Boone, Nebraska as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

All County Officials and Department Heads must contact the County Board, as an agenda item, before buying, leasing or doing any major maintenance to equipment or furniture over \$800.00, per the January 2020 Board Reorganizational Meeting Proceedings.

Kathy Thorberg, County Clerk/Register of Deeds, presented a quote to the Board for their review regarding the purchase of ten hard bound books/binders and ten reams of recording paper for Register of Deeds records. The quotes are: 1-9 books/binders at \$93.50 each or 10-24 books/binders at \$90.50 each; and 9 x 15 ream of recording paper (500 sheets) 1-9 reams at \$106.25 per ream or 10-24 reams at \$102.75 per ream from RC Enterprises. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to approve the purchase of ten record books/binders for \$905.00 and ten reams of recording paper for \$1,027.50 plus freight from RC Enterprises as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Stacey Ziemba, County Highway Superintendent, submitted a state bid quote for a new semi-truck tractor from Cornhusker International Truck, Inc. of Norfolk, Nebraska. The factory list price for a 2021 International truck-tractor is \$270,069.07 and the state bid government price is \$130,993.00. The new semi-truck tractor is for Road District #2, Albion, replacing the (purple) 1996 International semi-truck tractor. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to approve and authorize the Board Vice Chairman to sign the purchase order quote for one state bid 2021 International truck-tractor for \$130,993.00, with no trade-in as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: none. Motion carried.

The County Highway Superintendent informed the Board that the 2002 Trail Blazer Belly Dump Gravel Trailer, that received damage during the March 2019 flood, is not operating correctly. The Board recommended that the County Highway Superintendent obtain trailer quotes for the Board to review.

The County Highway Superintendent received one application for the advertised county road job position. The Board asked the Highway Superintendent if there was a need for another full-time road employee and if any current road employees mentioned they were planning on leaving employment. Currently there are nineteen employees, including the highway superintendent position, receiving payroll/benefits from the Road/Weed Fund.





After a lengthy discussion the Board decided that there is no need to hire additional employees for the road department at this time.

The County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road equipment repair/replacement, road/bridge maintenance, materials and projects. In addition, the following topics were discussed:

- The 2010 Freightliner truck located at Road District #2, Albion is in need of a new transmission. Plans are to take the truck to Norfolk for repair this week.
- Plans are to install the tubes this week that have been requested for driveways.
- Plans are to remove some trees this week in some of the county road right-of-ways.
- Commissioner Rutten reported that the Nebraska Department of Transportation are not planning on helping with the drainage issue off of State Highway 56 west of St. Edward.

Commissioner Rasmussen excused himself from the teleconference call/video conference at 11:10 A.M.

The Board; County Highway Superintendent; Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. representative; and Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension, discussed the responsibility of the construction, material and payment of the material for the access road and parking area of/for the new fairgrounds building. The Highway Superintendent informed the group that the drainage culvert and the road material should not be paid for from the County Road Fund. The County Road department installed the culvert and moved some of the clay off of the crop ground to the new building site area. The approximate cost of the culvert is \$2,000.00 and an estimate of ten loads of red rock road material to establish a solid base for an access road to and a parking area in front of the new building is \$6,500.00. The group discussed various other costs for the new building and extension office area that was not included in the construction plans or bond funding. Sources for the various costs has not been determined. The Board said that some of the various expenses should come from the extension office budget. Rolf suggested that the Boone County Agricultural Society may be able to cover \$4,000.00 of the red rock road material.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve ordering of the red rock road material and that the County will use said road material to establish a solid base for an access road to and a parking area in front (north side) of the new fairgrounds building for the extension office use. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Board and Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension, discussed new window coverings for the new extension offices in the new fairgrounds building. Pritchard said that there are six window openings in the new extension offices. Pritchard said that the windows are not a standard size or all the same size. Pritchard contacted Creative Window Designs for a quote for six custom made cordless window shades. Pritchard informed the Board that the quote is \$500.00 per window and includes installation. The Board suggested that Pritchard obtain more than one quote for the Board to review at a future Board meeting.

The Board and Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. representative discussed the removal of the four old fairgrounds buildings known on the lease agreement map/exhibit as S, T, U, and V and the removal/replacement of the east fence line of the fairgrounds property. The removal of the existing fence line along the east side of the fairgrounds will be removed by the County as it is in the wrong location in accordance with property surveys. At this time the Board is not in favor of replacing the fence as long as property line markers are in place.

The removal of the four mentioned fairgrounds buildings was in the many discussions prior to the approval of the construction of the new fairgrounds building. The said show arena was not safe and the other three buildings were in very poor condition. The said buildings were to be removed from the grounds to allow for





more parking for events held in the Grandstand and Boone County Event Center. Rolf said that there is interest from some county residents to salvage wood from the buildings before they are removed. The Ag Society is requesting that the old show arena (V) be left on the grounds for small animal shows. The Board plans to discuss the removal of the buildings and a timeline for the interested citizens to salvage wood from the buildings at their June 8, 2020 Board meeting.

Denny Johnson, Sheriff, presented a quote from Applied Connective Technologies LLC for a new computer to replace a computer unit in the law enforcement dispatch center. The Board recommended that Johnson obtain more than one quote for the Board to review for a new computer unit at a future Board meeting.

Denny Johnson, Sheriff, discussed the purchase of electronic generated uniform citation equipment for law enforcement vehicles with the Board. Johnson informed the Board that all Law Enforcement will install and use the new citation equipment by the end of December 2020. Johnson received estimates from Applied Connective Technologies of \$24,080.50 for equipment to be placed in the five Law Enforcement vehicles (computer/printer) and equipment/modem activation (air time) for the equipment to be placed in the five vehicles of \$6,625.00. The Board recommended that Johnson obtain more than one quote if possible for the Board to review at a future Board meeting.

Denny Johnson, Sheriff, discussed the purchase of a new in-car camera for the new law enforcement vehicle. Johnson informed the Board that the in-car cameras in the past are from Digital Ally. The Board recommended that Johnson obtain more than one quote for the Board to review at a future Board meeting.

The Board and Rod Nelson, Maintenance, discussed a building for the County to use for storage and law enforcement impounded items. The County is currently renting two storage units from Kayton International. The Board is possibly looking at a building at the fairgrounds that is empty the majority of the year. The Board, Sheriff, and Nelson plan to look at said building located at the fairgrounds to see if it meets the storage needs. The Board plans to continue the storage building discussion on May 27, 2020.

The Board discussed the present Lease Agreements for two storage units with Kayton International. The Lease Agreements require a thirty day written notice by either party to terminate the lease. The Board plans to continue the storage building discussion on May 27, 2020.

The Board, Rod Nelson, Maintenance, and Denny Johnson, Sheriff discussed the AC unit in the Law Enforcement building. The AC unit in the IT room of the basement of the Law Enforcement building is not keeping the room cool with the added equipment that was installed for the statewide radio system. Nelson had one verbal estimate of \$5,000.00 for one unit or \$8,000.00 for two units. The second unit would be used to cool the conference room area in the basement of the Law Enforcement building. The Board recommended that Nelson obtain more than one quote for the Board to review at a future Board meeting.

The Board; County Assessor, Clerk, Treasurer; and Rod Nelson, Maintenance, discussed some type of window/glass for the offices with open counter spaces before re-opening the courthouse. The Board and Nelson measured for Plexiglas panels and discussed installation. The Board recommended that Nelson obtain quotes for Plexiglas panels and installation of panels for the Board to review at a future Board meeting.

The Board; County Assessor, Clerk, Sheriff, Treasurer; Rod Nelson, Maintenance; Lisa Langan, County Court; Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension; and Pam Jochum, Attorney office employee, discussed re-opening of the county courthouse/facilities. Several items were discussed, such as requirements to wear masks and disinfectant



cleaning/wipe down responsibility of each office area. Each department is responsible for their office area and equipment in regard to disinfectant cleaning each day. The County plans to wait for a new directive by Governor Pete Ricketts before determining the re-opening of the courthouse.

- The Board acknowledged receiving a letter from the Nebraska Tax Equalization and Review Commission with their decision following the hearing held on April 28, 2020.

Vice Chairman Temme declared the meeting adjourned at 1:55 P.M., with the next Board meeting scheduled for Monday, May 18, 2020.

Larry Temme, Vice Chairman of the Boone County Board of Commissioners, called for a motion to open a public hearing on Monday, May 11, 2020 at 10:00 A.M. in the County Commissioners Meeting Room, Boone County Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska. Motion made by Commissioner Temme, second by Commissioner Rutten to open said public hearing. Commissioners present for said public hearing were Larry Temme and Ben Rutten. Commissioner Alan Rasmussen joined the public hearing by teleconference call/video conference. The State of Nebraska, Office of the Governor, issued Executive Order Number 20-03 Coronavirus Public Meetings Requirement Limited Waiver, shall apply to all public governing body meetings that occur March 17, 2020 through May 31, 2020. Stacey Ziemba, County Highway Superintendent, was present to answer the 2020 Road Improvement Program questions. Notice of the hearing was given in advance by publication and the convened hearing was open to the public.

The public hearing is for the purpose of hearing testimony in favor of, or opposition to, and to answer questions in relation to the proposed 2020 One and Six Year Road Improvement Program for Boone County, Nebraska. The hearing is to remain open for one hour.

Stacey Ziemba, Boone County Highway Superintendent, presented the 2020 One and Six Year Road Improvement Program for Boone County, Nebraska. The one-year road improvement plan consists of nine projects and the six-year plan consists of four projects. Ziemba prepared a map to use as a visual aid showing the location of the proposed projects. The Board received no opposition at the hearing.

The Board and Highway Superintendent reviewed and discussed each of the projects: One Year Projects – C-6(386; C-6(393); C-6(394); C-6(395); C-6(397); C-6(398); C-6(402); C-6(404); C-6(405); and Six Year Projects – C-6(359); C-6(390); C-6(392); C6(399). The plan serves as a guideline that can be amended if an unforeseen circumstance arises and needs immediate attention. Ziemba informed the Board that 2019 Projects C-6(391); C-6(400); C-6(366) were completed last year and C-6(401) was removed due to a bridge will not be built in said project area. In 2020 Projects C-6(404) and C-6(405) are newly added to the road improvement plan. The Board and Ziemba discussed the status of the asphalt (black top) roads that are in need of repair/resurfacing that have been discussed several times the past years with the County residents. The Board asked Ziemba to revise the road improvement plan to include the county asphalt (black top) roads.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to close said hearing at 11:03 A.M. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

#### BOONE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS JUNE 8, 2020 ALBION, NEBRASKA

The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska, met in regular session at 9:02 A.M. on Monday, June 8, 2020, in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Chairman Rasmussen called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Ben Rutten, Larry Temme and Alan Rasmussen. The State of Nebraska, Office of the Governor, issued Executive Order Number 20-03 Coronavirus Public Meetings Requirement Limited Waiver, which was scheduled to end on May 31, 2020. Governor Pete Ricketts, issued Executive Order No. 20-24, continued limited waiver of certain requirements of the Nebraska Open Meetings Act to remain in effect through June 30, 2020. The Executive Order allows governing bodies (Board of Commissioners) to meet by videoconference or by telephone conference. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Rasmussen acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

The Board reviewed and discussed the Accounts Payable Vendor Claims filed for payment. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the Accounts Payable Vendor Claims filed for payment from the various funds: General - \$207,788.69; Road/Weed - \$173,372.08; 911 Emergency Management (2910) - \$2,302.15; 911 Wireless Service (2913) - \$6,370.98; Ambulance - \$3,201.67. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed a written resignation from a full-time County Assessor's office employee. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to accept and approve the resignation of Cindy Fulton effective June 1, 2020 as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board accepted and approved a written resignation from a full-time County Assessor's office employee at their June 8, 2020 Board meeting. Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to approve a Payroll Claim filed for payment on the General Fund for a net amount of \$374.94 with the withholding amounts being included in the above approved Accounts Payable Vendor Claims as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Rasmussen and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to approve the County Board Proceedings of May 27, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Nebraska State Statute 80-101 refers to County Veterans Service Committee appointments and terms. The committee members are five-year terms. The term of Raymond Thieman of Petersburg expires in June 2020. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to re-appoint Raymond Thieman of Petersburg to a five-year term effective July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2025 to the Boone County Veterans Service Board. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Carrie Rodriguez, Chief Probation Officer for District Five Probation, submitted the 2019 District Five Probation report and 2020-2021 fiscal year budget request for the Board to review. Due to the COVID-19 concerns Rodriguez did not visit the County Board in person. The eleven counties comprising the Nebraska Supreme Court District Five Probation consists of: Boone, Butler, Colfax, Hamilton, Merrick, Nance, Platte, Polk, Saunders, Seward and York counties. The District Five Probation's fifty-five staff members served 2762 clients in 2019. The District Five Probation served forty-nine adults and fourteen juveniles for Boone County in 2019. Due to the clients served (2018 - 63, 2019 - 63) remaining the same in the county, the Boone County share of the 2020-2021 fiscal year budget will decrease by approximately \$48.96 from \$8,078.40 to \$8,029.44. The District 5 Probation budget has been approved by the Platte County Commissioners as the principal county for the district. Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen, to accept and approve the District Five Probation 2019 activity report and the 2020-2021 fiscal year budget request as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Rasmussen and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board received and reviewed three quotes for the copy paper for the county courthouse fiscal year 2020-2021. The quote request was for fifty cases of no less than 96 bright and no less than 20 lb. paper. The fifty cases to be delivered at one time after July 1, 2020 with payment issued on July 13, 2020. A case of copy paper is 10 reams/5,000 sheets. The quotes received were: Albion News - \$30.50 per case; One Office Solution - \$36.00 per case; and Eakes Office Solutions - \$38.99 per case. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to accept the copy paper quote from Albion News and approve ordering the fifty cases as one order at \$30.50 per case for the fiscal year 2020-2021. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The County of Boone, Nebraska; City of Albion, Nebraska; Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc.; and Boone County Historical Society, Inc. had entered into Interlocal Agreements beginning in May of 1998, relating to the improvements on leased land to provide an area for the parking of recreational vehicles known as the City of Albion Campground, Albion, Nebraska. The Fairgrounds 1st Subdivision was approved in 2017 to correct the discrepancies with the metes and bounds legal descriptions and to clarify ownership of the real estate. An Annexation Plat for Fairgrounds 1st Subdivision, City of Albion was filed in 2018. The County of Boone transferred ownership of the real estate to the City of Albion known as the City of Albion Campground in 2019. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to approve Resolution No. 2020-16, terminating and taking precedence over County Resolution No. 2011-04 and all prior resolutions, leases and agreements, written or verbal, between said parties that pertained to the City of Albion Campground site. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The City of St. Edward's legal counsel submitted an Interlocal Agreement for the Board to review in regard to zoning services between the City of St. Edward and the County of Boone. The Nebraska Interlocal Cooperation Act permits political subdivisions to enter into agreements with one another for joint or cooperative action of the respective political entities. In March of 2020, the Board gave the City of St. Edward a notice terminating the Interlocal Agreement/County Resolution No. 2019-07/City Resolution No. 2019-04-01R effective June 30, 2020 as requested by the County Zoning Administrator.





The difference between the prior and newly submitted Interlocal Agreements is #3, the City of St. Edward will pay the sum of \$125.00 (previously \$100.00) per month to the County for a contribution towards the County employee's salary and office expenses. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Interlocal Agreement/County Resolution No. 2020-17 between the County of Boone, Nebraska and the City of St. Edward, Nebraska for zoning services. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Ryan D. Stearns, Architect with Joseph R. Hewgley & Assoc., Inc. submitted a Certificate of Substantial Completion AIA Document G704 – 017 for the Board to review. Substantial Completion is the stage in the progress of the work when the work or designated portion is sufficiently complete in accordance with the Contract Documents so that the owner can occupy or utilize the work for its intended use. A list of items to be completed or corrected is attached to the AIA document. The architect and construction company has signed the AIA document and upon the Board of Commissioners signing the AIA document, that would allow keys/key entry codes for the UNL Extension office personnel to enter the building. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Certificate of Substantial Completion AIA Document G704-2017 as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen, and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension Educator, updated the Board of office activity and UNL Educators/staff plans to re-enter into their respective offices. Pritchard said that they will continue to follow recommended health practices and continue to have restricted public access. Pritchard said that 4-H Clubs may begin in-person meetings and programs on June 15, 2020. Pritchard said that they have started to move office items to the new fairgrounds building. The red rock road material to establish a solid base for an access road to and a parking area for the extension office use at the new fairgrounds building has not been delivered to date.

The Board held a meeting with the Elected Officials/Department Heads:

- Chairman Rasmussen asked all present to join in the Pledge of Allegiance.
- The Board received information from NACO that Governor Ricketts press conference message included "In order for County Governments to receive funds, the County Courthouse and County Offices must be open for business to the public on a non-appointment basis by June 15, 2020" to receive reimbursement for COVID-19 related expenses.
- The Board; County Assessor; Clerk; Sheriff; Deputy Treasurer; Rod Nelson, Maintenance; Stacey Ziemba, Road Department; Mary Ziemba, Zoning; Jacqueline Wells, Veterans Service; Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension; and Pam Jochum, Attorney office employee; discussed re-opening of the county courthouse/facilities. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to re-open the Boone County Courthouse/facilities on Friday, June 12, 2020. Roll call vote: Yeas Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.
- The installation of the counter/window barriers for the courthouse offices are installed.
- The lobby area is to be marked on the floor for visitors to observe the six foot distance.
- Courthouse visitors are encouraged to wear masks and observe all rules on signage when entering the courthouse. Hand sanitizer is available for public use.
- The public is asked to continue conducting as much business as possible through the mail, email, fax, telephone or the drop-box located on the west side of the courthouse.
- Courthouse visitors are being asked to enter through the north door for business on the east half and the west doors for business on the west half of the building.



The County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road equipment repair/replacement, road/bridge maintenance, materials and projects. In addition, the following topics were discussed:

- The Notice to Landowners of their duty to mow weeds along the roadsides will be published in the newspapers this week.
- Updated the board regarding FEMA applications submitted for reimbursement from the 2019 flood damages.
- No quotes received to date for repair of the asphalt/black top roads.
- No estimates received to date of options to consider regarding the Pilot Knob Bridge.

- Commissioner Temme updated the Board on the Boone County Fair events that were discussed at the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. special meeting held on June 1, 2020.
- The Board received updated information from Northeast Nebraska Economic Development District.

Chairman Rasmussen declared the meeting adjourned at 12:55 P.M., with the next Board meeting scheduled for Monday, June 15, 2020.





#### BOONE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS JUNE 15, 2020 ALBION, NEBRASKA

The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska, met in regular session at 9:00 A.M. on Monday, June 15, 2020 in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Chairman Rasmussen called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Alan Rasmussen, Ben Rutten and Larry Temme. The State of Nebraska, Office of the Governor, issued Executive Order Number 20-03 Coronavirus Public Meetings Requirement Limited Waiver, which was scheduled to end on May 31, 2020. Governor Pete Ricketts, issued Executive Order No. 20-24, continued limited waiver of certain requirements of the Nebraska Open Meetings Act to remain in effect through June 30, 2020. The Executive Order allows governing bodies (Board of Commissioners) to meet by videoconference or by telephone conference. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Rasmussen acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the County Board Proceedings of June 8, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Temme to approve the Boone County Board of Equalization Proceedings of June 8, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

As provided by State Statute, Section 23-1302, the County Clerk shall certify to the County Treasurer as of June 15 and December 15 each year the total amount of unpaid claims of the county. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve and accept the Certification from the County Clerk to the County Treasurer as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

On October 21, 2019 the Board approved and authorized the Boone County Treasurer to set up a separate bank account for the Limited Tax County Road Bonds, Series 2019 (Highway Allocation Fund Pledge Bonds) and that the interest from the bond account be identified/transferred to the General Fund. The said bond proceeds are for road/bridge infrastructure repair due to the adverse weather conditions of 2019. The Boone County Treasurer is requesting authorization from the Boone County Board of Commissioners to close said separate bank account due to the bond funds have been disbursed to the Road Fund (0200) and the interest to the General Fund (0100). Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve and authorize the Boone County Treasurer to close the separate bank account that was previously set up to receive the Limited Tax County Road Bonds, Series 2019 (Highway Allocation Fund Pledge Bonds). Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board and Stacey Ziemba, Boone County Highway Superintendent, met with Dave and Lisa Skillstad to discuss options regarding an access road to real estate located south of Fairview Street and east of 2<sup>nd</sup> Street. Skillstad's plan to construct a residential home on the property located south of Fairview Street that is undeveloped and currently not annexed into city limits, but is adjacent to property that is annexed into city limits. Skillstad's are inquiring which entity, the City of Albion or the County of Boone, they are to obtain an access road to said property from. Skillstad's would like to enter said property from the south off of an access road that runs on the south side of the property, known as Fuller Street to area residents.





The City of Albion informed Skillstad's that Fuller Street is not a dedicated city street beyond the corner of 2<sup>nd</sup> and Fuller Street to the east. Lorrie Nicklasson, Deputy County Clerk, prepared maps with the real estate information in accordance with the Register of Deed records and reviewed the information with Skillstad's and Ziemba. The review of the real estate records indicate that land dedicated for roads vary in width. Ziemba noted that Nebraska Department of Transportation (NDOT) has standards for a remote residential road classification that could be used for said access road. The standards for a remote residential road classification shall allow for one-lane traffic where sight distance is adequate to warn motorists of oncoming traffic and appropriate signage to adequately warn members of the public that they are traveling on a one-lane road. Ziemba plans to contact the State of Nebraska, Department of Transportation and JEO Consulting Group, Inc. (Engineer) to clarify if the remote residential road classification may be used to allow an access road to said property.

Jeff Jarecki was appointed Boone County Public Defender in August of 2012. Jarecki reported that the cases assigned in 2012 through 2017 are all completed and only one juvenile case remains open for 2018. Jarecki updated the Board in regard to Public Defender assigned cases: 2018 – 47 cases with 44 closed, 2 conflicts and 1 open; 2019 – 38 cases with 32 closed, 1 conflict and 5 open; and 2020 to date – 19 cases with 6 closed, 1 conflict and 12 open. Jarecki explained to the Board that some juvenile cases take a long time to complete and that some individuals may have more than one case. Juvenile cases may remain open until the court case is resolved or the age of nineteen. Jarecki answered the Board's questions regarding conflict of interest and closed/open cases. Jarecki explained that there are times when he cannot defend the assigned case since he is/has already defending one of the parties involved. Jarecki explained that his office tries to emphasize rehabilitation for those facing criminal charges and treat the individuals with respect. The Board thanked Jarecki for the updated report and his diligent services. Jarecki thanked the Board and is very appreciative of the contract for public defender services. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to accept the Boone County Public Defender report as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Fund 2913 "911 Wireless Service Fund" was established by the Nebraska Auditor of Public Accounts and receives the Nebraska Public Service Commission funding for public safety answering points for the implementation and provision of Enhanced Wireless 911 services. The percentage of the set aside funds left in Fund 2913 is to be transferred either to the Fund 2914 "911 Wireless Service Holding Fund" for the funds set aside for future equipment and software purchases or to the Fund 0100 "General Fund" for the funding of salaries for 911 dispatching services before the close of the fiscal year end June 30<sup>th</sup> each year. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to approve Resolution No. 2020-18, authorizing Laurie Krohn, Boone County Treasurer, to transfer the sum of \$64,588.42 from the 911 Wireless Service Fund (2913) to the payroll General Fund (0100) as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Hilary Maricle, UNL Engagement Zone 6 Coordinator, presented a Lease Agreement drafted by UNL Real Estate office to the Board for their review on May 27, 2020. A Lease Agreement document would be between County of Boone and the UNL Board of Regents. An agreement would be for the UNL Engagement Zone 6 Coordinator to rent/occupy office space in the new fairgrounds building, to be known as Boone County Agricultural Education Center. The Board made some suggestions on May 27, 2020 that they would like changed to the Lease Agreement drafted document. The majority of the suggested changes were made to the agreement. There were three suggested changes that were not reflected in the new revised document. Maricle informed the Board that she has not received any correspondence from UNL in regard to the three changes that were not reflected in the revised document and has not received any correspondence from the County Attorney's review of the agreement. The Lease Agreement will be further discussed at a future Board meeting.



In addition, the Board would like to discuss revisions to the 1997 Interlocal Agreement for the provisions of Cooperative Extension Services with UNL, due to the UNL Extension office moving from the courthouse to the new fairgrounds building this month of June. The 1997 agreement has not been updated or revised in the past twenty years in regard to the UNL Extension services. The Board would like to address both the 1997 Interlocal Agreement for revisions and the new Lease Agreement with UNL Board of Regents at the same time.

Chairman Rasmussen called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Larry Temme, Alan Rasmussen and Ben Rutten. The State of Nebraska, Office of the Governor, issued Executive Order Number 20-03 Coronavirus Public Meetings Requirement Limited Waiver, which was scheduled to end on May 31, 2020. Governor Pete Ricketts, issued Executive Order No. 20-24, continued limited waiver of certain requirements of the Nebraska Open Meetings Act to remain in effect through June 30, 2020. The Executive Order allows governing bodies (Board of Commissioners) to meet by videoconference or by telephone conference. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Rasmussen acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

The Board reviewed the County Payroll Claims filed for the pay period of May 22, 2020 through June 21, 2020. The Board noted/questioned several hours of overtime for the pay period. The Board noted/questioned the differential jailer/dispatcher night shift pay. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the County Board Proceedings of June 15, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to approve the County Board of Equalization Proceedings of June 15, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Boone County Ambulance Service is registered with the Drug Enforcement Administration. Every three years a renewal registration application needs to be completed and a non-refundable fee needs to be sent to the Drug Enforcement Administration. The requirements are under the Controlled Substances Act. The current registration expires July 31, 2020. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Renewal Application for Registration for \$731.00 registration fee for three years payable to the Drug Enforcement Administration for the Boone County Ambulance with a new expiration of July 31, 2023 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.





On May 29, 2019 the Governor approved LB525, regarding the transfer of real estate ownership between governmental entities/political subdivisions that became effective on September 1, 2019. John Morgan, County Attorney, suggested that the Board may transfer said real estate to the Boone County Historical Society, Inc. pursuant to Nebraska State Statute §23-107.01(2). The county board shall print and publish in a legal county newspaper a notice stating the legal description and address of the real estate at least thirty days prior to the transfer. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to publish in the Albion News, a weekly newspaper on Wednesday, July 1, 2020, a Notice of Intent to Transfer Real Estate from the County of Boone, Nebraska to the Boone County Historical Society, Inc.; All of Lot One (1), Fairgrounds 1st Subdivision, located in part of the Northeast Quarter (NE1/4) of Section Twenty-eight (28), Township Twenty (20) North, Range Six (6) West of the 6th P.M., Boone County, Nebraska, known as the Boone County Museum, Albion, Nebraska. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed a written resignation from a full-time County Sheriff's office employee. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to accept and approve the resignation of Mercedes Hemmingsen effective August 6, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Denise Ziemba, Region 44 Emergency Manager, updated the Board in regard to Emergency Management activities. Ziemba informed the Board that she responded to two liquid fertilizer truck spill accidents the past week. Ziemba said that she is working on a grant for a new siren for a fire department in Nance County and has updated the Merrick and Nance Counties Local Emergency Operations Plan (LEOP).

On May 18, 2020 Ziemba presented a revised Interlocal Agreement for the Board to review. The Board had asked Ziemba to discuss the budget funding option with Nance and Merrick County Boards. The present Interlocal Agreement for Emergency Management Services by and between the Counties of Boone, Nance and Merrick is effective through June 30, 2024. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the revised Interlocal Agreement for Emergency Management Services by and between the Counties of Boone, Nance and Merrick for the duration of July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2024 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Ross Davidson was unable to attend the Board meeting.

The County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road equipment repair/replacement, road/bridge maintenance, materials and projects. In addition, the following topics were discussed:

- NRCS documents to be completed for FEMA project, Cedar Rapids Northwest Bridge 6(00715) on 150<sup>th</sup> Avenue south of State Highway 52.
- A hydraulic study will need to be completed first before repairing Bridge #00405, located on 110<sup>th</sup> Street, one/half mile west of 110<sup>th</sup> Avenue.

The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska, met in regular session at 9:03 A.M. on Monday, June 29, 2020 in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Chairman Rasmussen called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Ben Rutten, Larry Temme and Alan Rasmussen. The State of Nebraska, Office of the Governor, issued Executive Order Number 20-03 Coronavirus Public Meetings Requirement Limited Waiver, which was scheduled to end on May 31, 2020. Governor Pete Ricketts, issued Executive Order No. 20-24, continued limited waiver of certain requirements of the Nebraska Open Meetings Act to remain in effect through June 30, 2020. The Executive Order allows governing bodies (Board of Commissioners) to meet by videoconference or by telephone conference. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Rasmussen acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve a letter signed by the County of Boone, Nebraska and Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. to the Nebraska Community Foundation in appreciation of the anonymous grant and agree to provide ongoing maintenance for the new fairgrounds building project known as the Boone County Agricultural Education Center. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Boone County Ambulance Service submitted a June 2017 uncollectible ambulance account that the Board reviewed on April 15, 2019 and turned over to the County Attorney for further collection. Three years has lapsed since the date of the Ambulance Service and no payments were received from the patient or collected by the County Attorney on said County Ambulance Service account. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to write-off the June 2017 County Ambulance Service account in the amount of \$1,015.00. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to approve the County Board Proceedings of June 24, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Rasmussen and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the County Board of Equalization Proceedings of June 24, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

In November of 2016 the County of Boone purchased a fraction of the NE1/4 of Section 28, Township 20 North, Range 6 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska, known as the Kohtz property south of and adjacent to the Boone County Fairgrounds property. In December 1967 a permanent easement was assigned to the City of Albion to maintain and construct an earthen dam with spillways on said property that is currently owned by the County. The "Kohtz-City of Albion Detention Dam" was approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service and filed with the State of Nebraska, Department of Water Resources in December 1967. The City of Albion has sold the former swimming pool property to the Boone County Health Center for their facility expansion project. The Board's decision to transfer the approximate 10.93 acres of property known as the "Kohtz-City of Albion Dam" to the City of Albion, could possibly help the City of Albion to fulfill their requirement of replacing the former swimming pool property (a grant from the Game & Parks Department for purpose of outdoor recreation) with property of equal or greater value for outdoor recreation.





On April 20, 2020 the Board approved publishing the Notice of Intent to Transfer Real Estate from the County of Boone, Nebraska to the City of Albion, Nebraska in the Albion News, weekly newspaper on April 22, 2020. The county board shall print and publish in a legal county newspaper a notice stating the legal description/address of the real estate at least thirty days prior to the transfer. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign a Warranty Deed from the County of Boone, Nebraska to the City of Albion, Nebraska upon the acceptance by the City of Albion, transferring a tract of land comprising a part of the Northeast Quarter (NE1/4) of Section 28, Township 20 North, Range 6 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska of approximately 10.93 acres commonly known as the Kohtz-City of Albion Dam. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Mitchell J. Patzel, requested permission to trench an 8" water line for irrigation purposes across a county road commonly known as 110<sup>th</sup> Avenue running North and South between Sections 29 and 30, all in Township 20 North, Range 8 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska. The water line commences from an existing well located in the SE1/4 of Section 30; thence trenching East across 110<sup>th</sup> Avenue to a new irrigation system to be located in the SW1/4 of Section 29, all in Township 20 North, Range 8 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to approve Resolution No. 2020-19, granting permission to Mitchell J. Patzel to trench an 8" water line across a county road known as 110<sup>th</sup> Avenue to the SW1/4 of Section 29, Township 20 North, Range 8 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska, for a new irrigation system. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Viaero Fiber Networks, LLC, requested permission to plow/trench/directional bore fiber to a Viaero Wireless Tower in a County road right-of-way on the West side of 250<sup>th</sup> Avenue running North and South between Sections 27 and 28, all in Township 20 North, Range 6 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska. The fiber commences from the City of Albion city limits of 6<sup>th</sup> Street and 250<sup>th</sup> Avenue; thence South in the County road right-of-way on the West side of 250<sup>th</sup> Avenue for approximately one mile; thence directional bore under 250<sup>th</sup> Avenue East to an existing Viaero Wireless Tower located in the SW/4 of Section 27, Township 20 North, Range 6 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve Resolution No. 2020-20, granting permission to Viaero Fiber Networks, LLC to plow/trench/directional bore fiber in a County road right-of-way on the West side of 250<sup>th</sup> Avenue and directional bore under 250<sup>th</sup> Avenue East to an existing Viaero Wireless Tower located in the SW/4 of Section 27, Township 20 North, Range 6 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed easement documents and construction plans submitted by the County Highway Superintendent from Brian McDonald, Engineer with JEO Consulting Group, Inc., for Bridge Project C-6(393), Petersburg East on May 27, 2020. Right-of-way has been purchased to repair bridge. The Bridge Project C-6(393), Bridge 6(11215) located on 150<sup>th</sup> Street east of 330<sup>th</sup> Avenue was advertised for bid letting to open sealed bids on Monday, June 29, 2020. The sealed bids received for said bridge project: A & R Construction Co. of Plainview, NE - \$208,352.30 and Van Kirk Bros. Contracting of Sutton, NE - \$271,057.05. Bruce Meisner, A & R Construction Co., was present to represent the company. Steve Ragoss, Van Kirk Bros. Contracting, was present to represent the company. The Board, Highway Superintendent and McDonald reviewed and discussed the bids. McDonald said that the bridge portion of the Road/Bridge Buyback Program, Budget Fund (0650) may be used for said project. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to accept and recommend approval of the A & R Construction Co. of Plainview, NE bid for the Bridge Project C-6(393),Bridge 6(11215), Petersburg East for \$208,352.30, dependent upon full review of the construction cost bids by Brian McDonald, JEO Engineer. Roll call vote: Yes: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.





The Board, County Highway Superintendent, and Brian McDonald, Engineer with JEO Consulting Group, Inc., discussed Bridge Project C-6(398), Raeville East on March 9, 2020. No right-of-way will need to be obtained to repair bridge. The Bridge Project C-6(398), Bridge 6(23340) located on 260<sup>th</sup> Avenue, <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> mile North of 120<sup>th</sup> Street was advertised for bid letting to open sealed bids on Monday, June 29, 2020. The sealed bids received for said bridge project: A & R Construction Co. of Plainview, NE - \$139,832.74 and Van Kirk Bros. Contracting of Sutton, NE - \$179,196.70. Bruce Meisner, A & R Construction Co., was present to represent the company. Steve Ragoss, Van Kirk Bros. Contracting, was present to represent the company. The Board, Highway Superintendent and McDonald reviewed and discussed the bids. McDonald said that the bridge portion of the Road/Bridge Buyback Program, Budget Fund (0650) may be used for said project. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to accept and recommend approval of the A & R Construction Co. of Plainview, NE bid for the Bridge Project C-6(398), Raeville East for \$139,832.74, dependent upon full review of the construction cost bids by Brian McDonald, JEO Engineer. Roll call vote: Yes: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Brian McDonald, JEO Consulting Group, Inc., submitted a Certificate of Substantial Completion for the St. Edward Southwest Bridge (FEMA) Project C000605015P for the Board to review. The bid letting to open sealed bids for said project was held on March 9, 2020. The St. Edward Southwest Bridge connects with the City of St. Edward sewage lagoon. McDonald suggested that the County transfer ownership of this bridge to the City of St. Edward because it does not connect to a county road. The work to the Bridge Project C000605015P has been inspected by authorized representatives of Owner, Contractor and Engineer and found to be substantially complete. The payment for said project will be issued from the Road Fund in regard to the 2019 flood damage with the funds from the Highway Allocation Bond Repay 2019 Series. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Certificate of Substantial Completion of the St. Edward Southwest Bridge (FEMA) Project C000605015P and issue payment of \$98,494.60 to Theisen Construction, Inc. of Norfolk, NE as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board, County Highway Superintendent, and Brian McDonald, Engineer with JEO Consulting Group, Inc., discussed several road/bridge issues/projects. Some of the following projects discussed with no final decisions made at this time:

- A bridge known as Pilot Knob Bridge (FEMA project) near Primrose. A portion of this bridge was destroyed in the March 2019 flood. McDonald's estimates for repair is \$300,000.00 or for complete removal of bridge/not replacing the bridge is \$200,000.00.
- A bridge south of St. Edward on 350<sup>th</sup> Street west of State Highway 39.
- A hydraulic study will need to be completed for Bridge #00405, located on 110<sup>th</sup> Street, ½ mile west of 110<sup>th</sup> Avenue.
- Drainage issue on 300<sup>th</sup> Avenue south of State Highway 56, landowner responsibility to put a culvert in driveway.
- A bridge located in SE1/4 of 17-20-6, is not a county bridge, McDonald will meet with landowner.
- Re-grade a portion of 140<sup>th</sup> Avenue, approximate cost of \$90,000.00 to \$150,000.00.
- Approximately 3.75 miles of asphalt roads: golf course, airport and fairgrounds estimate is 1.5 million for 4" asphalt or 1.8 million for 4" concrete. Concrete life cycle is usually 25 years while asphalt is 10-15 years. Estimate does not include any bridge repair if needed.
- Approximately 4.5 miles of 255<sup>th</sup> Avenue asphalt road north of Albion estimate is 1.6 million for 4" asphalt and due to heavy truck traffic would probably not last 10 years.
- The asphalt paving (black top roads), McDonald informed the Board that Mid-State Construction has completed the core testing.



The County Highway Superintendent and Brian McDonald, Engineer with JEO Consulting Group, Inc., submitted documents from the Natural Resources Conservation Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture for the Cedar Rapids Northwest Bridge 6(00715) Project (FEMA) located on 150<sup>th</sup> Avenue south of State Highway 52. The documents address rock rip rap to stabilize and protect eroding banks, etc. for the 2019 flood damaged FEMA bridge project. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Natural Resources Conservation Service documents for the Cedar Rapids Northwest Bridge 6(600715) Project (FEMA) as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board held a Public Hearing on January 27, 2020 for the purpose of hearing public comments and to discuss the issue of the elected office of a County Surveyor. The Nebraska Revised Statute §32-525, County Surveyor; election; when required; terms; qualifications was discussed. The Board did not adopt a resolution to continue to elect the County Surveyor for the County prior to February 1, 2020. Therefore, the Board decided to submit to the voters of Boone County, Nebraska the question of electing a Boone County Surveyor at the November 3, 2020 General Election. At the 2020 General Election the voters will decide the future of the County Surveyor office to either continue to be an Elected Office or to become an Appointed Office by the Board of Commissioners. The Boone County Surveyor positon has been filled by a County Board appointment for several years due to there being no County resident that is a licensed surveyor. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to approve Resolution No. 2020-21, that the resolution be presented to the Boone County Election Commissioner and hereby is directed to place on the ballot at the November 3, 2020, General Election: "For election of county surveyor" the office continues to be an elected position. "Against election of county surveyor" the office becomes an appointed position by the Board of Commissioners. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

On February 26, 2020 the Board requested an audit proposal from Nebraska Auditor of Public Accounts and accepted their audit proposal on March 16, 2020 to audit the county governmental activities. The Board reviewed an Engagement Letter for auditing services for the 2019-2020 fiscal year submitted by Nebraska Auditor of Public Accounts. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Audit Engagement Letter for auditing services for the 2019-2020 fiscal year as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Denny Johnson, County Sheriff; John Buck, Chief Deputy Sheriff; and the Board discussed the jailer/dispatcher wage information that Johnson provided on June 24, 2020 for the Board to review. Johnson and Buck said that the jailer/dispatch position is just not receiving a pool of applicants to select from as it is hard to find people to work nights, weekends and holidays. The Board plans to discuss the information during the 2020-2021 budget preparation.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to come out of the executive session at 9:16 A.M. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Temme to approve a portion of the employee assistance request. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board approved and signed a letter addressed to the Nebraska Community Foundation on June 29, 2020. Chuck Rolf, Kurt Kruse and Bill Robinson, members of the Boone County Agricultural Education Center, Inc. informed the Board that the anonymous grant foundation is requesting additional information that was not addressed in the June 29, 2020 letter. Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to approve a revised letter signed by the County of Boone, Nebraska and Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. to the Nebraska Community Foundation in appreciation of the anonymous grant and agree to provide ongoing maintenance for the new fairgrounds building project known as the Boone County Agricultural & Educational Center. Stacey Ziemba, Boone County Highway Superintendent and the Board discussed several road/bridge issues/projects. Some of the following projects discussed with no final decisions made at this time:

- Ziemba informed the Board that Brian McDonald, Engineer with JEO Consulting Group, Inc., plans to prepare estimates for the repair of a bridge known as Pilot Knob Bridge (FEMA project) near Primrose and asphalt roads near Albion known as cemetery, fairgrounds and golf course roads.
- The cemetery road near Cedar Rapids needs some cracks repaired.
- Pat Gubbels, Theisen Construction, Inc. updated the Board and Highway Superintendent on the Cedar Rapids Northwest Bridge 6(00715) Project (FEMA) located on 150<sup>th</sup> Avenue south of State Highway 52. The cost may be considerably higher due to Theisen Construction has worked eleven days on the project and little progress has been made. Gubbels said that a wing of the bridge was scoured out and is against the bridge backwall and the wings/sheet piling are extra deep in the Cedar River. So far Theisen Construction has dug approximately 24' and not been able to dig out the wings/sheet piling out of the sand/water of the Cedar River. The 2019 flood damage that changed the Cedar River streamflow is presenting unforeseen circumstances for the bridge repair project.

The Board did not receive the change order documents to review for said bridge project. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to table a change order for the Cedar Rapids Northwest Bridge 6(00715) Project





(FEMA) to a future Board meeting. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed and discussed the Accounts Payable Vendor Claims filed for payment. The Board reviewed Vendor ID No. 1785 in the amount of \$27.60 and Vendor ID No. 677 in the amount of \$76.69 that were submitted for mileage reimbursement. The Board discussed the mileage reimbursement requests with the travel being within/jurisdiction of the Albion City limits. The Vendor ID No. 1785 in the amount of \$27.60 and a portion of Vendor ID No. 677 in the amount of \$1.34, mileage reimbursement request, is for travel being within/jurisdiction of the Albion City limits. The County budget property tax request for 2018-2019 fiscal year was \$3,679,011.00 with a 2018 levy tax rate of 0.153638 and the property tax request for 2019-2020 fiscal year was \$4,262,835.00 with a 2019 levy tax rate of 0.176883. The preliminary property tax request for 2020-2021 fiscal year budget is \$9,553,397.00 which is a \$5,290,562.00 increase from last fiscal year budget request.





The majority of the increase is in the County Road Fund (0200) for infrastructure repair/replacement of bridges/roads. The County Assessor's office has until August 20<sup>th</sup> each year to certify the valuations in order to set tax levies. Martinsen plans to meet with the Board on August 17 and 26, 2020 to review the preliminary budget requests due to a minimum of five million needs to be cut from the General Fund and Road Fund requests in order to be under the 3% lid if the 2020 valuation remains/close to the 2019 valuation. If the 2020 valuation is lower than the 2019 valuation more than the five million will need to be cut from the budget expense requests. Stacey Ziemba, Boone County Highway Superintendent and the Board discussed several road/bridge issues/projects, equipment repair, culvert replacements and shop building repairs. In addition, the following topics were discussed:

- Theisen Construction, Inc. are moving along on the Cedar Rapids Northwest Bridge 6(00715) Project (FEMA) located on 150<sup>th</sup> Avenue south of State Highway 52. The 2019 flood damage that changed the Cedar River streamflow is presenting unforeseen circumstances for the bridge repair project. The construction company has had to go down 100 feet to reach bearing for the H-piling support beams.
- The County Highway Superintendent plans to place some unused road items/materials on the annual FFA auction that is scheduled for Saturday, August 15, 2020.
- The County Highway Superintendent and the Board discussed the current procedure when a property owner requests a culvert to be installed under a driveway. Currently the County is billed and pays the culvert supplier the full culvert cost and then the County bills the property owner their share. The property owner is responsible for half of the cost of the culvert. The Board felt it would be best if the property owner could be billed their share from the culvert supplier.

Michelle Olson, BCDA, Inc. Executive Director, was unable to attend the Board meeting and has re-scheduled the review of the Membership Agreement for fiscal year 2020-2021 to Wednesday, August 26, 2020.

Michelle Olson, BCDA, Inc. Executive Director, was unable to attend the Board meeting and has re-scheduled the review of the Disbursement Agreement for fiscal year 2020-2021 to Wednesday, August 26, 2020.

The primary use of the Boone County Visitors Promotion Fund is to promote, encourage and attract visitors to come to the county through advertisement of the event. The Boone County Visitors Promotion Committee





received a request for advertisement funding. The St. Edward Development Company requested assistance to advertise the Vintage in the Valley event scheduled for September 19, 2020. Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to approve the application requesting funding assistance for advertisement of the St. Edward Development Company, Vintage in the Valley, event from the Visitor's Promotion Fund as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Absent: Temme. Motion carried.

The Board; Rod Nelson, Maintenance; and Denny Johnson, Sheriff, discussed a building for the County to use for surplus storage and law enforcement impounded items on May 11 and 27, 2020. The Board approved a letter of termination for Lease Agreement-Storage Unit Number 33 and Lease Agreement-Storage Unit Number 31 to Kayton International, Inc. of Albion, Nebraska on July 20, 2020 with an effective date of termination being August 31, 2020. The Board, Nelson, Johnson and Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, discussed the protocol and procedure to move the County storage items to a building at the fairgrounds and security preparation of the round metal quonset building located at the Boone County Fairgrounds. The County plans to utilize the southwest corner of the quonset building to secure storage for county surplus items and law enforcement impounded items. Nelson and Johnson will move the items from the present storage to the new storage location. Nelson and Johnson will proceed with plans for a partition and lockable roll-up door to secure the stored items. The only access key for said storage building will be in the possession of the Boone County Sheriff's office.

The Board and Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, discussed the removal of the old concrete office/restroom building and former petting zoo building that is located west of the office/restrooms. Rolf informed the Board that the petting zoo building is for sale and will be removed, but the concrete floor will need to be removed. The Board plans to seek quotes for removal/disposal of the old former concrete fairground office/restroom/floor building and the concrete floor of the former petting zoo building from Bygland Dirt Contracting, Inc. and Seda Land Handling, LLC.

The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska, met in regular session at 9:00 A.M. on Monday, August 17, 2020 in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Chairman Rasmussen called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Ben Rutten, Alan Rasmussen and Larry Temme. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Rasmussen acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Commissioner Ben Rutten, Chairman of the Boone County Safety Committee, opened the safety meeting at 9:01 A.M. to discuss routine business. The following committee members were present for the quarterly meeting: Commissioners Ben Rutten, Larry Temme and Alan Rasmussen; Rod Nelson, Courthouse Maintenance; and Kathy Thorberg, County Clerk. Rod Nelson, Courthouse Safety Coordinator presented the old and new business. Old business that was addressed/reviewed: (1) A Courthouse fire drill was held on Friday, May 29, 2020 at 8:15 A.M.; (2) Copies of the County Safety Manual were distributed to Department Heads to give to their respective employees on June 2, 2020; (3) The courthouse door had been locked due to COVID-19 and re-opened to the public on Friday, June 12, 2020; (4) Nelson said that there is currently a good supply of masks, hand sanitizer and other disinfectant items on hand; and (5) The Road District #2 shop building has some safety issues that needs to be addressed. New business that was addressed/reviewed: (1) No incidents were reported by Boone County to NIRMA for the second quarter of 2020 and as of June 30, 2020 all prior claims have been closed; and (2) A county road department semi-truck tractor received damage due to hitting a deer crossing the road and was reported on July 2, 2020. The Safety Committee meeting was adjourned by Commissioner Ben Rutten, Chairman of the Boone County Safety Committee at 9:12 A.M. The next quarterly Safety Meeting is scheduled for November 16, 2020.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to approve the County Board Proceedings of August 10, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Abstain: Temme. Motion carried.

Tina Landauer, Boone County Legion Commander/CFO, was unable to attend the Board meeting and has rescheduled the information regarding County Legion Government Day and Oratorical Speech Contest to Wednesday, August 26, 2020.

The Board met with the County Elected Officials/Department Heads to discuss preparation for the 2020-2021 budget on July 20, 2020. The Board suggested spending cuts where possible due to the infrastructure damage from the March 2019 storms. The Board asked that there be none or very little increase for operating line codes from the prior year request. The infrastructure damage in 2019 to the County roads, bridges, etc. is not all repaired yet. The Board did approve a 38 cent per hour cost of living wage increase for full time employees for year 2021. The Board met with Richard Martinsen, CPA, Schmeits, Mueller & Martinsen, P. C., on July 27, 2020 and discussed the preliminary 2020-2021 budget requests submitted by the county departments. The preliminary property tax request for 2020-2021 fiscal year budget was \$9,553,397.00 which is a \$5,290,562.00 increase from last fiscal year budget request. The County Elected Officials/Department Heads were asked to review their 2020-2021 budget requests for possible reduction, before the August 17, 2020 Board meeting, due to a minimum of five million needs to be cut from the General Fund and Road Fund requests in order to be at or under the 3% lid.





Martinsen provided answers to questions asked with regard to the proposed budget. The proposed property tax increase request is primarily in the County Road Fund. A portion of the Road Fund Highway Allocation revenue that is received each year is designated to pay the fiscal year bond/interest payments for the seven year Limited Tax County Road Bonds Series 2019. In addition, two million dollars of the County Inheritance Tax Fund has been designated for use by the Road Fund in order to lower the tax levy request. Martinsen and the Board received the 2020 Certification of Taxable Values from the Boone County Assessor. The Boone County Total Taxable Value for 2020 is \$2,307,751,527.00 which is \$102,227,280.00 less than 2019. The Road Fund expense request was cut \$5,061,460.00 and the General Fund was cut \$59,309.00 in order to be in compliance with the 3% lid. The County budget property tax request for 2018-2019 fiscal year was \$3,679,011.00 with a 2018 levy tax rate of 0.153638; the property tax request for 2019-2020 fiscal year was \$4,262,835.00 with a 2019 levy tax rate of 0.176883; and the property tax request for 2020-2021 fiscal year is \$4,432,628.00 with a 2020 levy tax rate of 0.192076. The Interlocal Agreement Report (LB 51) (2017) is to be filed with the State Auditor's office on or before September 20<sup>th</sup> and impacts the county budget hearing, audits and contracts. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to accept the proposed budget requests for the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 County Budget hearing that is set for Monday, September 14, 2020 at 10:00 A.M. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

On or before August 1<sup>st</sup>, all political subdivisions subject to county levy authority shall submit a preliminary request for levy allocation to the County Board. The preliminary request shall be in the form of a resolution. The Nebraska State Statutes provides that each County Board shall adopt a resolution which determines a final allocation of levy authority and forward a copy of such resolution to the chairperson of the governing body of each of its political subdivisions by September 1<sup>st</sup>. The Boone County Board of Commissioners received levy allocation requests from various political subdivisions for the 2020-2021 fiscal year. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to approve Resolution No. 2020-23, authorizing the levy allocation requests for the 2020-2021 fiscal year for the Albion, Cedar Rapids, Petersburg, Primrose and St. Edward Rural Fire Districts (MFO levy of .020000), Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. (\$125,000.00) and Boone County Historical Society, Inc. (\$15,000.00). Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The County of Boone, State of Nebraska and the Boone County Historical Society, Inc. entered into a Lease Agreement on May 2, 1972. The County leased to the Historical Society real estate property being a fraction of the Northeast Quarter (NE1/4) of Section Twenty-eight (28), Township Twenty (20) North, Range Six (6) West of the 6th P.M., Boone County, Nebraska, for the construction of building(s) and use for Boone County Museum and Boone County Historical Society, Inc. purposes. The County Board approved surveying services of the County owned property in 2017 known as the Boone County Fairgrounds for property line ownership with complete legal descriptions. The Board approved the Fairgrounds 1<sup>st</sup> Subdivision in October of 2017 to correct the discrepancies with the metes and bounds legal descriptions and to clarify ownership of the real estate. The Annexation Plat for Fairgrounds 1<sup>st</sup> Subdivision, City of Albion, Boone County, Nebraska was filed in the Boone County Register of Deeds office on February 22, 2018. A research of records/documents says that the first building (museum) in 1970's was public donations; second building was by a 1988 Bond Election; other buildings, equipment, displays, etc. are donations; and a budget (levy allocation) for operating expenses. The transfer of the real estate with a Warranty Deed from the County of Boone, Nebraska to the Boone County Historical Society, Inc., terminates the 1972 Lease Agreement and all leases and agreements, written or verbal, between the parties that pertained to the Boone County Historical Society, Inc./Boone County Museum.

On June 24, 2020 the Board approved publishing a Notice of Intent to Transfer Real Estate from the County of Boone, Nebraska to the Boone County Historical Society, Inc. The county board shall print and publish in a legal county newspaper a notice stating the legal description and address of the real estate at least thirty days





prior to the transfer. The notice was published in the Albion News, a weekly newspaper on Wednesday, July 1, 2020.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign a Warranty Deed from the County of Boone, Nebraska, to the Boone County Historical Society, Inc. of Albion, Nebraska, the real estate being All of Lot One (1), Fairgrounds 1st Subdivision, located in part of the Northeast Quarter (NE1/4) of Section Twenty-eight (28), Township Twenty (20) North, Range Six (6) West of the 6th P.M., Boone County, Nebraska. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

All County Officials and Department Heads must contact the County Board, as an agenda item, before buying, leasing or doing any major maintenance to equipment or furniture over \$800.00, per the January 2020 Board Reorganizational Meeting Proceedings. Jacqueline Wells, Boone County Veterans Service Officer, presented quotes from Eakes Office Solutions and OfficeNet, Inc. for purchase or lease of a new or refurbished color copy machine for the Board to review. The Veteran's Service office present copy machine lease is completed and either needs to do a buyout or new lease or a purchase. The quotes received for a color copy machine: OfficeNet, Inc.: Savin IMC300F - \$2,991.00 new purchase, maintenance rates for two years - \$32.00/month (1,500 black/white; 200/color) or \$55.91/month (\$.012 per black/white; \$.069 per color) and Eakes Office Solutions: Sharp MX-2651 - \$5,990.00 new purchase or 60 month lease \$6,840.00 (\$114.00/mo.), maintenance rate for two years - \$.0079 per black/white and \$.0395 per color page; Sharp MC-C402SC - 60 month lease at \$96.00 per month refurbished machine with a maintenance rate billed quarterly - \$.0164 per black/white and \$.0967 per color page. The Board reviewed a document received from the State of Nebraska, Nebraska Liquor Control Commission, submitted by Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc., to add the new fairgrounds building "Boone County Agricultural Education Center" to their Liquor License # I-050811. The Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. applied for a liquor license in February 2001 for use in the Casey Community Building. In August 2006 the Boone County Event Center was added as a location for the said liquor license and the request today is to add the Boone County Agricultural Education Center location to the liquor license. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Application for Addition form to allow the Boone County Agricultural Education Center building to be added to the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. Liquor License # I-050811 in order to sell alcohol at events held in said new building. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to approve Resolution No. 2020-24, authorizing a Petty Cash Fund for a Boone County Treasurer Cash Drawer that reconciles to \$25.00 and is used when needed to make change when receiving payments of fees/copies/postage/taxes as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Barb Hanson, Boone County Assessor, submitted a Maintenance Agreement from Stanard Appraisal Services, Inc. of Central City, Nebraska for the Board to review. The agreement is for providing 32 hours of appraisal service from July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021 for pick up work of Boone County Commercial properties. The compensation for the basic agreement, including 32 hours of appraiser time will be \$3,296.00 and if the County requests more than 32 hours of appraiser time, the County will be billed at the rate of \$103.00 per hour for additional time on a monthly basis. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme, to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Maintenance Agreement for pick up work of Boone County Commercial properties for fiscal year 2020-2021 by and between Stanard Appraisal Services, Inc. and County of Boone,





Nebraska for 32 hours of appraisal service as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Barb Hanson, Boone County Assessor, submitted a Statement of Work for Project: Oblique Imagery Capture for Ag Parcels with Improvements, from gWorks for the Board to review. gWorks has flown Geographic Information System (GIS) integrated rural structure photography for many Nebraska counties. The digital data is delivered ready to use in the client's GIS program and each location captured by picture shows up as a point on the WebGIS. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Temme to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Digital Oblique Aerial Images cost of \$34,000.00 from gWorks for fly over images/pictures of the County rural properties in the fall of 2020 as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board; Hilary Maricle, UNL Engagement Zone 6 Coordinator; Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension Educator; Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc.; and Roger Voichoski, Boone/Nance Extension Board representative, discussed UNL Extension Agreements via zoom with Dave Varner, Interim Dean and Director of UNL Extension. The two documents in discussion are the Interlocal Agreement for the Provisions of Cooperative Extension Services dated December 1997 and a Constitution dated December 1998, signed by and between Boone County, Nance County and UNL. The Interlocal Agreement for UNL Extension Services was effective July 1, 1997 and today the recitals, covenants, terms, etc. are not applicable with the changes of the UNL Extension organizational structure. Varner said that UNL is working on standardized language for said revised agreements. Varner said there are details that have to be worked out between individual counties and UNL and it varies from county to county. The Board asked several questions on the various UNL Extension expenses that are being paid by the County Budget and not by UNL. Some of the questions were utilities, postage, copy machine, internet frees, computer equipment, travel expenses, mileage reimbursement, UNL student summer internship and wages for an office support/clerical employee. The Board asked why a UNL Extension Educator is receiving mileage from the county budget to get to their other designated work office when counties are combined for Extension services. Additional discussion is planned upon receiving a copy of the revised/updated agreement language from UNL Extension.

The Constitution, with Extension Board Bylaws included, was adopted in December of 1998. Varner said the details for a revised Constitution would need to be worked out between the Boone/Nance Extension Board and County Commissioners/Supervisors. UNL would review the revised/updated Constitution for acceptance before being approved by the counties.

Also discussed was a Lease Agreement that provides use of the new office space for UNL Extension in the new fairgrounds building "Boone County Agricultural Education Center", by Hilary Maricle, UNL Engagement Zone 6 Coordinator. A monthly rental fee of \$225.00 for use of office space in the new fairgrounds building has been discussed. The Lease Agreement has not yet been finalized.

Varner explained the changes in the Extension services that provides for specialized staff. Extension Educators are divided into seven program areas. Extension Educators such as beef and crop specialists, are headquartered in certain counties, but provide their services to several counties.

The Board has allowed smaller surplus county office equipment/furniture that is valued under \$100.00 to be tagged for sale in the hallway of the courthouse in past years. The Board discussed disposal of smaller county office equipment/furniture that is in storage or no longer in use by the county offices. The Board said that it is time to dispose of some of the items in storage that are not presently located in the courthouse and are being moved from one storage location to a new storage location. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to allow smaller surplus county office equipment/furniture that is valued under \$100.00 to be tagged for sale by





said office with tags identifying the office selling and dollar amount, all payable to the County Treasurer, in the hallway of the courthouse from August 31, 2020 through September 11, 2020. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

On August 10, 2020 the Board and Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc., discussed the removal/disposal of the old former concrete fairgrounds office/restroom/floor building and the concrete floor of the former petting zoo building. The Board decided to obtain quotes for removal/disposal of the old former concrete fairground office/restroom/floor building and the concrete floor of the former petting zoo building from Bygland Dirt Contracting, Inc. and Seda Land Handling, LLC. Rolf was present for the opening of the quotes and informed the Board that the utility companies have been notified for disconnect of said facilities, the petting zoo building has been sold for \$500.00 and the party has been told to have said building removed by September 1, 2020. The quotes received: Seda Land Handling, LLC - \$2,800.00, bid assumes building is free of asbestos; and Bygland Dirt Contracting, Inc. - \$3,750.00, bid includes required asbestos inspection. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to approve and accept the quote of \$2,800.00 from Seda Land Handling, LLC for the removal/disposal of the old former concrete fairgrounds office/restroom/floor building and the concrete floor of the former petting zoo building as soon as possible after September 1, 2020. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Rasmussen acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

The Board reviewed the County Payroll Claims filed for the pay period of July 22, 2020 through August 21, 2020. The Board noted/questioned several hours of overtime for the pay period. Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to approve the County Payroll Claims filed for payment from the various funds: General \$97,624.86, BCBS \$47,729.32, Ameritas Ret \$6,744.81, EFTPS \$7,279.98, LTD Premiums \$0.00, Section 125 Fees \$10.00, Wellness Program \$96.00; Road \$66,477.82, BCBS \$31,578.68, Ameritas Ret \$4,487.26, EFTPS \$5,016.36; Ambulance \$3,181.05, Ameritas Ret \$90.50, EFTPS \$243.33; and Public Defender Contract \$3,358.21. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Rasmussen and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the County Board Proceedings of August 17, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Pursuant to State Statute Section 23-347, within two calendar months after the close of each fiscal year, each county officer shall make, acknowledge under oath, and file with the County Board, of his or her county, an inventory statement of all county personal property in the custody and possession of said county officer. The County Board in each county shall examine into each inventory statement so filed, and, if said statement is correct and proper in every particular, the County Board shall deliver each of said inventory statements to the clerk of the county for filing as a public record in said county clerk's office in a manner convenient for reference. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the County Offices' 2019-2020 Inventories of county personal and real estate property as presented from the various offices and file the submitted inventories with the County Clerk's office as a public record in a manner convenient for reference. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

On July 27, 2020 the Board, John Morgan, Boone County Attorney, and Stacey Ziemba, Boone County Highway Superintendent, reviewed pending litigation and the Board authorized the County Attorney to respond to the litigation concerning a road issue. The Board, County Attorney and County Highway Superintendent discussed the plaintiff's allegations. The County Attorney plans to respond to the complaint filed by the plaintiff.

Tina Landauer, Boone County Legion Commander/CFO, was unable to attend the Board meeting and has rescheduled the information regarding County Legion Government Day and Oratorical Speech Contest to Monday, September 14, 2020.



The County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road equipment repair/replacement, road/bridge maintenance, materials and projects. In addition, the following topics were discussed with no action taken by the Board:

- Jebro, Inc. of Sioux City, Iowa plans to remove the oil from the oil tanker located at Albion Road Dist. #2 yards next week. Jebro is an oil collection and recycling company.
- The new truck tractor and gravel trailer for Road Dist. #2 is scheduled to arrive next week.
- Stacey Ziemba, County Highway Superintendent, informed the Board that she completed FEMA paperwork last week in regard to the 2019 flood damages, except for the two remaining bridge construction repairs. The remaining FEMA paperwork will be completed upon the completion of the two bridge construction projects.
- Ziemba said that the plan is to cover the minimum maintenance roads before the fall harvest begins.

Michelle Olson, BCDA, Inc. Executive Director, appeared before the Board regarding the Membership Agreement and Disbursement Agreement for fiscal year 2020-2021. Olson presented and reviewed a 2019-2020 BCDA RECAP report with the Board. Olson highlighted the areas of Business/Community Contributions, future grant opportunities, energizing entrepreneurs program, and launch a new promotional campaign for the county. The County of Boone, Nebraska financial contribution to BCDA, Inc. for 2019-2020 was \$109,000.00. The financial request from BCDA, Inc. for 2020-2021 is \$109,000.00. The BCDA, Inc. 2019-2020 budget was \$154,050.00 and the 2020-2021 budget request is \$154,050.00.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Membership Agreement for fiscal year 2020-2021 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Disbursement Agreement for fiscal year 2020-2021 committing a sum of \$109,000.00 payable to BCDA, Inc. from the County Inheritance Tax Fund payable in two payments as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board and Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc., discussed removal of the fairgrounds former old sheep/goat/swine building. Rolf said that the small livestock panels need to be removed from the facility. The Board and Rolf discussed advertising/listing the sale of said building facility for thirty days to see if there is any interest. The consensus of the Board is to allow the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. until October 31, 2020 to remove the livestock panels, etc. from the building and list/advertise for thirty days said building facility for sale to see if there is any interest in purchasing/moving the building. What is left of said building and concrete floor will be removed and disposed of the first week of November 2020.

Mary Ziemba, County Zoning Administrator, updated the Board and presented for the Board's review the modified construction permit documents she received for two animal feeding operations. The Board reviewed the document for James D. Pillen, PFF, LLC HLP Animal Feeding Operations located in the NE1/4 of 27-20-5, to modify the building from a sow facility to a finisher facility. In addition, the Board reviewed a document for Bonanza Cattle Company, LLC concentrated feeding operation located in the S1/2 of 18-21-8, to replace old pens and increase the size of pens in order to be more spread out with no increase to the head of livestock.

The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska, met in regular session at 9:00 A.M. on Monday, September 14, 2020 in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Chairman Rasmussen called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Alan Rasmussen, Larry Temme and Ben Rutten. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication and the convened meeting was open to the public. Chairman Rasmussen acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

The Board reviewed and discussed the Accounts Payable Vendor Claims filed for payment. The Board reviewed Vendor ID No. 238 in the amount of \$28.17; Vendor ID No. 677 in the amount of \$235.46; and Vendor ID No. 1378 in the amount of \$414.94 that were submitted for mileage reimbursement. The Board discussed the mileage reimbursement requests increase of one mile for each round trip from prior year's requests. The Boane County Employee Handbook addresses the use of Google Maps for direct route when not submitting the actual odometer readings for reimbursement. The Board rejected reimbursement of two miles for Vendor ID No. 238; eighteen miles for Vendor ID No. 677; and seventeen miles for Vendor ID No. 1378. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to partially reject the Boone County share of mileage reimbursement request for Vendor ID No. 238 and approve payment of \$27.60; Vendor ID No. 677 and approve payment of \$231.43; and Vendor ID No. 1378 and approve payment of \$408.97, with the use of Google Maps for direct route from address to address. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the Accounts Payable Vendor Claims filed for payment from the various funds, except for the changes as stated above: General - \$61,339.61; Road/Weed - \$437,734.22; Veteran's Aid (1900) - \$2,000.00; Inheritance Tax - \$54,500.00; 911 Emergency Management (2910) - \$482.54; 911 Wireless Service (2913) - \$458.57; Fair Building (4025) - \$50,000.00; and Ambulance - \$1,982.48. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board received a change order to review for consideration for the Cedar Rapids Northwest Bridge Project (FEMA) located on 150<sup>th</sup> Avenue south of State Highway 52 in the amount of \$28,000.00. The original project quote was \$352,821.48 from Theisen Construction, Inc. and the change order increases the bridge repair cost to \$380,821.48. The increase is for additional labor and equipment as they had to go down 100 feet to reach bearing for the H-piling support beams. The 2019 flood damage that changed the Cedar River streamflow presented unforeseen circumstances for the bridge repair project. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the Change Order Number 1 of \$28,000.00 as submitted for the added labor and equipment use for the construction of the bridge project for a total amount of \$380,821.48. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board received Payment Application No. 1 from Theisen Construction, Inc. of Norfolk, NE for the Cedar Rapids Northwest Bridge Project. The payment request is for a portion of the mobilization, general clearing and grubbing, preparation of bridge and additional labor and equipment to attempt to remove damaged abutments. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Temme to approve Payment Application No. 1 amount of \$84,502.44 from Theisen Construction, Inc. as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.



Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the County Board Proceedings of August 26, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to approve the following reports of the County Officials as presented for August, 2020:

Patrick Cleveland, 3C's Cleveland's Café & Catering, submitted an application for Special Designated License (SDL) for October 10, 2020. The Board reviewed the application for Special Designated License (SDL) for a wedding reception scheduled for Saturday, October 10, 2020 at the Creek Road Barn, 1846 330<sup>th</sup> Avenue, Newman Grove, Nebraska. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve, as submitted, the Application for Special Designated Liquor License request from 3C's Cleveland's Café & Catering for a wedding reception to be held at the Creek Road Barn, Newman Grove, Boone County, Nebraska on October 10, 2020 as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Stacey Ziemba, Boone County Highway Superintendent and the Board discussed several road/bridge issues/projects, equipment repair, culvert replacements and shop building repairs. In addition, the following topics were discussed:

- Ziemba updated the Board in regard to the county road department surplus equipment and materials that were no longer being used and were sold on the 2020 FFA Auction.
- Ziemba and the Board discussed the mechanical issues and repairs needed for the county road sign truck. No decision was made at the meeting.
- The Jebro, Inc. of Sioux City, Iowa removed 5140 gallons of oil from the oil tanker located at Albion Road Dist. #2 yards last week. Jebro is an oil collection and recycling company. The Board and Highway Superintendent discussed disposition of the 1956 Joplin oil tank trailer that is now empty. No decision was made at the meeting.
- Ziemba and the Board discussed that crops continue to be planted in the county road right-of-ways and
  that some type of action needs to be enforced in order for the planting in right-of-ways to no longer
  continue.
- A large cottonwood tree branch fell in front of a truck on 240<sup>th</sup> Street/110<sup>th</sup> Avenue North of Highway 91, a contractor is needed to remove the tree out of the county road right-of-way.
- Ziemba informed the Board that twelve motor grader tires have been ordered from Bauer Built at \$1,310.00 per tire.
- The Board and Ziemba discussed the projects: Pilot Knob Bridge, Cedar Rapids Northwest Bridge and river bank stabilization.

Ross Davidson discussed with the Board and County Highway Superintendent the center pivots that are continuing to water County roads and washing the gravel off of the road. Davidson inquired if the County may increase the \$50.00 fine to a larger amount and possibly make the landowner pay for replacement gravel and any road repair damages. The Highway Superintendent plans to research the state statutes and regulations that govern said issues.



Andy Devine, Albion City Administrator, submitted an Interlocal Agreement for the Board to review between the County of Boone and City of Albion. The City of Albion requires a Street Superintendent and desires the Street Superintendent to be licensed with the State of Nebraska. Stacey L. Ziemba is a Class B Licensed County Highway Superintendent, a licensed Street Superintendent and a full time employee for the County of Boone. The County Highway Superintendent is a full time salaried employee of Boone County and City of Albion desires to remit payment directly to Boone County on a monthly basis for each month of this agreement. All parties on an annual basis shall review the Interlocal Agreement. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign Resolution No. 2020-27 an Interlocal Agreement between the County of Boone and City of Albion for licensed Highway and Street Superintendent services in effect for one year commencing on January 1, 2021 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board and County Highway Superintendent discussed repairs needed for the County Road District #2 shop building. Some of the repairs that need attention are the sewer system, gutter cleaning/replacement, cement step in front of entrance walk-through door, and the county owned grounds may need to be fenced in to defray the siphoning of fuel and removal of some of the aggregate. No action was taken at the meeting.

Margarita Landauer, Commander of Boone County American Legion, and Leon Magsamen, Vice CMD, updated the Board of the scheduled activities planned for the 2020 American Legion County Government Day program. Landauer informed the Board that the 2020 County Government Day is scheduled for Wednesday, November 18, 2020 and with the Coronavirus pandemic regulations they are looking at the use of one of the buildings at the Boone County Fairgrounds to allow for spacing. The Oratorical Speech Contest is scheduled for Saturday, December 5, 2020 with an alternate date of Saturday, December 12, 2020 to be held in the Boone County Courthouse Courtroom. Landauer asked the Board if the County may help split the cost of the event due to the noon meal is no longer donated/sponsored and that the County Legions are struggling this year financially. The Board suggested to Landauer to try and visit with businesses in each of the towns for meal/food items/donations. The County Government Day event is an American Legion program, not a county local governmental program.

The 2020-2021 County Budget public hearing for the County of Boone, Nebraska was held at 10:00 A.M. on Monday, September 14, 2020. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to approve exceeding the 2.5% lid limitation on restricted funds by an additional 1% budget authority growth for fiscal year 2020-2021. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The County Budget Act (State Statute Section 23-904) requires a budget message to be completed by the budget making authority outlining the fiscal policy for the budget period. The budget message must include a list of all cash amounts being held by officials that do not appear in the County Treasurer's Office six month balance reports. The Board has approved and authorized accounts within County Offices to receive and disburse fees, etc. Some of the accounts balance to zero and some accounts have a beginning balance. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve Resolution No. 2020-25, authorizing the accounts within County Offices as stated in the resolution. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to set a Board of Equalization meeting to be held on Tuesday, October 13, 2020 at 11:00 A.M. to set the 2020 tax year levies. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Rasmussen and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.





Nebraska Revised Statute 77-1601.02 provides that the property tax request for the prior year shall be the property tax request for the current year for purposes of the levy set by the County Board of Equalization unless the Governing Body of the County of Boone passes by a majority vote a resolution setting the tax request at a different amount. The Governing Body of the County of Boone, by a majority vote by the Boone County Board of Commissioners, resolves that: the 2020-2021 property tax request be set at \$4,432,628.00, which is different from the 2019-2020 property tax request of \$4,262,835.00; and the 2020 county tax rate is at 0.192076, which is different from the 2019 tax rate of 0.176883. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Temme to approve Resolution No. 2020-26 at the September 14, 2020 public hearing to adopt and approve the County Budget for 2020-2021 as published and presented with the above property tax requests. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

On July 27, 2020 the Board, John Morgan, Boone County Attorney, and Stacey Ziemba, Boone County Highway Superintendent, reviewed pending litigation and the Board authorized the County Attorney to respond to the litigation concerning a road issue. On August 26, 2020 the Board, County Attorney and County Highway Superintendent discussed the plaintiff's allegations and the County Attorney responded to the complaint filed by the plaintiff. The County Attorney discussed the information received from the plaintiff's legal counsel, after responding to the complaint, with the Board and Highway Superintendent. Morgan plans to respond to the plaintiff's legal counsel following today's discussion.

In addition, the Board and County Highway Superintendent discussed with the County Attorney the installation of a driveway in a County Road right-of-way on 140<sup>th</sup> Avenue without permission. The County Attorney advised the County Highway Superintendent to have the County Road Department remove the driveway from the County Road right-of-way on 140<sup>th</sup> Avenue.

Jeff Jarecki was appointed Boone County Public Defender in August of 2012. Jarecki reported that the cases assigned in 2012 through 2017 are all completed and only one juvenile case remains open for 2018. Jarecki updated the Board in regard to Public Defender assigned cases: 2018 – 47 cases with 44 closed, 2 conflicts and 1 open; 2019 – 38 cases with 32 closed, 1 conflict and 5 open; and 2020 to date – 26 cases with 7 closed, 3 conflict and 16 open. Jarecki explained to the Board that some juvenile cases take a long time to complete and that some individuals may have more than one case. Juvenile cases may remain open until the court case is resolved or the age of nineteen. Jarecki answered the Board's questions regarding conflict of interest and closed/open cases. Jarecki explained that there are times when he cannot defend the assigned case since he is/has already defending one of the parties involved. Jarecki explained that his office tries to emphasize rehabilitation for those facing criminal charges and treat the individuals with respect. The Board thanked Jarecki for the updated report and his diligent services. Jarecki thanked the Board and is very appreciative of the contract for public defender services. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to accept the Boone County Public Defender report as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Albion City Wide Clean-up Days is scheduled for September 17-18, 2020. The Board discussed disposition of surplus items that are no longer needed/used that was/is in storage and items no longer used in the courthouse basement with Department Heads. The Board suggested that the Department Heads let Rod Nelson, Maintenance, know what items to remove from the basement and inventory.

The Board's planned to discuss renovation of the former UNL Extension office space in the courthouse as to wall/ceiling tile/floor repairs, painting and carpet replacement/repair. The Board planned discussion was to



decide if the repairs would cost an amount where they needed to obtain two to three quotes or sealed quotes, and who locally to contact that might be interested in providing the repairs/painting services.

The UNL Extension office is now located in the new fairgrounds building known as Boone County Agricultural Education Center. The scheduled discussion was to be on repairs, but turned into a lengthy discussion with some department heads and an employee as to what office may move/utilize the nice office space. Several employees presented their thoughts and ideas. The Board will proceed with the repairs, paint and cleaning to be done to the available space and a further discussion on the occupancy of the space will be held at a later time.

On August 28, 2020, the IRS issued Notice 2020-65, as part of COVID-19 relief, allowing employers to temporarily defer withholding and paying to the IRS eligible Employees' portion of Social Security payroll taxes for pay periods starting September 1 through December 31, 2020. Unless Congress passes additional legislation forgiving the tax repayment, the employee would repay the payroll tax during the first four months of 2021. There are administrative challenges of implanting changes to the payroll software on such short notice and a significant reduction in take-home pay that would occur during the first four months of 2021. Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to approve Resolution No. 2020-28, electing to not participate in the payroll tax deferral. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Rasmussen and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Nebraska Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) requested the Board to appoint an authorized representative for the County of Boone, Nebraska for the federally declared disaster DR-4521 in order to complete paperwork/documents to receive reimbursement of COVID-19 purchased protective items. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign a letter appointing Kathy Thorberg, County Clerk, as the authorized representative for the County of Boone, Nebraska for the federally declared disaster DR-4521. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board discussed possible need for asbestos testing on the old concrete office/restroom building and former petting zoo building that are being disposed of/removed from the fairgrounds. The Board plans to look at the facilities today to see if they are ready for disposition. Building material being disposed of to a landfill needs to be tested for asbestos before removal. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to contact B2 Environmental of Grand Island for the asbestos testing. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

### PUBLIC HEARING PROCEEDINGS 2020-2021 COUNTY BUDGET

Alan Rasmussen, Chairman of the Boone County Board of Commissioners, called for a motion to open a public hearing on Monday, September 14, 2020 at 10:00 A.M. in the Boone County Courthouse Commissioners Meeting Room in Albion, Nebraska. Motion made by Commissioner Temme, second by Commissioner Rutten to open said public hearing. Notice of the hearing was given in advance by publication and the convened hearing was open to the public. Commissioners present for said public hearing were Larry Temme, Ben Rutten and Alan Rasmussen. Chairman Rasmussen read the notice for the record. Jordan Mueller, CPA, for Schmeits, Mueller & Martinsen, P.C., was present to answer budget questions. Jim Dickerson, Albion News, was present for the budget hearing.

The public hearing was for the purpose of hearing support, opposition, criticism, suggestions or observations of taxpayers relating to the 2020-2021 Boone County proposed budget in compliance with the provisions of State Statute Sections 13-501 to 13-513. Also, to set the final tax request for the 2020-2021 Boone County proposed budget at a different amount than the prior year tax request in compliance with the provisions of State Statute Section 77-1601.02. The hearing was open for one hour and the proposed budget was published in the Wednesday, September 2, 2020 issue of the Albion News, Albion, Nebraska.

Richard Martinsen, CPA, for Schmeits, Mueller & Martinsen, P.C., prepared the budget documents for fiscal year 2020-2021. The County Board and those present for the hearing discussed with Mueller the differences from last year's fiscal budget in the areas of asking dollars, land valuation, tax rate, property tax requirement and fund balances. Muller provided answers to questions asked with regard to the proposed budget and publication. The proposed property tax request for 2020-2021 is \$4,432,628.00, which is different from the 2019-2020 property tax request of \$4,262,835.00, being an increase of \$169,793.00 from prior fiscal year. The proposed tax rate for 2020 of 0.192076 is higher than the 2019 tax rate of 0.176883. The Governing Body of the County of Boone by a Board majority approval may exceed the 2.5% lid limitation by an additional 1% budget authority growth. The levy authority of 50 cents includes the County levy and all the entities such as Agricultural/Historical Societies, Fire Districts, etc. added together. The 2020 County valuation is \$2,307,751,527.00 compared to the 2019 valuation of \$2,409,978,807.00 a decrease of \$102,227,280.00. The overall County taxable value decreased primarily due to re-classification of production soils and a TERC (Tax Equalization & Review Commission) order of residential values located in the City of Albion.

The adopted 2020-2021 County Budget has a tax request expense increase from the 2019-2020 County Budget. The County of Boone, Nebraska financial contribution to the BCDA, Inc. is from the County Inheritance Tax Fund. The proposed property tax increase request is primarily in the County Road Fund. A five million dollar (3700) Highway Allocation Bond Repay Fund Series 2019 was set up with funds for road/bridge infrastructure repair due to the adverse weather conditions since March of 2019. The five million dollar bond yield \$4,935,500.00 dollars in funding to the County that can be repaid over seven years with an early payout option when/if FEMA funds are received. The County pays the total cost of all the infrastructure repairs from storm damages and then submits paperwork for partial reimbursement of qualifying damages from FEMA/NEMA. A portion of the Road Fund Highway Allocation revenue that is received each year will be designated to pay that said fiscal year bond/interest payments. The seven year bonds total is Principal of \$5,000,000.00 and Interest of \$369,595.00. In addition to said bonds, two million dollars of the County Inheritance Tax Fund has been designated for aggregate/gravel materials and asphalt/concrete road repairs.

Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Temme to close said public hearing at 11:13 A.M. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.



Discussion: The county tax rate will be 0.192076. If it were not for the use of inheritance tax dollars, the county rate would be increased in order to maintain the current level of services that are both mandated under state law and that our county taxpayers deserve and expect.

The Inheritance Tax funding is considered a local tax. Inheritance Tax funds stay in the respective county and benefit the respective county taxpayers with a lower property tax rate. If the legislature removes the Inheritance Tax funding, then the state and federal levels will receive the taxes generated from "Inheritance" and the local county level will need to increase their property tax rate to maintain mandated services.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve and adopt the County Budget for 2020-2021 as published and presented with an Unused Budget Authority created for next year of \$42,228.99; and set the 2020 County Tax Rate at 0.192076, which is different than the County Tax Rate of 0.176883 for 2019. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to approve exceeding the 2.5% lid limitation on restricted funds by an additional 1% budget authority growth for fiscal year 2020-2021. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board expressed their appreciation to the firm Schmeits, Mueller & Martinsen, P.C. for their assistance with the County Budget preparation throughout the years.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve Resolution No. 2020-32, granting permission to Cornhusker Public Power to bore electric power cable under a county road known as 390<sup>th</sup> Street from Section 32 to Section 29, all in Township 18 North, Range 7 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska, to connect electric power cable to the existing electrical lines. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Board, Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc., and Pat Neidhardt, discussed the status of the removal/disposal of the former concrete office/restrooms and the removal/disposal of the floor to/and the former petting zoo building located at the Boone County Fairgrounds. The Board approved and accepted the quote from Seda Land Handling, LLC on August 17, 2020 for the removal/disposal of the old former concrete fairgrounds office/restroom/floor building and the concrete floor of the former petting zoo building. The removal/disposal of said building/floors was to occur in September. Rolf said that the individual interested in purchasing and moving the former petting zoo building from the fairgrounds to their residence was given a September 15, 2020 deadline. As of today the building has not been moved from the fairgrounds. Rolf was asked who was paying for the removal of the former petting zoo building. Rolf replied the individual that plans to purchase the said building. Rutten felt that the revenue received for the purchase of said building should be credited to the County to help cover the costs of the removal/disposal of said project. Temme suggested to Rolf that the revenue, if any is received for the former petting zoo building, should be discussed at the next Boone County Agricultural Society meeting.

The Board, Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc., and Pat Neidhardt, discussed the status of the removal of the fairgrounds former old sheep/goat/swine building. On August 26, 2020 the Board and Rolf discussed advertising/listing the sale of said building facility for thirty days to see if there is any interest and the consensus of the Board allowed the Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. until October 31, 2020 to remove the livestock panels, etc. from the building and what is left of said building/concrete floor will be removed and disposed of the first week of November 2020. The Board asked Rolf the status of the old sheep/goat/swine building. Rolf replied that no decision has been made, nothing has been removed and he hopes the Board will work with them on this building.

Rolf asked the Board to consider not removing/disposing of said building as he was informed that if an entity hosts a horse event there is possibly a need for 80 to 200, 10'x10' horse stalls for an event. Rolf figured that it may be possible to renovate the former old sheep/goat/swine building into seventy-four horse stalls. Rolf said that the concrete would have to be removed from said building. Rolf estimated a new steel building would be approximately \$200,000.00. Neidhardt asked why the conversation is now changing towards keeping the former old sheep/goat/swine building and former indoor show arena building. During several meetings in 2018 prior to a decision to build/finance a new fairgrounds building, it was said the two former buildings were considered to be in poor condition and in need of renovation/replacement and the indoor show arena to small and dangerous. In addition, with the removal of the two former buildings it would open up an area for parking.

The County Clerk reminded the Board that the signed Lease Agreement with the Boone County Agricultural Society addresses the former buildings: office/restrooms, small pet/petting zoo, small animal sheep/goat/swine and indoor show arena, shall be removed from the fairgrounds property allowing for additional parking space. The consensus of the Board to table action regarding the above mentioned fairground buildings to October 26, 2020 to allow for further research.





The Board, Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc., and Pat Neidhardt, discussed the electrical reimbursement from the County to the Ag Society for the new fairgrounds building. Neidhardt questioned why the County is reimbursing the Ag Society for the electrical used by the new fairgrounds building. The understanding from the 2018 meetings was that the 1.3 million from the Inheritance Tax fund was the County (tax payers) contribution of the new building and the rest of the building construction, expenses and upkeep funding was to be generated through pledges, donations and grants. County Clerk updated the group that when the three year lease was prepared between the County and Ag Society, under utilities there was an additional sentence added that the County will reimburse the KWH used by the new building to the Ag Society. The reimbursement is being paid from the County General Fund.

In visiting with Loup Public Power the electrical summer rate is June 15 to October 14 and a winter rate October 15 to June 14. The separate meter to register the new fairgrounds building KWH used was installed on June 25, 2020. Currently the Ag Society has been reading the new building meter on the first of the month and not reading it on the same day as Loup Power reads the main fairgrounds meter for the billing. The Invoice submitted for reimbursement of \$1,817.60 is for the new building meter from June 25, 2020 to October 1, 2020 with the government summer rate. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to have Chuck Rolf, board member of the Boone County Agricultural Society, read (take picture) of meter on October 14, 2020 for end of summer rate; November 1, 2020 for winter rate; for combined summer/winter rate payment in November; and possibly move to a quarterly reading for reimbursement. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Board, County Highway Superintendent and Gayle Noble, property owner, discussed water drainage/drainage ditch on the Fairgrounds property with the water/drainage to flow north from fairgrounds that will possibly flood property on the west side of 11<sup>th</sup> Street. If the Kohtz-City of Albion Dam would overflow following a heavy rain, it appears that the water flow would go north through the fairgrounds and to either or all of the following: Fairview Street; 11<sup>th</sup> Street; the ditch north of the fairgrounds (race track) property through a culvert to the crop ground north of the fairgrounds and west of the 11<sup>th</sup> Street housing and to Walnut Street from the crop ground. Noble informed the Board that the crop ground has recently been surveyed and it appears that a ditch overgrown with trees is on the crop ground side. Noble inquired if there is an easement recorded to address what appears to be a man made ditch through the fairgrounds and the crop ground for water drainage. Noble informed the group that no easement was found recorded in the county real estate records. The group discussed who is responsible for the removal of the trees, cleaning and maintenance of the ditch if it is to remain as a ditch and who all should be involved (county, city, and landowner) to possibly sign an easement regarding the water flow from south to north for possible flooding in the future. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to table any action until receive clarification regarding an easement document. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed a written resignation from a full-time County Sheriff's office employee. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to accept and approve the resignation of Alexandria A.A. Mullings effective October 21, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to go into executive session at 12:12 P.M., per the Open Meeting Act §84-1410, prevention of needless injury to the reputation of a person and if such person has not requested a public meeting. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried. The Board met with the Sheriff, Chief Deputy Sheriff and a Sheriff's office employee to discuss a personnel issue. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to come out of the executive session at 12:35 P.M. Roll call



vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Absent: Rasmussen. Motion carried. No action was taken by the Board.

# BOONE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS OCTOBER 19, 2020 ALBION, NEBRASKA

The Boone County Board of Commissioners of Boone County, Nebraska, met in regular session at 9:00 A.M. on Monday, October 19, 2020 in the Commissioners Meeting Room of the Courthouse in Albion, Nebraska.

Chairman Rasmussen called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Alan Rasmussen and Ben Rutten. Commissioner Larry Temme arrived at 9:08 A.M. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication in the Albion News, Petersburg Press and St. Edward Advance on October 14, 2020 and the convened meeting was open to the public.

The agenda was posted on the Boone County website; posted on the information board located in the Courthouse north entrance; emailed to the Board of Commissioners; and emailed to the Elected Officials and department heads on Friday, October 16, 2020. Chairman Rasmussen acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Denise Ziemba, Region 44 Emergency Manager, updated the Board in regard to Emergency Management activities. Ziemba reported that she is applying for siren grants for Belgrade, Clarks and Genoa. The Board and Ziemba discussed the area increase of positive COVID-19 cases. Ziemba reported that a Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) meeting is scheduled for October 20, 2020 at the Albion Fire Hall.

Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the County Board Proceedings of October 13, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Abstain: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the County Board of Equalization Proceedings of October 13, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Abstain: Rasmussen. Motion carried.

Rod Nelson, Courthouse Maintenance, met with the Board to set a fire drill date. Each year a fire drill is usually conducted in the months of May and October. The Courthouse fire drill date is set for Friday, October 30, 2020 at 8:15 A.M.

The Board reviewed a written resignation from a full-time County Road Department employee. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to accept and approve the resignation of Matthew Klug with an effective date of October 8, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Stacey Ziemba, County Highway Superintendent; Pam Jochum, County Attorney office employee; and the Board discussed reimbursement to employees for safety-toe footwear. Ziemba said that the road employees do not want to submit their bank/credit card statement along with the receipt to receive expense reimbursements. The submission of a signed County claim with attached signed itemized receipt and a copy of bank/credit card statement all blacked out except for and only showing the employee's name, last four of card number to match receipt and purchase amount has been the documents submitted for reimbursement for several years.

Ziemba said that the road department employees want documentation as to what may be reimbursed and what documents are required to submit in order to receive reimbursement for supplies, materials, recommended safety items, etc. Ziemba contacted the Nebraska Auditor of Public Accounts asking what the proper protocol





in reimbursing county employees is. The Nebraska Auditor of Public Accounts suggested the County Board of Commissioners adopt a resolution setting policy and procedures regarding documentation required to support the reimbursement for amounts paid for expenses.

Jochum commented on a prior year reimbursement document request from the County Attorney office. The Boone County Employee Handbook addresses reimbursement protocol for Travel Time and Travel Expenses. The agenda discussion is in regard to reimbursement for supplies, materials, recommended safety items, etc. The Board plans to prepare a resolution to address the reimbursement for expenses issue at a future Board meeting.

The County of Boone, Nebraska entered into a Lease on May 2, 1972 with the Boone County Historical Society, Inc. for a period of ninety-nine (99) years for the purpose of constructing a building. The said building would be used for the Boone County Museum and for Boone County Historical Society purposes. The Lease was recorded with a metes and bounds real estate description outside the city limits of the City of Albion. In 2018 the real estate was surveyed, platted and annexed by the City of Albion. A Warranty Deed dated August 17, 2020 conveyed the real estate to the Boone County Historical Society, Inc. The County of Boone, Nebraska is no longer the owner of the property and does hereby terminate the Lease dated May 2, 1972. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Temme to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Termination of Lease document as the property has been conveyed to the Boone County Historical Society, Inc. and the County of Boone, Nebraska is no longer owner of the property. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

County of Boone has been a member of the Nebraska Intergovernmental Risk Management Association (NIRMA) pool since the agreement for the formation of the pool was signed in November 1987. NIRMA was formed pursuant to the Intergovernmental Risk Management Act (Neb. Rev. Stat. §44-4301 et seq.) and the Nebraska Interlocal Cooperation Act (Neb. Rev. Stat. §13-801 et seq.); and counties and other public agencies as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §44-4303 are allowed to participate in said cooperative undertakings. The current Intergovernmental/Interlocal Agreements (NIRMA and NIRMA II) will expire on June 30, 2021. The Board discussed the NIRMA insurance renewal and prior local insurance agencies requests to submit proposals. The Board acknowledged that NIRMA is focused on county government insurance needs and dividends received by County of Boone from NIRMA is a cumulative sum of \$339,292.00 since the NIRMA program began. Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to approve and adopt Resolution No. 2020-33 to extend Boone County's commitment to participate in NIRMA and NIRMA II for the period July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2024 as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Rasmussen and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Chairman Rasmussen called the meeting to order and Commissioners present for roll call were Alan Rasmussen, Larry Temme and Ben Rutten. Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication in the Albion News, Petersburg Press and St. Edward Advance on October 21, 2020 and the convened meeting was open to the public.

The agenda was posted on the Boone County website; posted on the information board located in the Courthouse north entrance; emailed to the Board of Commissioners; and emailed to the Elected Officials and department heads on Friday, October 23, 2020. Chairman Rasmussen acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

The Board reviewed the County Payroll Claims filed for the pay period of September 22, 2020 through October 21, 2020. The Board noted/questioned several hours of overtime for the pay period. The Board plans to visit with the respective department head. Motion made by Rutten, second by Rasmussen to approve the County Payroll Claims filed for payment from the various funds: General \$98,614.29, BCBS \$49,824.32, Ameritas Ret \$6,857.07, EFTPS \$7,340.42, LTD Premiums \$2.27, Section 125 Fees \$10.00, Wellness Program \$96.00; Road \$63,248.04, BCBS \$29,730.96, Ameritas Ret \$4,269.25, EFTPS \$4,770.86; Ambulance \$3,345.29, Ameritas Ret \$93.77, EFTPS \$255.91; and Public Defender Contract \$3,358.21. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Rasmussen and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the County Board Proceedings of October 19, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Rod Nelson, Courthouse Maintenance, submitted quotes for the Board to review for replacement of the furnace in the County Annex building known as the BCDA, Inc. office. Nelson informed the Board that the furnace in the building was installed in 1997 and has several issues. The following quotes were received for a new natural gas furnace unit: Kelly's Heating & Air Conditioning of Albion - \$6,500.00 with a rebate of \$600.00 for a quote of \$5,900.00 (includes labor and five year warranty on parts and labor); Eller Heating, Air Conditioning & Plumbing, LLC of Columbus - \$7,799.00 (includes labor and ten year warranty on parts and one year warranty on labor). The Board and Nelson discussed the options of replacement or repair of the furnace. The consensus that it would be more efficient to install a new furnace instead of trying to repair a twenty-three year old furnace. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Temme to approve the quote of approximately \$5,900.00 from Kelly's Heating & Air Conditioning for installation of a new natural gas furnace unit in the County Annex Building known as the BCDA, Inc. office. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

On October 19, 2020 and prior Board meetings the County Highway Superintendent has said that the road department employees want documentation as to what may be reimbursed and what documents are required to submit in order to receive reimbursement for supplies, materials, recommended safety items, etc. The Boone County Employee Handbook addresses reimbursement protocol for Travel Time and Travel Expenses.





The County Highway Superintendent informed the Board that the Nebraska Auditor of Public Accounts suggested the County Board of Commissioners adopt a resolution setting policy and procedures regarding documentation required to support the reimbursement for amounts paid for expenses. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve Resolution No. 2020-34, adoption of policy and procedures for employee reimbursement for expenses. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) and Boone County, Nebraska (County) signed an Agreement for the Sharing of Office Space in October of 2016. DHHS has not had an office located in Boone County, Nebraska since November of 2010 and has only requested use of the agreed office space one time since 2010. The Board discussed how the designated space is currently being used by other County offices. DHHS does not have a standing need for the designated space and authorized termination of the 2016 Agreement. The County agrees to allow DHHS to request use of space in the Boone County Courthouse on dates required, if any, and DHHS may use the room/space that is not being used within the courthouse on said specific date. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to approve and authorize the Board Chairman to sign a Termination of Agreement for the Sharing of Office Space effective November 30, 2020 and the Boone County Board of Commissioners agree that this Termination of Agreement does not waive any obligations of Boone County under Neb. Rev. Stat. 68-130, and further agree to allow DHHS to request space in the Boone County Courthouse on dates required if any specific instance is required of DHHS to provide services to any citizen of Boone County on an irregular or emergency need. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Tanya Sharp, Boone County Health Center President & CEO, and Rita Liss, Boone County Health Center CFO, presented the Boone County Health Center statement of operations budget for their fiscal year October 1, 2020 through September 30, 2021 to the Board. Sharp and Liss reviewed the budget with the Board and explained that areas of the anticipated operating revenue of \$35,245,298.00, with operating expenses of \$34,210,699.00, leaving an increase in net position of \$1,434,943.00. The out-patient revenue is projected to continue to increase; in-patient revenue is projected to remain consistent; and projected decrease in investment income as interest rates have been trending downward. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to accept the Boone County Health Center 2020-2021 operations budget as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board; Andy Devine, Albion City Administrator; Stacey Ziemba, County Highway Superintendent; Gayle Noble, landowner of real estate north of fairgrounds; Laurie Krohn, area landowner; and Mike Krohn, area landowner, discussed possible changes to a water/drainage issue from the fairgrounds property, Kohtz-City of Albion dam area and west side of fairgrounds road. On October 13, 2020 the Board, County Highway Superintendent and Gayle Noble, property owner, discussed water drainage/drainage ditch on the fairgrounds property with the water/drainage to flow north from fairgrounds that will possibly flood property on the west side of 11<sup>th</sup> Street. Following a heavy rain, it appears that the water flows north through the fairgrounds and to either or all of the following: Fairview Street; 11<sup>th</sup> Street; the ditch north of the fairgrounds (race track) property through a culvert to the crop ground north of the fairgrounds and west of the 11<sup>th</sup> Street housing and to Walnut Street. Andy Devine, Albion City Administrator, provided a map showing general drainage from the fairgrounds area to the north and east, where the water/drainage enters the city's surface drainage system.

There is a drainage ditch that appears to be man-made that starts north of the dam on fairgrounds property; continues north and west through the City of Albion campground area to a culvert under 11<sup>th</sup> Street; from the culvert the water/drainage continues to flow north on fairgrounds property to the road ditch on the north side of





the fairgrounds property; water/drainage from the road ditch flows through a culvert to what appears to be the man-made drainage ditch on the crop ground lying west of the 11<sup>th</sup> Street housing.

Noble said that the drainage ditch appears to be man-made by someone years ago that is located on the crop ground that he purchased. There appears to be no easement recorded for said drainage ditch in the County Register of Deeds records. The ditch is now in need of maintenance, because it contains trees, tires, concrete and other items that impedes the water flow. Noble said he would be willing to grant an easement for said drainage ditch. The easement discussion then led to who all would possibly need to grant an easement for said drainage ditch being County, City, Noble or other landowners along 11<sup>th</sup> Street. In addition, if an easement for said drainage ditch is agreed upon who will be responsible for continued maintenance of said drainage ditch. Then the discussion led to possibly redirecting drainage water by installing culverts under Fairgrounds Road that would drain east as the damage to said road is from rain water flowing over top of the road. In addition, possibly another culvert under 11<sup>th</sup> Street as one enters the fairgrounds to continue drainage east where the city's storm sewer on Fairview Street may possibly be extended. The City and County plan to reach out to JEO Consulting Group engineers to conduct a drainage study of the area to determine the best options. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Temme to authorize the County Highway Superintendent to contact JEO Consulting Group engineers for a hydraulic study in regard to the drainage issues. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road equipment repair/replacement, road/bridge maintenance, building maintenance and projects.

The Board reviewed a written retirement resignation from a full-time County Road Department employee. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to accept and approve the retirement resignation of Dan Dobson with an effective date of November 4, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Great Plains Communications, LLC requested permission to plow fiber optic cable on the East and West side of the County Road, commonly known as 325<sup>th</sup> Avenue, commencing at the Northeast corner of the intersection of 325<sup>th</sup> Avenue and 330<sup>th</sup> Street in Section 26; thence plowing North in the road of 325<sup>th</sup> Avenue to a point of termination at the intersection of 325<sup>th</sup> Avenue and 290<sup>th</sup> Street in Section 11; thence commencing at the Northeast corner of the intersection of 325<sup>th</sup> Avenue and 310<sup>th</sup> Street in Section 23; thence plowing East on the south side of 310<sup>th</sup> Street to the Platte County line, all in Township 19 North, Range 5 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve Resolution No. 2020-35, granting permission to Great Plains Communications, LLC to plow fiber optic cable along 325<sup>th</sup> Avenue and 310<sup>th</sup> Street located in Sections 11, 14, 23, 26, and 13, 24 all in Township 19 North, Range 5 West of the 6th P.M., Boone County, Nebraska as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Great Plains Communications, LLC requested permission to plow fiber optic cable on the East side of the County Road, commonly known as 270<sup>th</sup> Avenue, commencing at the residence address of 3346 270<sup>th</sup> Avenue, St. Edward, Nebraska between Sections 35 and 36, Township 19 North, Range 6 West; thence plowing South on the east side of 270<sup>th</sup> Avenue to a point of termination at the Northeast corner of the intersection of 270<sup>th</sup> Avenue and 370<sup>th</sup> Street between Sections 13 and 14 in Township 18 North, Range 6 West of the 6th P.M., Boone County, Nebraska. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve Resolution No. 2020-37, granting permission to Great Plains Communications, LLC to plow fiber optic cable along the East side of 270<sup>th</sup> Avenue located in Section 35 and 36, Township 19 North, Range 6 West and Sections 1, 2, 11, 12, 13 and 14, Township 18 North, Range 6 West all of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M. Boone County, Nebraska as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rutten and Rasmussen. Nays; None. Motion carried.

On September 14 and 21, 2020 the Board discussed the disposition of the County Road Sign Truck. The 2003 Ford F350 sign truck has several mechanical issues and possibly costly repairs. On September 28, 2020 the Board submitted a sealed bid to the Petersburg Fire Department for their 2008 Ford F550 Dually Truck that was advertised for sale. Temme informed the Board and County Highway Superintendent that the Petersburg Fire Department accepted and approved the Boone County Board of Commissioners bid of \$14,002.00. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to replace the 2003 Ford County Road Sign Truck with the purchase of the Petersburg Fire Department 2008 Ford F550 Dually Truck for \$14,002.00 and authorize the County Highway Superintendent to dispose of the 2003 Ford County Truck. Steve Pritchard, UNL Extension, and the Board discussed policy and procedure in regard to mileage reimbursement. Chairman Rasmussen acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Laurie Krohn, County Treasurer, submitted a Distress Warrant Report. Report indicates that there were fourteen distress warrants delivered to the Boone County Sheriff on November 1, 2020 for collection of unpaid 2019 personal property taxes, not including penalties, in the sum of \$25,869.43. The total to be collected on the distress warrants with penalties is \$27,074.71. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to accept and approve the County Treasurer's Distress Warrant Report as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board discussed the prior year's expenditures for employee recognition. The consensus of the Board that each elected official and full-time employee shall receive a certificate for either a turkey or ham not to exceed \$15.00 which they may redeem at any of the participating grocery stores. The certificates to be included with the employees November payroll information. The certificates would have to be redeemed on or before December 31, 2020 and would be good towards a turkey or ham only. Any amount over \$15.00 would be at the expense of the employee. Sharp indicated that critical access hospital license is for twenty-five licensed beds, but that number may decrease to twenty beds during the current renovation and new construction. An annual certification of County Highway Superintendent is due each year by December 31st to the Nebraska Department of Transportation pursuant to state statutes. The performance of the duties listed in the certification determines federal highway allocation funds incentive payments. Motion made by Rutten, second by





Rasmussen to approve and authorize execution of Resolution No. 2020-38 regarding signing of the Year-End Certification of County Highway Superintendent Form 2020 and authorizing the Board Chairman to sign the Year-End Certification of County Highway Superintendent certifying the appointment of Stacey Ziemba, Boone County Highway Superintendent, for the calendar year 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Rasmussen and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board received Change Order Number 3 to review for consideration for the Cedar Rapids Northwest Bridge Project (FEMA) located on 150<sup>th</sup> Avenue south of State Highway 52 with a decreased amount of \$1,560.00 for water/temporary silt fence. The original project quote was \$352,821.48 from Theisen Construction, Inc. and Change Orders Number 1 and 2 increased the project total amount to \$475,330.54. The 2019 flood damage that changed the Cedar River streamflow presented unforeseen circumstances for the bridge repair project. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the Change Order Number 3 decreased amount of \$1,560.00 for water/temporary silt fence as submitted with a final project total amount of \$473,770.54. The purpose of this agreement is to account for the work of the Clerk of the District Court as it relates to Child Support Enforcement for the period of performance for October 1, 2019 through September 30, 2024. DHHS submitted an Attachment 1-Funding Update-Child Support Enforcement Subawards for review of the funding update for October 1, 2020 through September 30, 2021. Beginning in 2018 the agreement arrived by email with the completed signature being done electronically. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve and authorize the Boone County Clerk of District Court to electronically execute the Attachment 1-Funding Update-Child Support Enforcement Subawards Agreement between the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services and the County of Boone for the Child Support Enforcement Program from October 1, 2020 through September 30, 2021 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Temme and Rasmussen. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Boone County Clerk received a copy of a Corporate Manager Application from the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission. The Corporate Manager Application is for Christy M. Kemper of Genoa, Nebraska and the licensee is the Albion Country Club, Inc. The Nebraska Liquor Control Commission asked that the Corporate Manager Application be presented to the Boone County Board of Commissioners for their review and action. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Rutten to approve the Corporate Manager Application for Christy M. Kemper for the Albion Country Club, Inc. as submitted. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The State of Nebraska, Department of Transportation, needs the County Board to designate the official county newspaper(s) in order to comply with state statute when advertising their projects for bids in the county. Motion made by Rasmussen, second by Temme to designate the official county newspapers for 2021 to include





the Albion News, Petersburg Press and St. Edward Advance. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rasmussen, Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Larry Bird, Friends of the Trail Committee Chair, and the Board discussed possible future use of what is known as the county cropland (26.13 acres) that part of the trail system was constructed across in 2018. Bird suggested the possible idea of planting native grasses or a forage crop that could be cut for hay instead of planting a corn/bean field. Bird suggested a controlled burn to eliminate the weeds on the County cropland that is north of the trail between the two communication towers. Bird asked the Board to consider possibly re-installing fence in the area where a stock well was decommissioned in the southwest corner of the trail area to create dog park area. Also discussed was possibly removing the trees/fence and cleaning up the west ditch/property line area of the County cropland. The consensus of the Board is to review the suggestions of the Friends of the Trail Committee.

Nathan Olson, County Cropland Lessee, was unable to attend the Board meeting. Olson visited with the Board by telephone and plans to prepare the 2020 crop lease payment information for the Board to review. Olson acknowledged that the current County Cropland Lease terminates at midnight on December 31, 2020 and understands the protocol procedure in order for the County to lease real estate owned by the County. The County Board shall hold an open and public hearing prior to any such lease at which any interested party may appear and speak for or against the lease and raise any issue concerning the County Board leasing said cropland acres. Motion made by Temme, second by Rasmussen to proceed with the procedure to lease the County cropland acres. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme, Rasmussen and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board received the Initial Property Appraisal from Nebraska Intergovernmental Risk Management Association (NIRMA) for the County owned property that is located at the Boone County Fairgrounds. The property appraisal report includes pictures of the fairgrounds buildings and open structures known as the stock car race track, shooting range and outdoor horse arena. The Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc. also has a separate policy with NIRMA for some of the open structure property, personal property, building contents, etc. The stock car race track and contents are listed on the County NIRMA policy instead of the Ag Society NIRMA policy. The Ag Society subleases the race track area to the Boone County Raceway during the stock car racing season. Consensus of the Board to leave the stock car race track and contents on the County NIRMA policy.

The Board, Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agriculture Society, Inc., and Pat Neidhardt, discussed the removal/disposal of the buildings from the County property known as the Boone County Fairgrounds that is addressed with #16 in the three year Lease Agreement between the County of Boone and Boone County Agricultural Society. "Removal of Buildings: The County and Ag Society understand and agree that the former office/restroom (S), small pet/animal building (T), small animal livestock (hog/sheep) barn (U), and former indoor show arena building (V), shall be removed from the Leased Property allowing for additional parking space. The time of removal and the removal expense of said buildings from the Leased Property shall occur at a time as is mutually agreed upon by the County and Ag Society following the completion of the new Boone County Agricultural Education Center building." The Board Proceedings of August 26, 2020 discussed the removal of the fairgrounds former old sheep/goat/swine building (U) allowing the Ag Society until October 31, 2020 to remove panels, etc. from the building and what was left would be removed/disposed of in November 2020.

On October 13, 2020 the Board, Chuck Rolf, Boone County Agricultural Society, Inc., and Pat Neidhardt, discussed at length the status of the removal of the fairgrounds former old sheep/goat/swine building. As of today's meeting the Ag Society has not proceeded with any item from the August 26, 2020 discussion.



Rolf asked the Board to hold off on the removal of the old building and requested time to for a cost study of possibly renovating the old building into approximately seventy 10'x10'horse stalls. Rolf said that the Ag Society is trying to attract horse events for the new building such as cowboy mounted shooting and a new circuit barrel race series, but are unable to stall horses in the new building. Neidhardt suggested the Ag Society/building committee should prepare a three to five year plan on facilities once they know how much the new building will be used and the type of events of interest. The opinion of the former small animal livestock (sheep/goat/swine) building and the indoor show arena building seem to have changed since the building campaign was first underway in 2017-2019. During the campaign the said two buildings were in such bad shape and they were no longer useable and the indoor show arena was to small and dangerous to continue using it. Neidhardt asked, "Why can we now save the buildings when we couldn't continue to use them before the new building campaign?" The original intent at the public meetings was to tear down the said buildings to allow more space for parking.

Finances of the County fairgrounds property was also discussed. The Ag Society still has a loan debt on the Boone County Event Center building and the current new fairgrounds building ten year bond debt as of November 2020 is \$1,961,292.50. The ten-year bond debt for the new building is to be paid through the initial pledge commitments, donations and grant applications. Commissioner Temme noted that all pledges for the new building are up to date and that the Boone County Agricultural Education Center, Inc. board members said that there is approximately three years of funds collected. Temme noted that a lot of money has been invested in the new fairgrounds building and there are a lot of different things to work through with the Ag Society in order for the new building facility to possibly bring in some revenue.

The Board discussed removal of fence/trees and level/grade the west side ditch/bank of the County owned fairgrounds/cropland property. The clean-up of the old fence, trees and ditch area being discussed starts at the area on the west side of the property by the new installed mailbox/entrance to the new fairgrounds building, thence south to the end of the County cropland property. The consensus of the Board to obtain quotes for removal of the fence/trees and level/grade the west side ditch/bank from Bygland Dirt Contracting, Inc. and Seda Land Handling, LLC.

Vice Chairman Temme acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Vice Chairman Temme asked all present at the meeting for a moment of silence in memory of Alan Rasmussen, Boone County Commissioner District #2 and Chairman of the Board, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Commissioner Ben Rutten, Chairman of the Boone County Safety Committee, opened the safety meeting at 9:03 A.M. to discuss routine business. Chairman Temme acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

The Board reviewed the County Payroll Claims filed for the pay period of October 22, 2020 through November 21, 2020. The Board noted/questioned several hours of overtime for the pay period. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the County Payroll Claims filed for payment from the various funds: General \$94,478.95, BCBS \$47,416.49, Ameritas Ret \$6,581.76, EFTPS \$7,028.64, LTD Premiums \$2.27, Section 125 Fees \$10.00, Wellness Program \$96.00; Road \$58,644.60, BCBS \$27,715.24, Ameritas Ret \$3,958.52, EFTPS \$4,423.88; Ambulance \$2,664.45, Ameritas Ret \$67.71, EFTPS \$203.84; and Public Defender Contract \$3,358.21. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the County Board Proceedings of November 16, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Boone County Treasurer requested authorization from the Boone County Board of Commissioners to set up a separate bank account for the Limited Tax County Road Bonds, Series 2019 (Highway Allocation Fund Pledge Bonds) in October of 2019. The account received said bond proceeds as revenue for road/bridge infrastructure repair due to the adverse weather conditions of 2019. The first bond principal payment and second bond interest payment is due December 15, 2020. Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve and authorize Laurie Krohn, County Treasurer, to pay the first bond principal amount of \$680,000.00 and second bond interest amount of \$43,143.75 for the Limited Tax County Road Bonds, Series 2019 prior to December 15, 2020. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

On September 9, 2019 the Board approved a resolution authorizing the issuance of Limited Tax County Road Bonds, Series 2019, (Highway Allocation Fund Pledge Bonds) of the County of Boone, Nebraska in aggregate principal amount of, not to exceed \$5,000,000.00 to construct and re-construct certain road improvements. The road improvements include road surfaces, subgrades, bridges and other related components within the County related to the extreme adverse weather and flooding experienced since March 2019. The first bond principal payment of \$680,000.00 and second bond interest payment of \$43,143.75 is due December 15, 2020 and the third bond interest payment of \$37,873.75 is due June 15, 2021. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve Resolution No. 2020-40, hereby authorizing Laurie Krohn, Boone County Treasurer, to transfer the sum of \$761,017.50 from the Road Fund (0200) to the Highway Allocation Bond Repay Fund (3700) as stated in said resolution. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.





The Board adopted the 2018-2019 County Budget with a new fund known as the Fair Building Fund (4025) for the construction of a new building to be located on the County property known as the Boone County Fairgrounds. The revenue for said fund was received from the bond proceeds and the County Inheritance Tax Fund. The construction contractor received final payment in September 2020 and any initial funds left in the Fair Building Fund (4025) are to be transferred to the General Fund (0100) towards costs of fixtures for the new building that were paid from the General Fund (0100). Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve Resolution No. 2020-41, hereby authorizing Laurie Krohn, Boone County Treasurer, to transfer the sum of \$7,931.08 from the Fair Building Fund (4025) to the County General Fund (0100) as stated in said resolution. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board Proceedings of August 14, 2014 addressed a special fund that was established in the 1960's (Soldiers and Sailors Relief Fund) through donations for operating an office to provide for emergency needs of veterans, if there becomes a time that there is not a county office. A resolution in 2002 addresses an Attorney General's Opinion and Nebraska State Statutes. The said funds were deposited into a separate Special Prestige Value Interest Account in July 2003 that is now known as the Veteran's Aid Fund (1900). The Veteran's Aid Fund (1900) funds are to be used only on veterans in accordance with Nebraska State Statutes. The Veteran's Aid Fund (1900) will no longer need to receive a tax levy until the fiscal year that the fund account is lower than \$4,000.00. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve Resolution No. 2020-42 as stated herein and its contents supersedes and takes precedence over any and all prior resolutions, board proceedings and all written or unwritten versions of said initial Soldier and Sailor's Relief Fund/Veteran's Aid Fund (1900). Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board reviewed the 2021 calendar to set dates for the 2021 Board meetings. The Board usually meets every Monday but the first Monday of the month and if the Monday is a holiday then Tuesday beginning at 9:00 A.M. The 22/21 payroll system requires the Board to change some of their meeting days from Monday to a different day for payroll approval. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve the following meeting dates for 2021 which are subject to change: January 7, 11, 19 and 27; February 8, 16 and 24; March 8, 15, 22 and 29; April 12, 19 and 26; May 10, 17 and 26; June 14, 21 and 28; July 12, 19 and 26; August 9, 16 and 26; September 13, 20 and 27; October 12, 18 and 27; November 8, 15 and 24; December 13, 20 and 28. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

Ed Knott, Applied Connective Technologies, LLC (Applied), updated the Board in regard to the Applied Communications Tower that is located on the County cropland south of the County Communications Tower. Applied has moved their equipment from their tower to the County Communications Tower. Knott informed the Board that Telebeep still has an antenna for an active pager service system on the Applied Communications Tower and that the County is still paying a monthly electrical fee on said tower. Telebeep had an Agreement for Antenna Space from 1995 with the County until the 260 foot Utility Tower with cement block transmitter building was sold to Applied Connective Technologies, LLC effective November 1, 2015. Telebeep previously paid a yearly rental rate for use of tower space to the County. The Agreement between the County and Telebeep was terminated December 31, 2015 when Telebeep decided not to relocate their antenna or pay a rental fee on the new County Communications Tower. Knott plans to visit with Telebeep in regard to removal of their equipment from the Applied tower in order for Applied to have the electrical power disconnected and remove the Applied tower from the County cropland. Knott plans to visit with the Telebeep pager services. The Board feels that the County should no longer be paying an electrical bill for a tower that the County is not using. Knott plans to keep the Board informed on the tower issue.

The Board conducted an employment evaluation with Jacqueline Wells, County Veteran Service Officer.



The Board discussed the removal of fence/trees and leveling/grading of the west side ditch/bank of the County owned fairgrounds/cropland property at several meetings. The clean-up of the old fence, trees and ditch starts at the area on the west side of the County property by the new installed mailbox/entrance to the new fairgrounds building, thence south to the end of the County cropland property. The Board feels there should be room to pile, burn and bury the trees and wire on the southwest corner of the cropland property without getting in the way of the walking trail. In addition, the Board plans to speak to the approved contractor on removal of the trees piled by the race track while they are also cleaning up the fairgrounds/cropland dich cleaning project. The Board decided to obtain quotes from Bygland Dirt Contracting, Inc. and Seda Land Handling, LLC. The approximate quotes received: Bygland Dirt Contracting, Inc. - \$1,790.00 and Seda Land Handling, LLC - \$4,800.00. Motion made by Rutten, second by Temme to approve and accept the quote from Bygland Dirt Contracting, Inc. for approximately \$1,790.00 for the removal of fence/trees and level/grade the west side ditch/bank of the County owned fairgrounds/cropland property. The County Highway Superintendent, updated the Board regarding road equipment repair/replacement, road/bridge maintenance and projects. In addition, the following topics were discussed:

On February 26, 2020 the Board approved and signed the Proposal for Demers Ambulance and a Sales Contract for the purchase of a 2020 Demers MXP-170 Type 1 Ambulance installed on a Ford F-450 Chassis including graphics and power load from Danko Emergency Equipment Co. for \$238,420.00 with delivery in approximately seven to nine months. Due to the COVID-19 issues the new ambulance unit is now tentatively scheduled for delivery in January 2021. The Board had decided not to trade-in the 2016 County Ambulance unit. The Board decided to advertise the surplus property and accept sealed bids for the 2016 County Ambulance unit. A fence line running east and west that was in existence in 2018 divided the County cropland lease and the County fairgrounds lease. Nathan Olson is the lessee of the surveyed County cropland lease south of the fence line and Boone County Agricultural Association, Inc. is the lessee of the surveyed County property north of the fence line known as the fairgrounds. In 2019 the Board and Olson discussed amending the Lease Agreement due date and amount because of the top soil (dirt) that has been removed/disturbed from a hill on the County cropland, due to the construction of a new livestock building on the County property known as the County Fairgrounds. Larry Temme, Chairman of the Boone County Board of Commissioners called for a motion to open a public hearing on Monday, December 14, 2020 at 11:00 A.M. in the Boone County Courthouse Commissioners Meeting Room in Albion, Nebraska. Motion made by Commissioner Temme, second by Commissioner Rutten to open said public hearing. Notice of the hearing was given in advance by publication and the convened hearing was open to the public. Commissioners present for said public hearing were Larry Temme and Ben Rutten. Also present for the hearing was Larry Bird, Friends of the Trail Committee Chair. Chairman Temme read the notice for the record and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

The County Board of Commissioners has power to lease real estate owned by the county. The County Board shall hold an open and public hearing prior to any such lease at which any interested party may appear and speak for or against the lease and raise any issue concerning the County Board leasing cropland.

Notice of the public hearing was given in advance by publication in the Albion News the weeks of November 23 and 30, 2020, prior to the hearing date set for December 14, 2020. The public hearing notice was posted on the Boone County website; posted on the information board located in the Courthouse north entrance; emailed to the Board of Commissioners; and emailed to the Elected Officials and department heads on Friday, December 11, 2020.

The County Board is considering a cropland lease for the 2021, 2022, and 2023 crop years ending December 31, 2023 for approximately 26.13± acres of dry cropland (March 19, 2020 boundary survey), located in a fraction of the S1/2NE1/4 of Section 28, Township 20 North, Range 6 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska, located south of and adjacent to the present Boone County Fairgrounds. The County Board shall set a date to offer said real estate for lease to the highest bidder. If the County Board receives no bids or if the bids received are substantially lower than the fair market value, the County Board may negotiate a contract for lease of the real estate if such negotiated contract is in the best interests of the county.

Larry Bird, Friends of the Trail Committee Chair, suggested possible future use of what is known as the county cropland that part of the trail system was constructed across in 2018. Bird suggested the possible idea of planting native grasses or a forage crop that could be cut for hay instead of planting a corn/bean field. Chairman Temme acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

Motion made by Temme, second by Rutten to approve the County Board Proceedings of December 14, 2020 as presented. Roll call vote: Yeas: Temme and Rutten. Nays: None. Abstain: Lindgren. Motion carried.

Steve Pritchard, Extension Educator, submitted a written request for the Boone-Nance County Extension Board's member recommendation. The Boone-Nance County Extension Board has four representatives from each county. The board members may serve two consecutive three-year terms. The board meets quarterly, alternating the meetings between the counties. Ken Schriver of Albion has completed his second term and Jeri Wies of Petersburg has completed her first term. The Boone-Nance County Extension Board recommends the appointment of Lisa Carder of Albion and Doug Koch of Petersburg to serve their first three-year terms on the Boone-Nance County Extension Board beginning January 2021. Motion made by Rutten, second by Lindgren to appoint Lisa Carder of Albion and Doug Koch of Petersburg to serve their first three-year terms on the Boone-Nance County Extension Board beginning January 2021. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Lindgren and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Boone County and Greeley County Board of Commissioners entered into their first County of Greeley/County of Boone, NE Interlocal Agreement for cooperative services to veterans in March of 2015. The cooperative agreement enables the Boone County Veteran Service Officer to also serve as the Greeley County Veteran Service Officer. The Boone County Veteran Service Officer spends approximately one day a week in Greeley County. The present Interlocal Agreement ends at the close of business on December 31, 2020. The Greeley County Attorney prepared a new Interlocal Agreement for the Board to review. Wayne Choat requested permission to trench an electrical line across a county road commonly known as 330<sup>th</sup> Street running east and west between Sections 26 and 35, all in Township 19 North, Range 5 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska. The electrical line commences from a power pole located in the road right-of-way on the South side of 330<sup>th</sup> Street in the E1/2NW1/4 of Section 35; thence trenching north across 330<sup>th</sup> Street to an existing irrigation well located in the SW1/4 of Section 26, all in Township 19 North, Range 5 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska. Motion made by Rutten, second by Lindgren to approve Resolution No. 2020-45, granting permission to Wayne Choat to trench an electrical line across a county road known as 330<sup>th</sup> Street to the SW1/4 of Section 26, Township 19 North, Range 5 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> P.M., Boone County, Nebraska, to convert existing irrigation well to electric. Roll call vote: Yeas: Rutten, Lindgren and Temme. Nays: None. Motion carried.

The Board and Mary Ziemba, County Zoning Administrator, discussed Ziemba's request of possibly hiring an assistant for the zoning office. Ziemba prepared a lengthy document that outlined an administrative assistant duties and responsibilities to assist the zoning office and the paperwork for the road department/highway superintendent. The Board asked Ziemba if she thought 50% of her time was devoted to zoning and 50% to road department paperwork. Ziemba said it depends on each month's activity. The Board acknowledged the extra paperwork in 2019 and 2020 submitted to FEMA/NEMA due to the 2019 flood damages. The consensus of the Board to monitor the Zoning office workload the first few months of 2021, before deciding on the need of an additional employee.

Stacey Ziemba, County Highway Superintendent, presented possible building structures for a new break room for the County Road District #1, Cedar Rapids shop building. The Board and County Highway Superintendent have held several discussions since October 2017 in regard to a different breakroom for the County Road District #1, Cedar Rapids shop building. The Board and Ziemba discussed the different custom designed buildings by Premier Portable Buildings of Norfolk, Nebraska. The structure designs discussed were in regard to size; style; set on concrete slab or treated rails; what side of building for windows and the door be placed; and attach to present shop building or walk outside from shop door to breakroom door. An estimated cost for a cabin style portable building, unfinished and no electrical hookup is approximately \$9,845.00. The Board had some questions and suggestions for Ziemba to discuss with Premier Portable Buildings before a decision is made.

Stacey Ziemba, County Highway Superintendent, and the Board discussed the pending litigation, Kaufmann Farm, LLC v. County of Boone, Nebraska, concerning a road issue. The size of culvert/tubes and headwall was discussed. Ziemba is to obtain more information for the Monday, December 28, 2020 Board meeting.

Stacey Ziemba, County Highway Superintendent, informed the Board that she interviewed two applicants for the county road department advertised job position. Ziemba and the Board discussed the starting wage for new road employees. The present starting wage for new road employees is a range of \$14.00-\$15.00 per hour depending upon experience. In addition, the county pays the full family health NACO BCBS insurance premium; employee only dental premium; and retirement per state statute. When figuring an employee's actual hourly wage, the county share of insurance, retirement and social security is factored into the total. (Example based on 40 hour work week: \$14.50/hr. + Social Security \$1.08/hr. + Retirement \$0.96/hr. + employee/spouse health insurance \$10.66/hr. = total hourly wage of \$27.20/hr.)



The Board directed Ziemba to offer the applicants \$14.50 per hour with said benefits and with a start date the first week of January 2021.

In addition, Ziemba informed the Board that there is still some issues with the John Deere motor grader that was recently repaired. The John Deere motor grader is not the next one on the inventory list to be replaced, but it has been repaired often the past year. Ziemba contacted CAT about possibility trading the John Deere for a new CAT. Ziemba has not received a quote from CAT to date.

Chairman Temme acknowledged the agenda and noted that the Open Meeting Laws are posted and available to the public.

The Board reviewed the County Payroll Claims filed for the pay period of November 22, 2020 through December 21, 2020.
